registered 1.4 inches. The fall was a little heavier north and east of the city. Good rains were reported to the south and west. Lake Cisco caught some three inches of new water, city officials reported. The ground was soaked and ready to send water into the lake if the rains continue. Area stock tanks are in comparatively good condition




