The polls opened at 8 a. m. and will remain open until 7 p. m. Fred Girst was presiding judge at the City Hall polling place and a total of 82 ballots had been issued at 11:30 a. m. W. W. Walace, presiding judge of the East Cisco box at the Cisco Gas Corp., had issued only 30 ballots.

Those who received ballots vere taking a little more time han usual at elections. The hig ballot listed all Democratic Party nominees, a few nominees by the Republican party, and places for the Constitution Party, Independent Party and write-ins.





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
