CROP AND PASTURE PROSPECTS ARE BRIGHTER AFTER RAINFALL

AUSTIN, Oct. 29. — Small grain, winter legume and pasture prospects were greatly improved by soaking rains during the past few days in east, central and south Texas, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture's weekly report.

In some parts of West and North Texas, lack of moisture was retarding development of small grains and has practically stopped planting of these crops.

Cotton harvest neared completion in all areas except the northwest and trans-Pecos. In these areas, harvest progressed rapidly with a few gins starting to operate around the clock. Some low rolling plains acreage has been defoliated but machine stripping will not become general until killing frosts occur. Grain sorghum harvest was in full swing in the high plains and northern low rolling plains counties. Except for scattered late acreages, harvest of this crop was nearing completion elsewhere.

Scattered fields of late hay and some second growth cane were being salvaged. Harvest of peanuts, pecans and sweetpotatoes gained momentum during the week. For each of these crops,

STEPHENVILLE, Oct. 29. — With one of the toughest hurdles of the season under their belt, the high riding Stephenville Jackets are prepping in earnest for the game with the Cisco Lobos.

Just in case the Jackets are overconfident they might well recall last year's 13-13 tie with the Lobos after they had played such a great game against Comanche. Some last minute heroics by Eric Lowrey and Lonnie Leatherman averted a defeat in '53. However, this year the Jackets, who are in more contention for the title, hope to convert the situation.

Last week's game was a game where the Jackets committed few errors. They fumbled just two times and one time they recovered and the second a penalty nullified the miscue.

The Jackets came out of the Mineral Wells contest with no injuries. The new found aggressiveness of the Jackets has put them in the forefront of the district race and the Lobos would like nothing better than to knock off the locals.

A good game was insured last Friday with the Jackets surprise win and quarterback Lonnie Leatherman's performance of two touchdowns and passing for two more earned him a place on the Star-Telegram's All Star list. Lonnie's performance is a good

example of courage and willingness to work. As a sophomore few observers gave the boy a chance of ever developing into a first class operator, but the lanky senior has taken his coaching lessons well and has now turned into a first class performer.

Roy Kelly and Don Cleveland both made the Jacket running attack go. Cleveland who is rounding out his second year as a regular has another season to go before he ends his string and all the Jacket followers hope that he has found himself. Kelly is a lad who with limited capacities has turned into a first class halfback. Ray was used principally on defense last season has made up for his lack of size and speed with a bundle of determination.

Two band buses and a student bus will leave from the high school building at 5:30 p. m. and scores of fans will follow by car. Most fans with cars were expected to leave about 6 p. m.

There are three possible routes to Stephenville, all about the same distance. Possibly the best route is east on U. S. Highway 80 approximately 40 miles to the intersection of Highway 108, using Route 108 to Stephenville. It is approximately 64 miles by the U. S. 80 route. Another route is through Eastland, Carbon, Gorman, De Leon and Dublin, a distance of 67 miles. The third road is through Eastland, Carbon, Gorman, Desdemona, and Lingleville which is approximately 61 miles.

The Loboes had a light workout Thursday in preparation for the contest. Thursday night, the team called a meeting of their own initiative to study their own plays and the plays used by the Stephenville club so far this season. They met in the field house without the coaches to discuss the contest.

The final pep rally by the student body was to be held just before the team leaves for the game. The rally will be held in the school auditorium.

