WHY I MUST VOTE

On August 28, I have a chance to keep my government in the hands of Americans who believe in the American system of freedom. The right to run my business in the manner I see fit, the right to worship God, the right to choose who shall represent me — these are some of the freedoms of our American way of life. I have never thought that in Texas, U. S. A., there was any danger of losing these freedoms. Yet, these very freedoms have been lost in Texas by the citizens of Port Arthur.

In November, 1953, a union definitely proven as run by Communists, came into Port Arthur. Why? No one except that union knows. They did not try legally to organize the large plants where many workers are employed. They began picketing small businesses which had no labor problems — largely businesses operated by a few members of one family. In the usual labor dispute, the employees of a business with whom employees have some dispute will picket that business. Since there was no legitimate labor dispute between employers and employees, the only apparent purpose of these strikes were to extort money from the employers and to set employees against employer. The results of all this are many. Many small businesses have been forced to close their doors, honest employees have lost their jobs, neighbor has been set against neighbor, friend against friend.

Not only have these affected businesses. This Communist union has taken school children from their classes to picket their schools, using threats of death, rape and injury to all those children trying to cross the picket lines to attend classes.

I did not believe this could happen in America, especially in Texas. Neither did the citizens of Port Arthur — until November, 1953. It is still with them. Through the heroic efforts of our Governor and Attorney General, this alarming situation is gradually being blotted out.

Frankly, I am frightened about the future in Texas for myself, my children and grandchildren. Are they going to be under Communist rule as are the children in Port Arthur? What are, unless I — and thousands like me — wake up to what is happening right under my nose, and vote my convictions.

One of our candidates for governor of Texas has been publicly endorsed by this Communist union. It is admittedly pouring thousands of dollars into his campaign, as evidenced by the overwhelming majority given him in the Port Arthur area in the July primary.

If I vote for Ralph Yarborough on August 28, I am voting for another Port Arthur — possibly in Eastland County next time.

Racetrack Gambling Crowd Hoping For Shivers' Election?

AUSTIN, Aug. 26. — An all-out effort to bring racetrack gambling back to Texas will be made next January if Allan Shivers is re-elected governor, according to well-informed quarters around the State Capitol.

George Echols of San Antonio ran for the legislature on a platform of racetrack gambling and reached the runoff but withdrew because he said he wanted to help Shivers in his race.

Benny Binion's lawyer issued an endorsement of Shivers. Binion is the "czar" of a nation-wide gambling ring, with headquarters in Nevada and including Texas, where he was tried in federal court and convicted of income tax evasion. There have been signs that other gambling leaders of the North and East who operate in connection with race tracks have been active in the governor's race and that, reputedly, thousands of dollars have been spent to help Shivers, and these gambling overlords are not in the habit of spending money without a purpose.

Shivers, while in the State Senate, was the leader of the racetrack forces and he led the racetrack gambling side in an unsuccessful effort to prevent repeal of gambling on horse races.

He said Monday night at San Antonio that he would never run for office again — so, if he wins Saturday, he will be in position to help bring racetrack gambling back to Texas without fear of what the voters would do to him in a future election, political observers point out. — (Political Advertising paid for by the Tarant County Yarborough Club.)

"As It Looks From Here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The 83d Congress is now history. Unless the President should issue a call for a Special Session, adjournment will extend to the opening of the 84th Congress in January.

Looking back over the activities of this Session of the Congress just closed, it is doubtful one could successfully say it has been a "do-nothing" Congress. Right or wrong, it has been an extremely busy two years.

Several months ago in this column it was pointed out that legislation as finally passed seldom suits everyone exactly. Under our system of Government it is a give and take proposition and compromises must be worked out all along the line. I recall that four years ago a bill which I introduced was amended to the point that I did not want to vote for it myself on final passage.

There is one criterion I always try to follow: Is it good for America and is it good for all the people? A "victory" for the few, at the expense of the many, is a defeat for all.

The Watershed Protection Act has been signed into law by the President. The law has been enlarged and made permanent providing for flood prevention by the construction of dams on upstream watersheds.

Incidentally, a provision in the new Tax Bill has a feature of more than passing interest to Soil Conservation Districts.

A section of the bill permits farmers and ranchers to charge off for income-tax purposes expenditures for certain soil conservation practices up to 25% of the gross income derived from farming during the year.

The debate on the new Farm Bill centered around the proposition of flexible price supports versus rigid price supports at 90% of parity. In addition to the adoption of the flexible price support system, there is another "catch" in the law. The original formula of determining parity has been changed. It is called the "modern" parity formula and is going to lower the level of parity in addition to lowering price supports. Wheat and peanuts will especially be affected in 1956. I predict the wheat farmer and peanut farmer are going to be considerably worse off than it now appears on the surface.

Since the Congress is adjourning, and unless there should possibly be a Special Session, this column will be discontinued until the first of the year. I take this opportunity to express my ap-

preciation to the newspapers which carry this report to the people. I am grateful to the many who have written me comments from time to time on various subjects discussed.

While the Congress is not in Session, I can be contacted either through my Washington office, in my home town of Anson, or at places I will be visiting over my Congressional District. Ruth and I will return home for a time and will welcome a contact with

our friends, whether it be business or personal.

An Open Letter To OMAR BURKETT

If I had known in advance what an irresponsible attack you would make upon me personally in this campaign for State Representative, I would probably have never entered it. 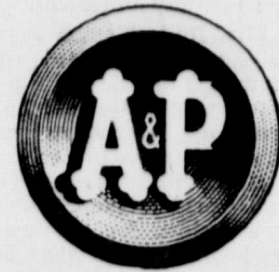
