Organization Calls For Farm Disaster Assistance

National Farmers Union and 11 other farm groups sent a letter to Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman today urging the administration's support of and active engagement in securing emergency disaster assistance for farmers and ranchers.

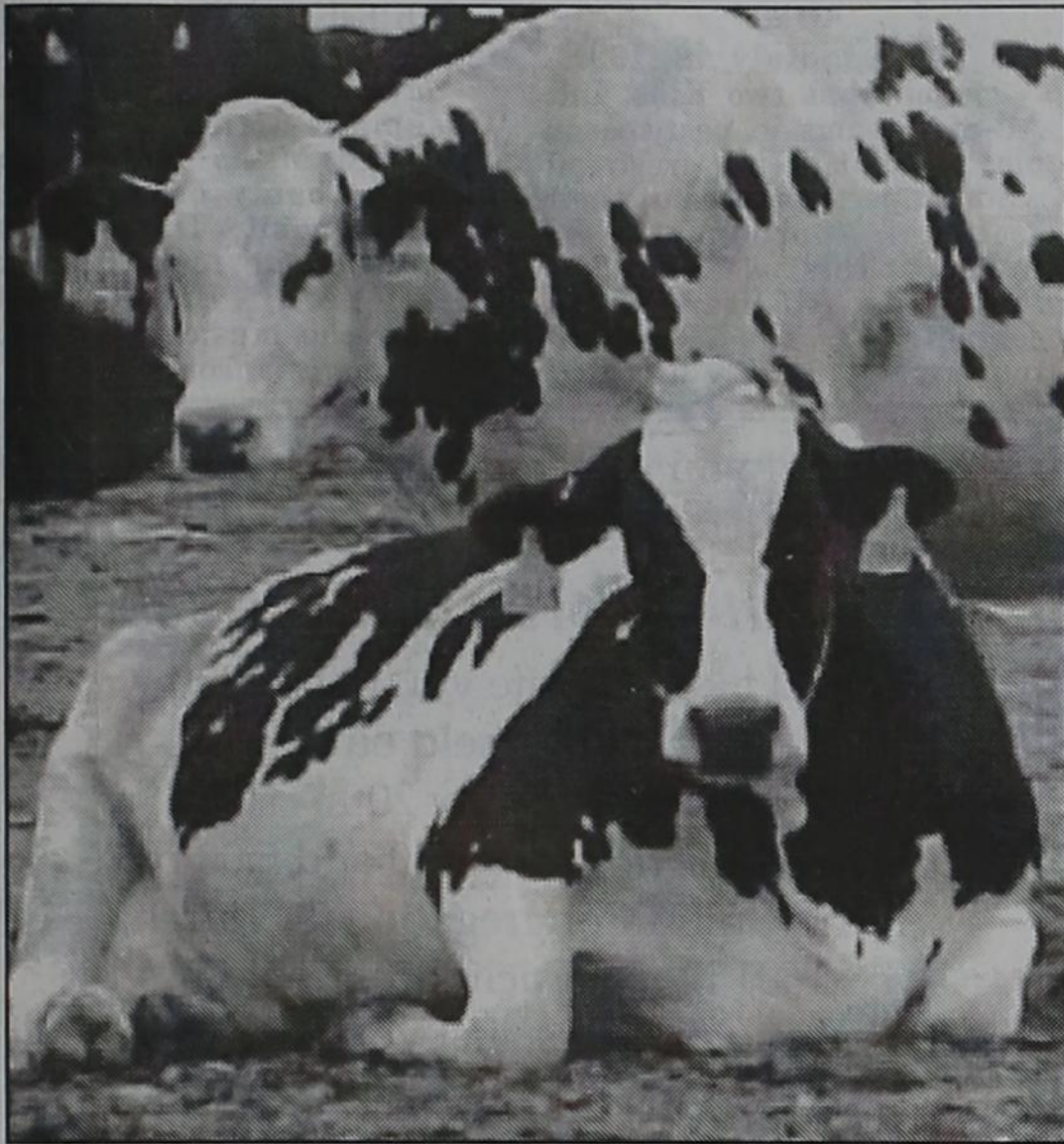
The organizations commended Veneman for the U. S. Department of Agriculture's timely announcements and actions to address natural disasters devastating crop and livestock production in 2001 and 2002. However, the farm organizations pointed out in the letter that there is still a desperate need for emergency programs to "reduce tragic weather-and disease-caused economic impacts experienced by farmers, ranchers and their communities throughout much of rural America."