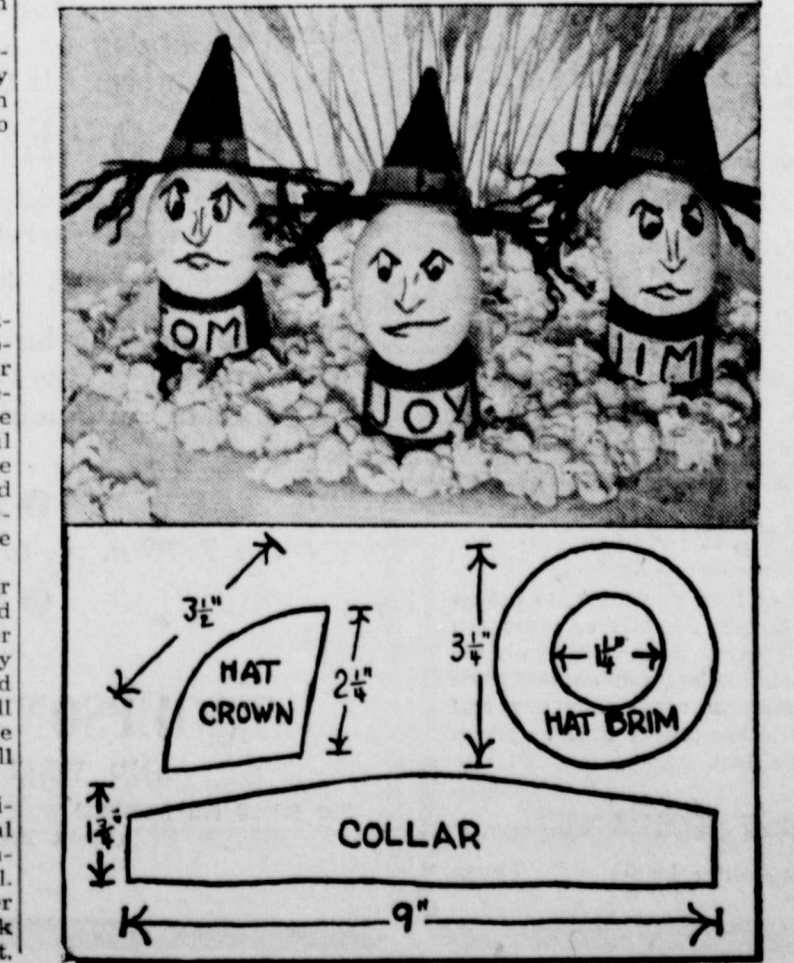

Plans Ready For Saturday Program

A pair of fast and powerful backs, and a strong center of the line will be the biggest assets of Allen Academy Saturday night as they come to Cisco for a Texas Junior College Conference contest with the Wranglers of Cisco Junior College.

The game between the Wranglers and the Ramblers will be the highlight of a homecoming program which will see the crowning of the Wrangler football queen, twirling acts, visiting bands and valuable gate prizes.

Some 18 Cisco merchants are cooperating in a program to give tickets to Cisco area fans. The tickets, plus 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for students for a service charge will admit fans to the game and give them a chance at one of the valuable gate prizes to be awarded at halftime. Fans should get the tickets from the merchants and sign them before going to the field for the program.

The Cisco High School Lobo Band, the Rising Star Wildcat Band and possibly others will be on hand for the game. One of the features of the program will be a twirling act at half-time starring Miss Barbara Beyer of Wylie, a freshman student at the college. The football queen for this year will be presented at the halftime ceremonies.

Coach Red Lewis said that scouting reports showed the academy to have two good running backs in Bullett and Ibanez. Bullett is a powerful 190 pound fullback while Ibanez is a scabback. The Ramblers are strong in the middle of the line and have yield little yardage there. They vary their attack with the split "T," the single wing and spread.

Neither the Wranglers nor the Ramblers have broken into the win column this season. Coach Lewis said that his probable starters would be Jimmy Hicks and George Gilgo or Bud Miller at ends; Phil Perry and Kent Mundell at tackles; Carl Metkar and Richard Baack at guards; Randy Reynolds at center; Severo Vacquero at quarterback; Ray Westmoreland and Edwin Allen at halves and Billy Hawk at full.

