Agriculture Commissioner John C. White selected 16 auction sales in eight West Texas counties for the experimental news project. Data from the sales will be distributed by radio and newspapers. Daily bulletins are available to interested persons.

West Texas points covered in the report, besides Eastland Co., include Lubbock, San Angelo, Abilene, Brownwood, Wichita Falls, Vernon and Goldthwaite. Reports will include sale information on cattle, hogs, sheep and

This new service resulted from a demand by the livestock trade for a more complete coverage of stock movement in auction rings. Previously, only marketing data from such major points as Fort Worth, San Antonio, Amarillo, and Houston was collected by marketing agencies for state distribution.



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