Texas Farmers Union (TFU) President Wes Sims said the 2002 farm bill was a step forward for rural America in providing a safety net for producers, but that

the new farm law fails to provide emergency disaster assistance.

"The new farm bill and its more stable level of funding is incapable of predicting and adequately dealing with natural disasters in advance," Sims said. "Emergency disaster assistance is needed desperately. Disasters affect not only farmers, but also entire rural communities and businesses that depend upon the agriculture economy."

Congress has enacted production loss disaster assistance each of the last four years, but not for producers who suffered losses in 2001. Last year, drought conditions devastated large portions of Texas, Maine, Vermont, California, Tennessee, South Carolina, Ohio, Indiana, New York, New Mexico, Wyoming, Virginia, Washington and Idaho, and the entire state of Montana. "In 2002, the drought has continued in Texas and in several of the other states," Sims stated.

TWO WEEKS AGO in this space, Ye Editor had some opinions about the just-begun postal rate hike. About 99.9 per cent of our readers agreed with what I had written, and only one has personally voiced his disagreement. You can probably guess who that was...yep, the postmaster.

The Friona postmaster, actually. He said it was a personal attack. I hadn't intended it to be. I was just stating some experiences I had had recently with the U.S. Mail. I guess I should have pointed out that the biggest part of our mailing each week, which includes the mailing of our newspapers, are received in timely fashion.

As with anything, it's the exceptions that stick in your craw. Having spent around \$430,000 with the Postal Service in my newspaper career gave me a right to be just a bit critical, I thought. Carol and I could retire in comfort with that amount.

But since Larry is already mad at me, here's another subject that really "sticks." (Larry didn't invent this new system, so he shouldn't be offended about what I'm going to say).

You're probably aware of the new system of addresses for the good folks who live "in the country." Practically since the days of Ben Franklin, these folks have been addressed like: "Rural Route 1, Box 49."

Now come the good folks in Austin and Washington, who have declared that this isn't good enough. You can't use rural routes with box numbers anymore. At least so says some of the higher mukeldy-mucks. We should pause at this point in our dissertation to point out that this new program isn't purely a postal invention, but is tied into the national 9-1-1 system.

The officials in Far-Off Land have decreed that people having emergencies can no longer be found by local Emergency Medical Technicians by the fact that they live six miles south on Highway 214, and two miles east. Nope-won't do. Now, they live on 1864 County Road "M." You have to tell the folks who answer your 9-1-1 call that is your address, so they can more easily find you.

And, while you're at it, you hafta call the newspaper office and tell them that this is your new mailing address. It's not Rural Route 1, Box 49 anymore. Woops, we forgot. Before all of this, the Postal Service decreed that they were no longer "Rural Routes," but HCR's. I think that stood for "highway contract" or something.

Personally, I think that if the mail couldn't be delivered as HCR 1, Box 49, that changing your address to 1864 CR-M isn't going to hurry it up very much--and I'd hate to be lying on my floor out southeast of town while some new EMTs tried to figure out the system.

One more thing, though (and I know the papers leave Parmer County on Fridays). For more than six months, our subscribers in Lubbock, who had always received their papers on Saturday, have not been getting them until Mondays some weeks.

At a recent senior meal, Joe Mercer and I were recalling that 40 years ago, you could talk to someone in Amarillo at 10 o'clock in the morning, and if you needed something right away, they could trot it to the Amarillo post office, and you'd have it in your post office box by 2:30 p.m. or so--yes, the SAME DAY. That was 'way before faxes, e-mails and Fed-Ex. It was thanks to the mail being sent by train, when there were two or three mail trains each day.

Probably the biggest mistake the Postal Service ever made was in yanking the mail from the trains and switching to a system of trucks across the country. For one thing, Santa Fe and others used the excuse of losing their mail contract to shut down passenger train service to many, many areas, including ours. Those of us "passenger train fans" have lamented that day ever since.

Well, thanks for listening to my "peeves." (And don't tell Larry--he cancelled his subscription, so maybe he won't learn about what I've said).

Miller Relative Makes Name As An Educator

Darla Powell, who teaches in the Wichita Falls ISD, continues to draw attention to herself as an instructor in an elementary "magnet school."