Wayne Adams, 225 pound center and mainstay in the Wrangler defense, was still under the doctor's care for lime burns received in the Navarro County game Saturday night. He will be in uniform Saturday night, but will probably not see action. The doctor was to give his verdict Friday. 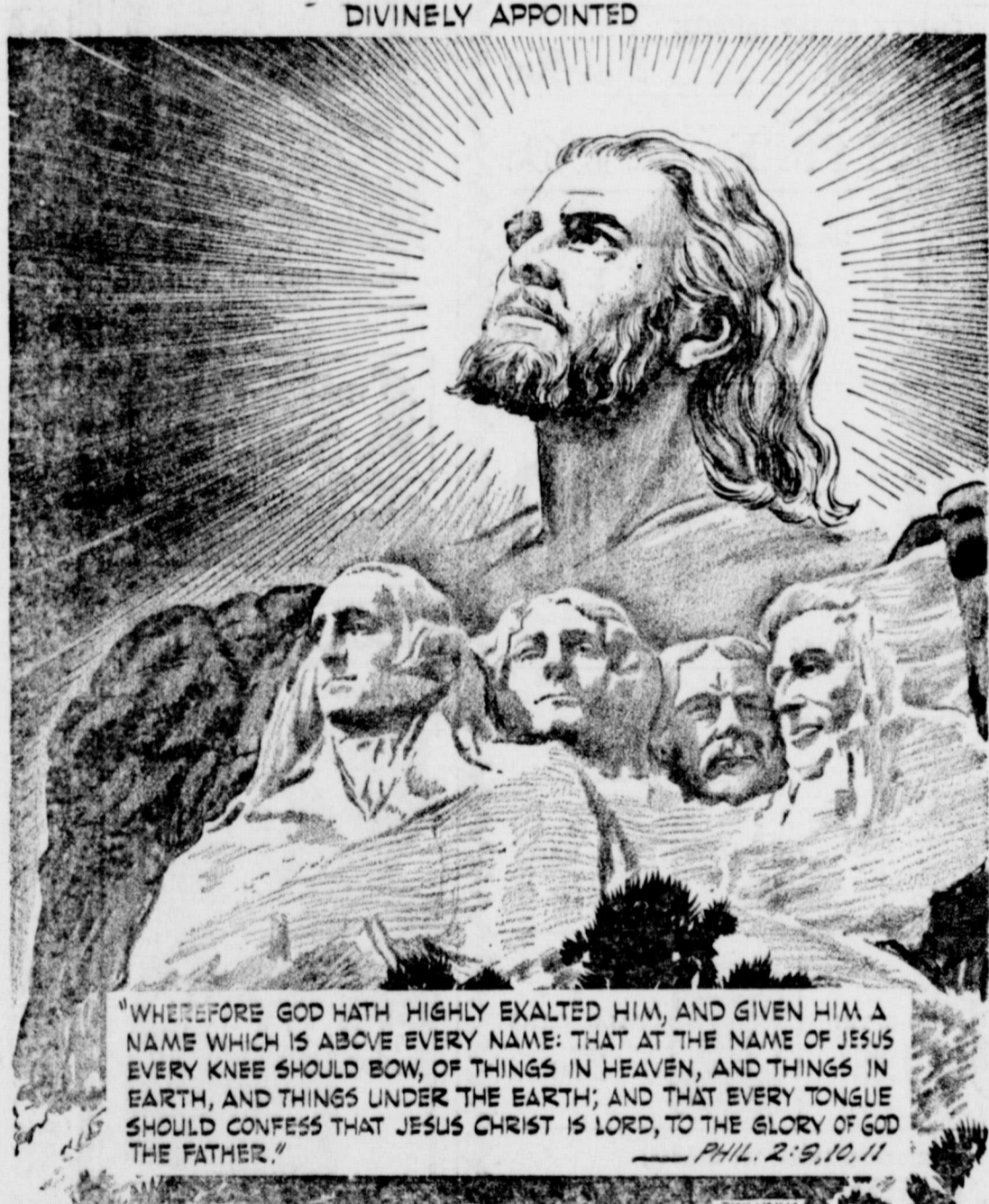
