





moisture from early October rains was ample and the summertime temperatures early in the week stimulated growth. In most other areas, these high temperatures took much of the scant noisture before grass had time to make appreciable development.

A very large oats acreage for pasture has been planted over the eastern half of the State and some is up but rain is needed to keep it coming along. 