Mrs. Powell is the granddaughter of Eva and Roy Miller of Friona. Her parents are Glenda and Roy V. Miller of San Marcos.

A front-page article in a recent edition of the Wichita Falls Record News featured a large photograph of Mrs. Powell with a pair of students in her science class, working with baby guinea pigs.

Darla teaches at Washington-Jackson Elementary School in Wichita Falls. She and her husband Rick have lived in Wichita Falls for a number of years.

A year ago, she had been singled out as "Teacher of the Year" for the Wichita Falls ISD, and also was honored as the Wal-Mart outstanding teacher, where she also received a cash award.

Her school was also honored as the most outstanding magnet school in the nation for 2001.

Many of the students that Mrs. Powell teaches are economically disadvantaged. In fact, 56 per cent of the students in the Washington-Jackson school fall into this category. These students qualify for free or reduced-price lunches.

Nevertheless, the school earned five stars--the highest mark--from the Just for the Kids' statewide ranking. Eighty-four percent of the school's fourth graders passed the test: 91 per cent of the

fifth and 92 per cent of the sixth graders.

The featured teacher told the Record News reporter that one of her students, on the first day of the last school term, snapped at her "I don't have to do anything!"

Mrs. Powell had other ideas. She was determined that that student would learn the skills needed to pass the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) examination.

She took time from her planning hour to tutor Shatiqua Carr in a daily, 45-minute one-on-one push called "Crunch."

The high expectations and individual attention changed the student's attitude and improved her performance. As the TAAS test date neared,

the girl lamented that "I won't get to 'Crunch' with you anymore!"

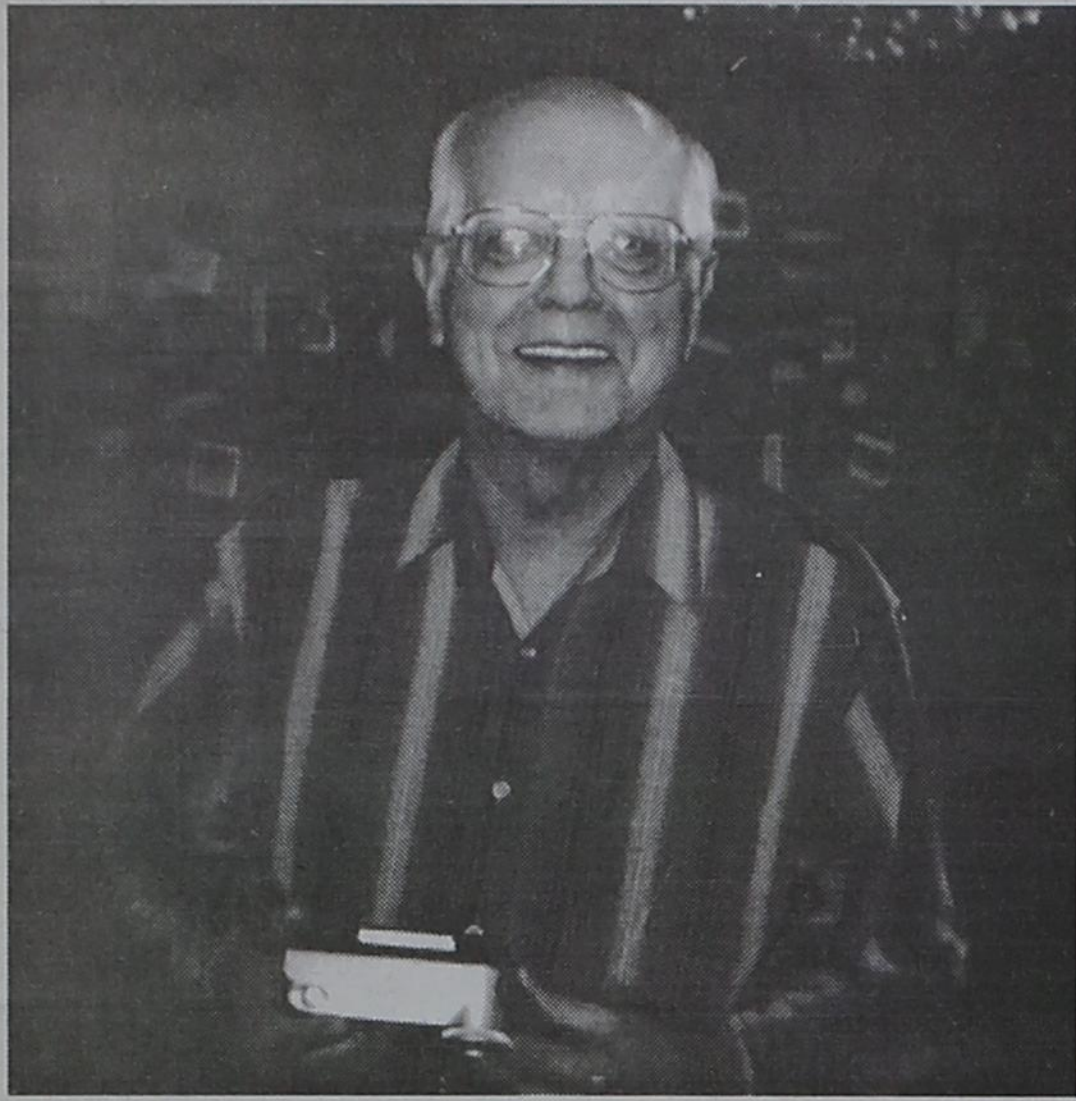
Even in schools in which most students are economically disadvantaged, studies show that expecting only the best from all of them has a curious way of getting educators what they ask for. The "if you think you can, you're right" philosophy has proven itself in schools where high expectations lay the foundation for high achievement.

