FORT WORTH, Oct. 21. — Cash awards totaling \$12,232 will be offered in the steer competition of the 1955 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show. Of this amount, \$9,245 is allotted to the open show and the remainder to the junior steer show.

The junior steer competition is for Texas Future Farmers and 4-H Club members. The open show, as the name implies, is open to the world.

Breed champions of the junior show are chosen and from them the grand champion is selected. A like procedure is followed in the open show and the two grand champions then contest for the honor of the grand championship of the entire exposition. At the "auction of champions," the prize animals sell at large prices, last year's grand champion bringing the owner \$6,000 besides the prize money. Deadline for steer and other livestock entries is December 15. Show dates are Jan. 28 through Feb. 6.

### Probable Starters Named By Coaches

The Cisco High School Loboes went through stiff drills this week as they prepared to open the 1954 conference chase Friday night when they meet the favored Ranger Bulldogs at Chesley Field.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday were spent in working out a defense for Ranger's combined "T" winged "T" and spread running attack and in adding finesse to their own running and passing plays. Thursday was to be spent in kicking and loosening up drills.

The Loboes were picked to lose to the Bulldogs by most sports writers. The favored Bulldogs, last years state champions of 1-A, have a season record of two losses again three wins. They opened the season with a loss to Colorado City. Their other loss was to III-A Brownwood. They have wins over Brewer of Fort Worth, De Leon and Eastland.

Their attack is built around six returning lettermen from last years state championship aggregation. Scott Forney, who piloted the team to the state championship last year, will be at the quarterback post again this year. He is a fine passer and ball handler, and one of the team's top runners.

The Bulldogs will outweigh the Loboes considerably in all departments. The Ranger backs outweigh the Lobo runners 155 to 142 pounds and the line averages 185 as compared with 163 for the Loboes. The Bulldog team average is 179 pounds as compared with 155 for the Loboes.

School officials expected Chesley Field to be filled to the rafters Friday night as a large delegation of Ranger fans will join all Cisco fans for the game. Plans were being made to care for the largest crowd of the season. It will be the first time the two teams have met since 1952 when the Bulldogs won over the Loboes by a score of 28-14.

A pep rally at the school at 3 p. m. and a giant rally and bonfire Thursday night on the vacant lot east of the community gym, were to wind up preparations for the game by the Cisco student body. All fans were invited to the rally and bonfire tonight.

Coaches Jay Williams and Charles Williams reported probable starters as Bill Smith and Johnny Trigg at ends; Arzell Hale and Ed Bernie at tackles; Joe Farrow and Tommy Collier at guards; Ronnie Qualls at center; Tommy Reynolds at quarterback; Harold Phippen and Marcus Gallegos at halves and Jim Gilmore at full. Levere Adams, Jim Branton, Carrol Thames, Frank Walton and other linemen will be ready to spell the starters. Benji Lipsey, Buck Whitehead, David Ewell, Fred Hayes and John Carlile will see a lot of action on both offense and defense.

Coach Boone Yarbrough and Assistant Coach Stubby Warden announced their probable starting Bulldogs as follows: Jerry Cantrell and John Rush at ends; Archie Robinson and Eddie Jones at tackles; Tommy Young and Charles Bonney at guards; John Hagaman at center; Scott Forney at quarterback; Jerry Wharton and Bennie Robinson at halves and Jim Littlefield at full.
