Crop Outlook Of State Improves With More Rain

AUSTIN, Oct. 15. — Small grain, winter legume, late hay and pasture prospects were further improved as cloudy, showery weather continued over much of the state during the early part of the week.

Only light showers were received in other areas but the few days of cloudy weather were helpful in slowing evaporation, particularly in blacklands and northeastern counties, where heavier amounts fell the previous week.

Wheat prospects in the northwest were improved in spots receiving heavier showers. Moisture is adequate in most of the high plains to germinate dusted in acreage. Additional, more general rains will be needed soon, however, to keep it coming along.

Cotton harvest in the southern high plains was stopped by rains. Showers interrupted this operation in many additional scattered areas.

Rains materially helped fall-planted sorghums in south Texas. Between showers combining of late varieties of rice neared completion.

Fall range and pasture prospects were further improved by additional showers, particularly in parts of the high plains and trans-Pecos, western plateau and southern counties, where heavier amounts were received.

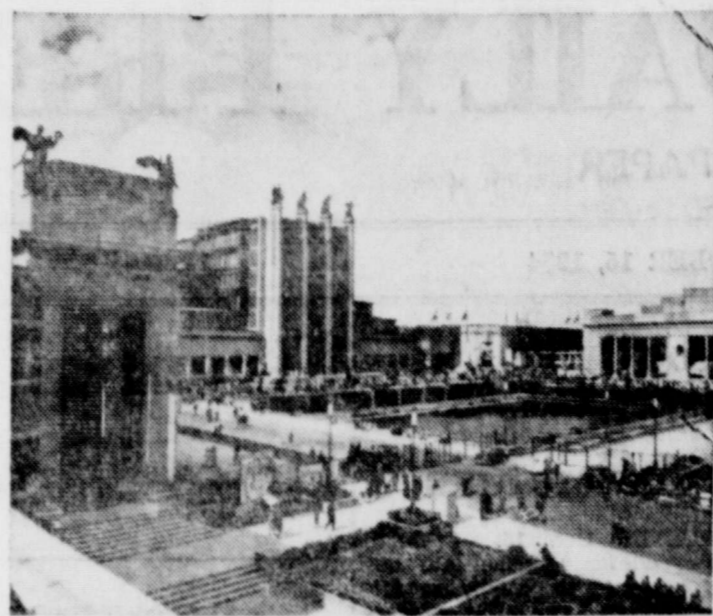

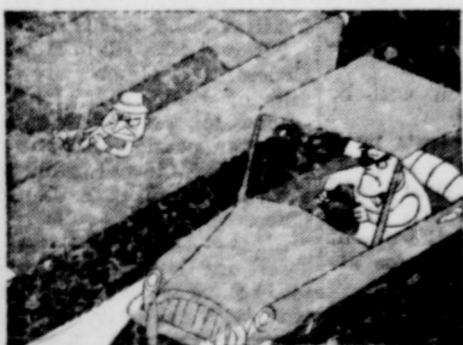

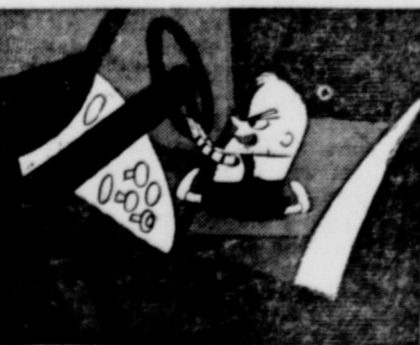

The Scenicruiser — carrying a price tag of nearly \$50,000 — will operate through schedules from Memphis to Los Angeles, stopping en route in Cisco to load passengers.

Five hundred of these new highway travelers are going into service all over the country on Greyhound's extensive network of transportation lines.

The Scenicruiser features such innovations as raised observation deck, panoramic picture windows, improved air-conditioning, Greyhounds famous air-suspension ride, individual smoking vents, individual overhead lighting and completely-equipped washroom.

The bus is 40 feet long and seats 43—33 on the upper deck and 10 on the lower.

Twin diesel engines, either of which can propel the bus and run accessories alone, are mounted as single unit for quick re-

moval for repairs. Air-suspension floats the Scenicruiser on pillars of compressed air. Power steering and power brakes insure positive control by driver.

The Scenicruiser was developed after 15 years of design and experimentation by the Greyhound Corporation.