Dr. Peggy Gordon, assistant superintendent in the Wichita Falls ISD, said that unique approaches are often needed with students from low socioeconomic families. "You may have to approach teaching in different ways," she said. "You may have to teach differently and structure the educational process a little differently."

As a reward for their good work, the students are allowed to come early each morning to care for the animals used in the science labs.

Finches, ferrets, parrots and a 9-foot boa constrictor can be found in the science classrooms. A fifth grader, Dylan Williams, said working with the animals is fun, but it's also work. "When we get through early, we clean up the poop," he said.

Since the school has a math-science focus, extra "magnet dollars" are received to fund the top-notch special supplies used to help the students in their learning process.

60 Yrs Ago-July 17, 1942
 Repeating his statement that only a unified effort of all farmers in Parmer County can rid the county of the serious grasshopper menace, County Agent Garlon Harper reported this week that some progress has been made in killing the 'hoppers and that farmers who have put the poison bait out according to prescribed methods report good results.

Business Rules Should Apply To Government

Congress and the president just fell all over themselves this week trying to make political hay out of the few bad apples which have been exposed in the corporate world. On Monday, the Senate voted 97-0 to crack down on the 21st century robber barons, and the House followed suit, 391-28, on Tuesday.

But frankly, it's not the guys at Enron or WorldCom who bother me. It's the thieves in the federal government who are not constrained by either "new and improved" or "old and worn" accounting principles. In fact, principles are in short supply when it comes to Congress and the federal bureaucracy.

For decades, federal programs and officials have raped the finances of this nation with no consequences. The media is full of the Democrats' roars and the Republicans' lesser roars for corporate reform and for cracking down on the "greed and evil" which lurks in the shadows of our capitalist system. But both parties are mute when it comes to government corruption.

Take the United States Postal Service, for example. The USPS ran a deficit of \$1.7 billion in fiscal year 2001 and anticipates a \$1.5 billion deficit this year. The agency has \$13 billion in debt and faces another \$80 billion in liabilities over the next several years.

As of June 30, the American people have been stuck with another three-cent hike in the price of a first class stamp, and other mailers, including newspapers, have also been hit with steep increases for the third time in two years. (Be forewarned, readers. Subscription rates will be increasing.)

Far from normal business practices, the post office — like most of the government — wastes a lot of money. ABC News' Lisa Stark had this to say: "A report by the General Accounting Office, the government's watchdog agency, found the post office has lost at least \$84 million on new business ventures, including electronic-bill paying, money transfers, and postal services online. An audit by the GAO's inspector general revealed 30 properties purchased for \$45 million that had never been developed or used, including one held for 18 years."

Meanwhile, Citizens Against Government Waste (CAGW) reports that between 1998 and 2000, postal executives paid themselves \$805 million in "performance bonuses." But it's not just the big wigs on the take at the postal service. Earlier this year, the postal carriers union reached a six-year agreement to increase their pay by more than seven percent in addition to semi-annual cost of living adjustments.

