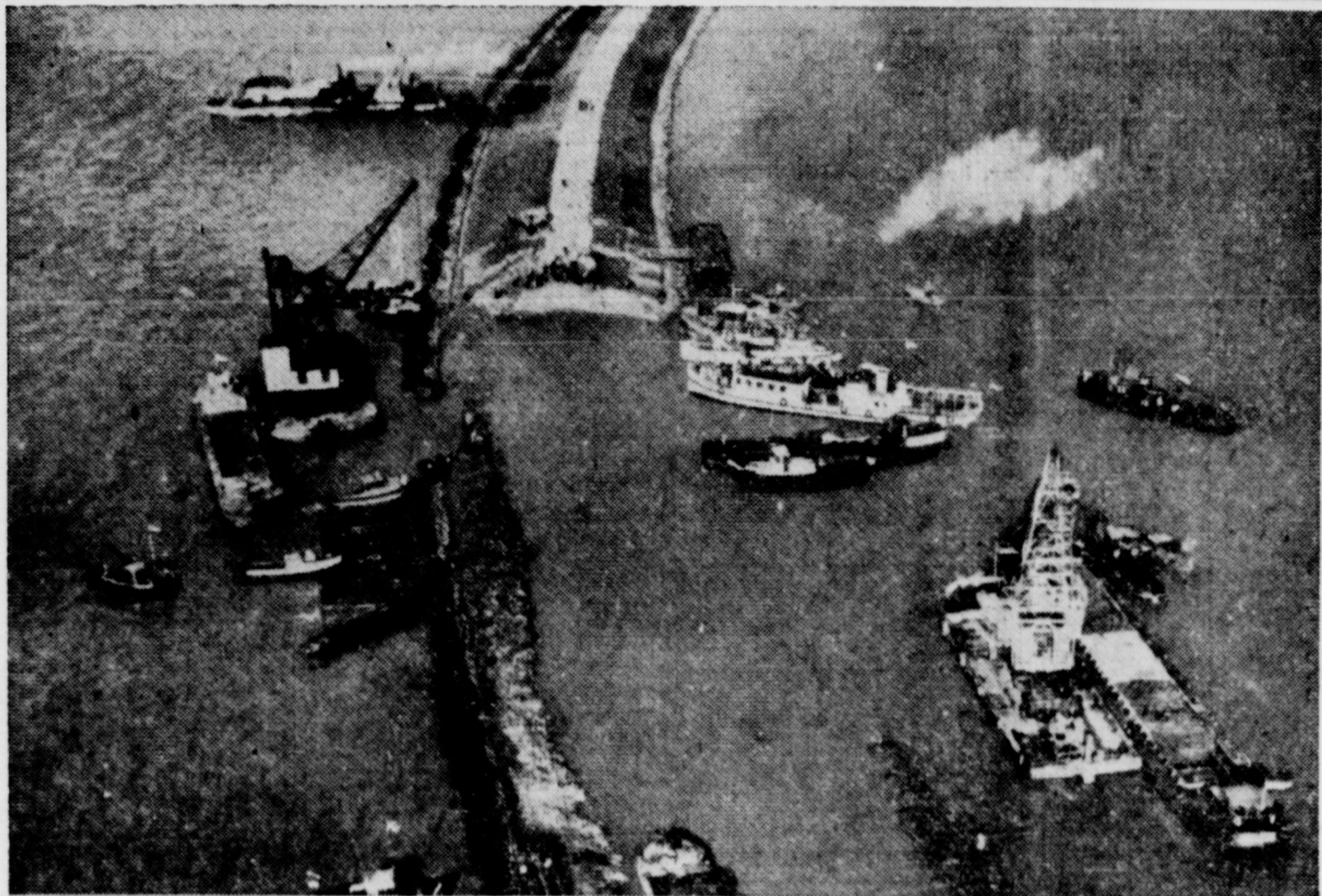

Coach Lewis said that prospects were good this season for a better team than was fielded last year. He has some seven members of last year's squad returning and some 10 to 12 top players of the area have enrolled this season. The Loboes of Cisco High School finished their contact work Wednesday as they prepared for their final game of the 1954 season Friday night when the Mineral Wells Mountaineers come to Chesley Field to battle the Loboes in a game that will decide the cellar position in District 9-AA.

Neither the Mountaineers nor the Loboes have won a conference contest during the current season. The Mountaineers have one tie in four league games played while the Loboes have suffered four losses.

Coaches Jay Williams and Charles Williams have been working the Loboes overtime this week and much of the time has been spent in hard scrimmages. Thursday was to be spent in the usual limbering up exercises and dummy scrimmages.

The Loboes will enter the contest Friday without the services of defensive Halfback Fred Hayes who is on crutches as the result of an injury received in the Weatherford game. Returning to the line this week will be Captain Arzell Hale and Guard Joe Farrow. Hale did not play in the Weatherford game and Farrow saw limited service. All other players were in playing condition. Back John Carlile is still nursing an injury and will not be suited out.

The Mountaineers are the heaviest team in the district. The overall team average is 183 pounds per man. The line averages approximately 195 pounds per position and the backs average 157. The Lobo team average is 155 pounds, with the line averaging 162 and the backs 142.

Coach Pete Roach has a veteran team filled with returning lettermen. The big line is the same that dealt opponents so much misery in the 1953 season.

Probable Mountaineer starters include Doug Ammons, Jimmy Walker, Charles Smith, Floyd Reasoner, Phillip Shewmake, Charles Garland, Jerry Eichler, Fred Scott, Harold Martin, Jack Wampler and Karl Knight.

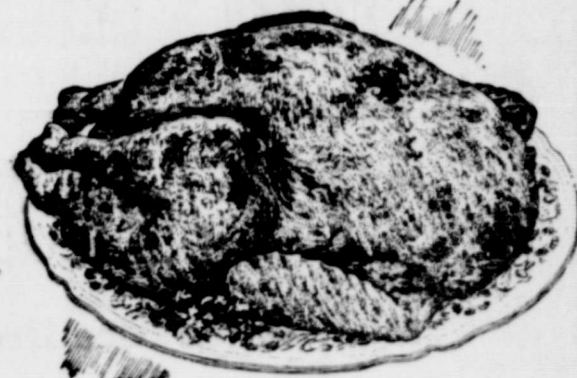
