Heavy showers were received in northern and western tiers of counties of the northern high plains, most southern high plains, western plateau, south Texas and some upper coastal

Only light showers were received in other areas but the few days of cloudy weather were helpful in slowing evaporation, particularly in blacklands and northeastern counties, where heavier amounts fell the previous Much more rain was needed in most areas.