When will we see an audit of the USPS? When will Congress reform this agency which is in such a dismal shape? Not any time soon. The National Newspaper Association reports this month, "After an eight-year roller coaster ride, the latest version of postal reform was defeated" in a committee vote. Twenty Congressmen voted against reform, nine abstained, and only six were in favor.

The chairman of the committee said without reform, a 75-cent first class stamp is a future possibility.

But let's not just point the finger at the Post Office. There are plenty of governmental gaffs to go around. In fact, as CAGW's Tom Schatz reports, "For the past five years, the General Accounting Office has been unable to issue an opinion on the government's consolidated financial statements because of certain material weaknesses in internal control and accounting and reporting issues."

In plain English: the government's books don't even come close to balancing. The list of wasteful spending and disappearing funds at the federal level could fill several newspapers and not begin to tell the whole story.

In testimony before Congress, Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan urged restraint recently in terms of cracking down on corporate America.

"Beneath all of the problems that we have is still a very sound structure," Greenspan said, "and if we endeavor to try to change the system in a fundamental way, we may end up doing more damage than help."

By contrast, the only thing that is beneath government corruption is bureaucratic greed, fraud, and political deceit.

In the business world, there are consequences to cheating investors and cooking the books. But in government the same cannot be said, and our representatives aren't doing anything to change that fact.

