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GOING AFTER INDUSTRY

A survey just completed by the Research Department of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce indicates that Texas cities and towns are going after industry in a systematic manner. Out of 261 municipalities contacted, 43 have industrial foundations while 50 other towns have special industrial funds set aside for the purpose of promoting industrial development and 24 others are in the process of organizing such foundations, the survey revealed.

Out of the 43 existing industrial foundations, 31 are located in East Texas, 10 in West Texas and 2 in South Texas.

Because of the fact that industry is dispersing and is deliberately seeking locations in smaller

The program of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce of balancing agriculture with industry has been in operation for many years, and while the survey indicated a preponderance of industrial foundations in the 72 counties comprising the region of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce, it also revealed that this fact did not indicate any lack of interest on the part of West Texas or South Texas, since these areas have long been predominantly agricultural and cattle areas, with an important oil economy as well.

Of the 15 foundations now in process of organization, East and West Texas each has six while South Texas has three.

The preamble to the survey made it plain that no conclusions had been drawn nor recommendations made from the findings, but that actual figures regarding the number of such foundations was sought in order to determine the scope of interest in industry throughout the state.

Game Hunt Slated On Government Lands

AUSTIN, Nov. 12. — Hunting for big game will be tried this fall on government owned land in parts of six East Texas counties under a joint agreement by the Game and Fish Commission and the United States Forest Service.

The deer and turkey harvest will be permitted on three of the five wildlife management areas which are in operation in three of the four Texas National Forests. About 50,000 acres in all will be opened up to the public. Surplus game, besides providing hunting this fall, helps increase wildlife population on lands surrounding the management areas.

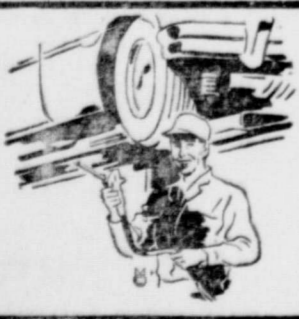

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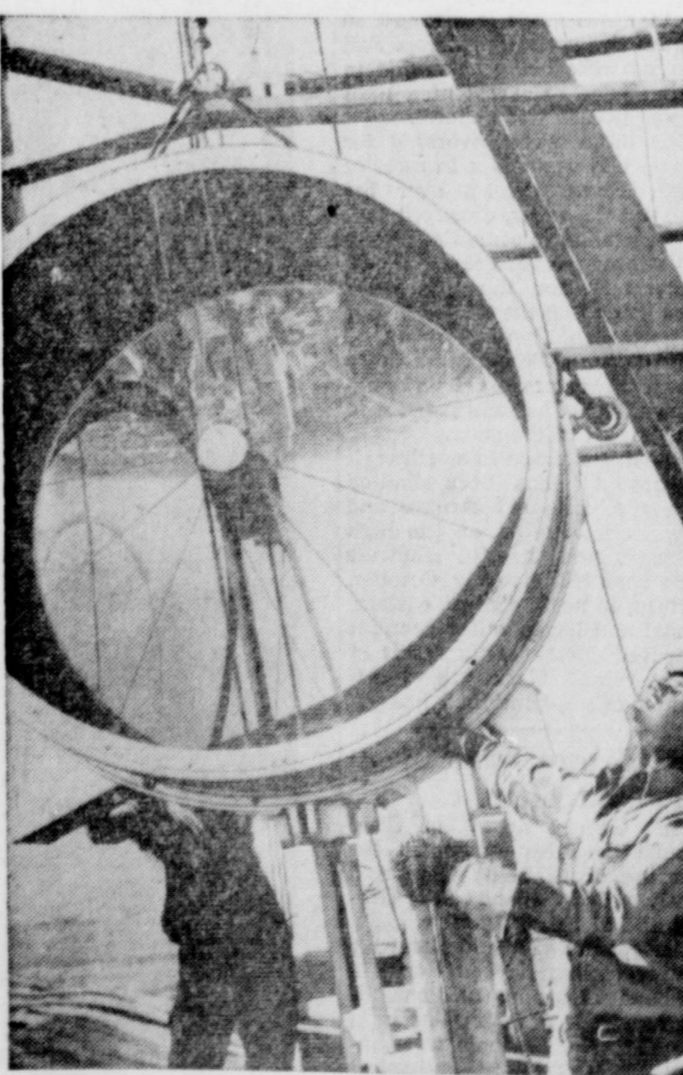

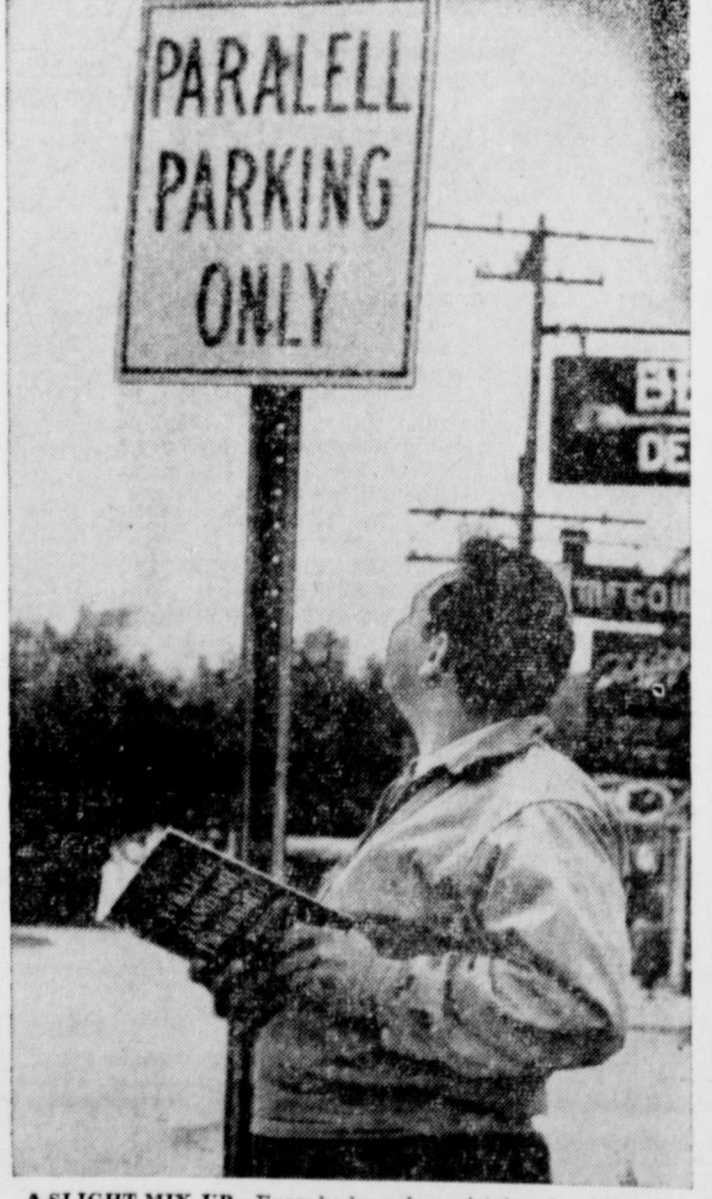