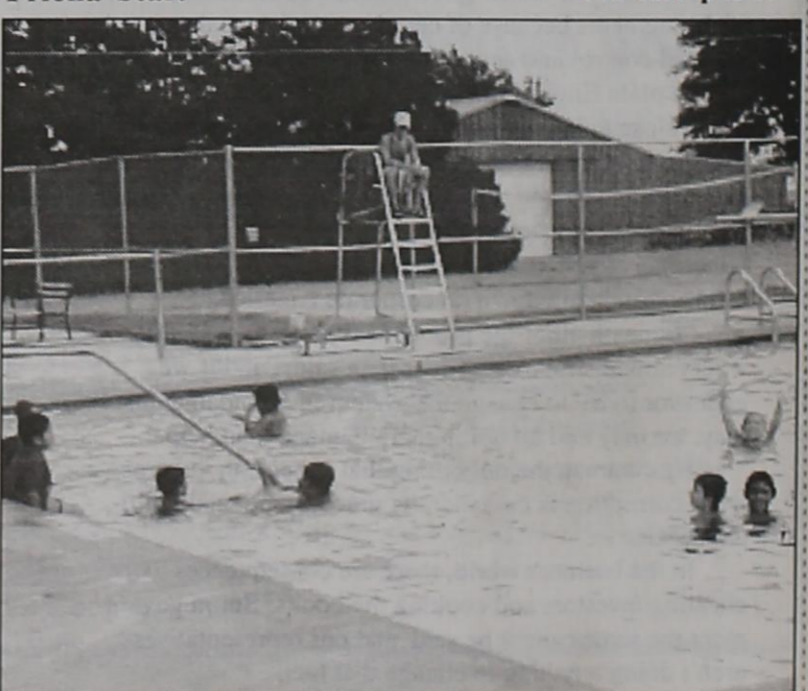

Volunteer Cotton Is Problem

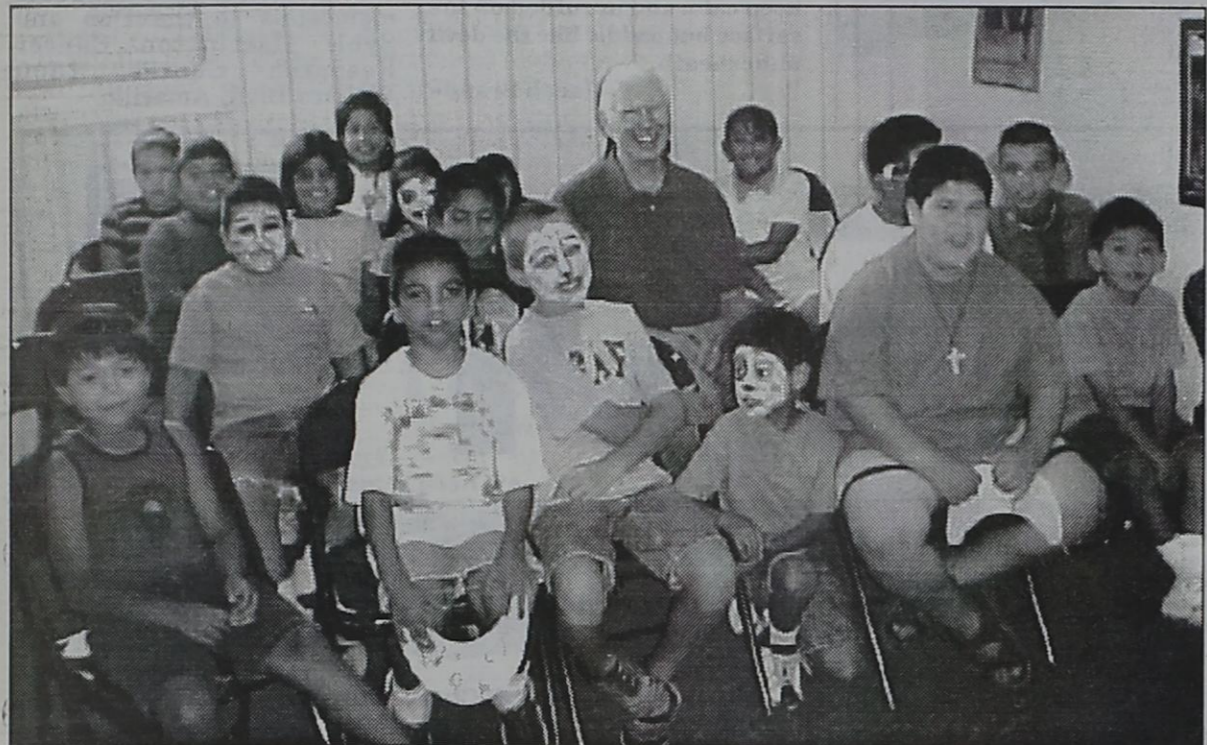
Cotton producers in the Northern High Plains zone who certified failed cotton need to remember to keep those fields free of hostable cotton—cotton that can sustain boll weevil feeding and reproduction—said officials of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation.

Volunteer cotton is a troublesome problem in eradication, said Charles Allen, program director. Its presence along field edges and in fields that have been planted to another crop provides a haven for boll weevils to continue to infest a zone.

Because of this danger, foundation personnel must continue to place traps and perform weekly inspections on fields that have cotton plants in them, he said. Should weevils be caught in these traps, the fields will have to be sprayed.

Allen said the measures are necessary to protect the gains made in eradication and to prevent unnecessary program costs.

Growers who certified failed acres by July 15 are eligible for a credit for those acres on their assessments, provided the fields remain free of hostable cotton.

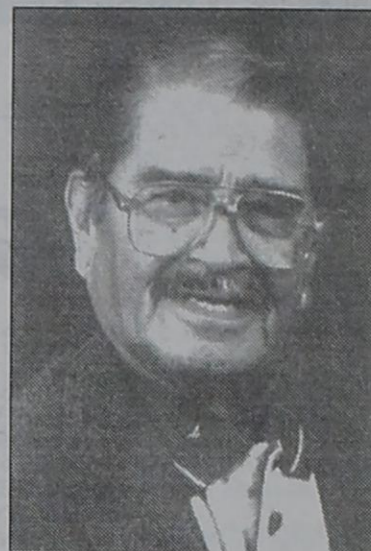
Burial was in Bovina Cemetery. Father Juan Carlos Barragon conducted the services. Blackwell Funeral Home of Friona handled the arrangements.

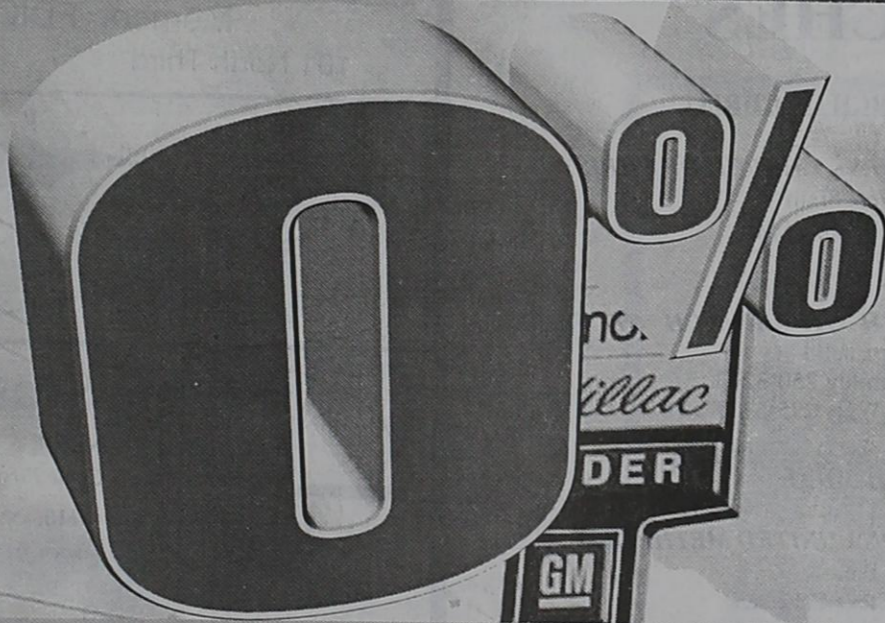

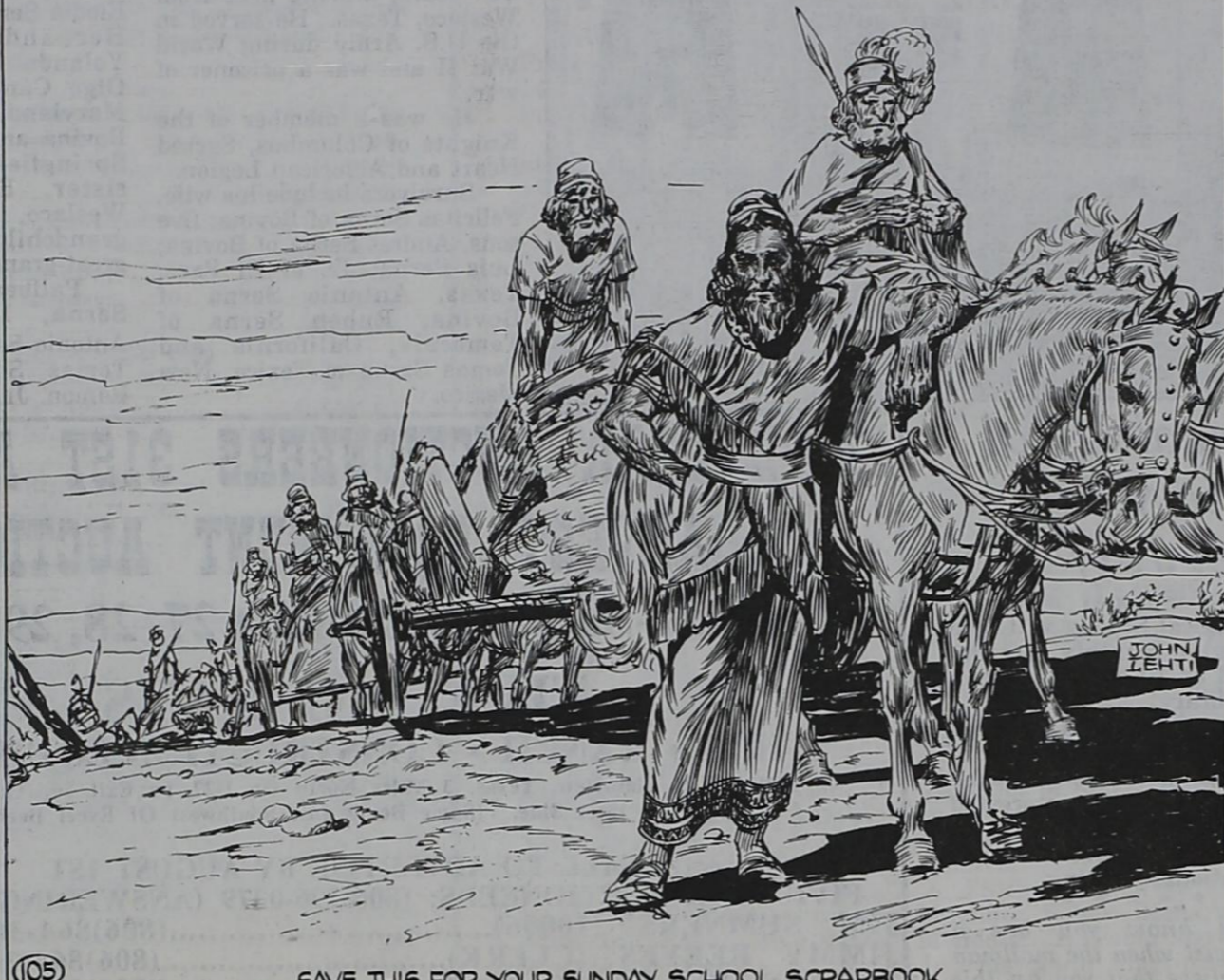

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Currently Being Accepted In Farwell

"Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by severe drought that occurred from January 01, 2001 and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Farwell, Texas," Thomas S. Taylor, said today.

Parmer County is one of thirteen contiguous counties in Texas that were recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Thomas S. Taylor said

"farmers may be eligible for loan of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent."

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Thomas S. Taylor said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure

in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until February 18, 2003, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Thomas S. Taylor said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farms who are U.S. citizens and farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Farwell is open from 8:00 am to 4:30 pm Monday through Friday.

Not All Sunglasses Are Safe From UV

Sunglasses come in many different designs, shapes and colors. Regardless of what model you choose, you will want to make sure that you have UV (ultraviolet) protection. Just because glasses are very dark does not mean they offer UV coverage. They can still make the eyes dilate and allow more harmful rays to enter. In fact, dark glasses may cause more harm than lighter ones. Either get your glasses from your vision care specialist or carefully read the label on the packaging. It should say that the glasses are UV protected.

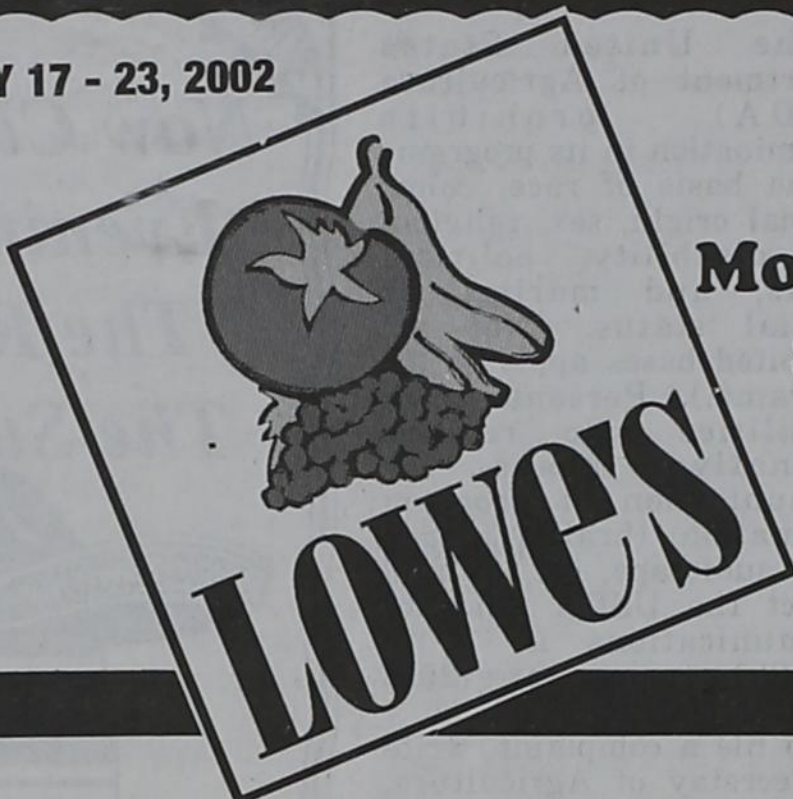

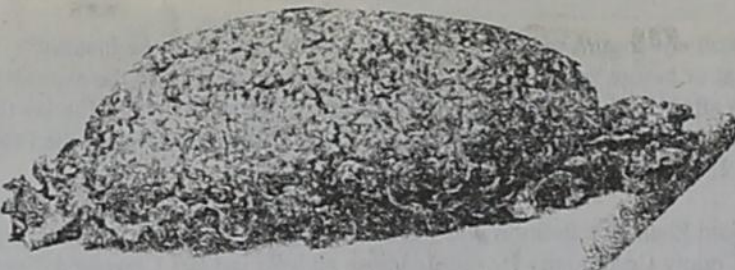
