CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE OPENS

AUSTIN, Nov. 20. — "There is a proud ghost standing beside me," Mrs. Frances Rains of Austin mused as the mail truck left the Texas Tuberculosis Association office.

Mrs. Rains is the Christmas Seal director. Today she placed in the mails over 100,000 envelopes carrying the 1954 seals to Texas homes.

She referred to the ghost of Einar Holboell, Danish post office worker who originated the penny Christmas Seal in 1904 to build a hospital for children ill of tuberculosis.

"I know just how Holboell felt when he had his great idea," Mrs. Rains said. "He saw those piles of holiday greetings and gifts pouring in and out of the post office and he wished that each one could mean just one penny toward saving the life of a child doomed by tuberculosis."

Einar Holboell saw his wish come true. This year's double Christmas Seal pictures gay, health children... a tribute to the Danish postal clerk on the fiftieth anniversary of his great gift to mankind.

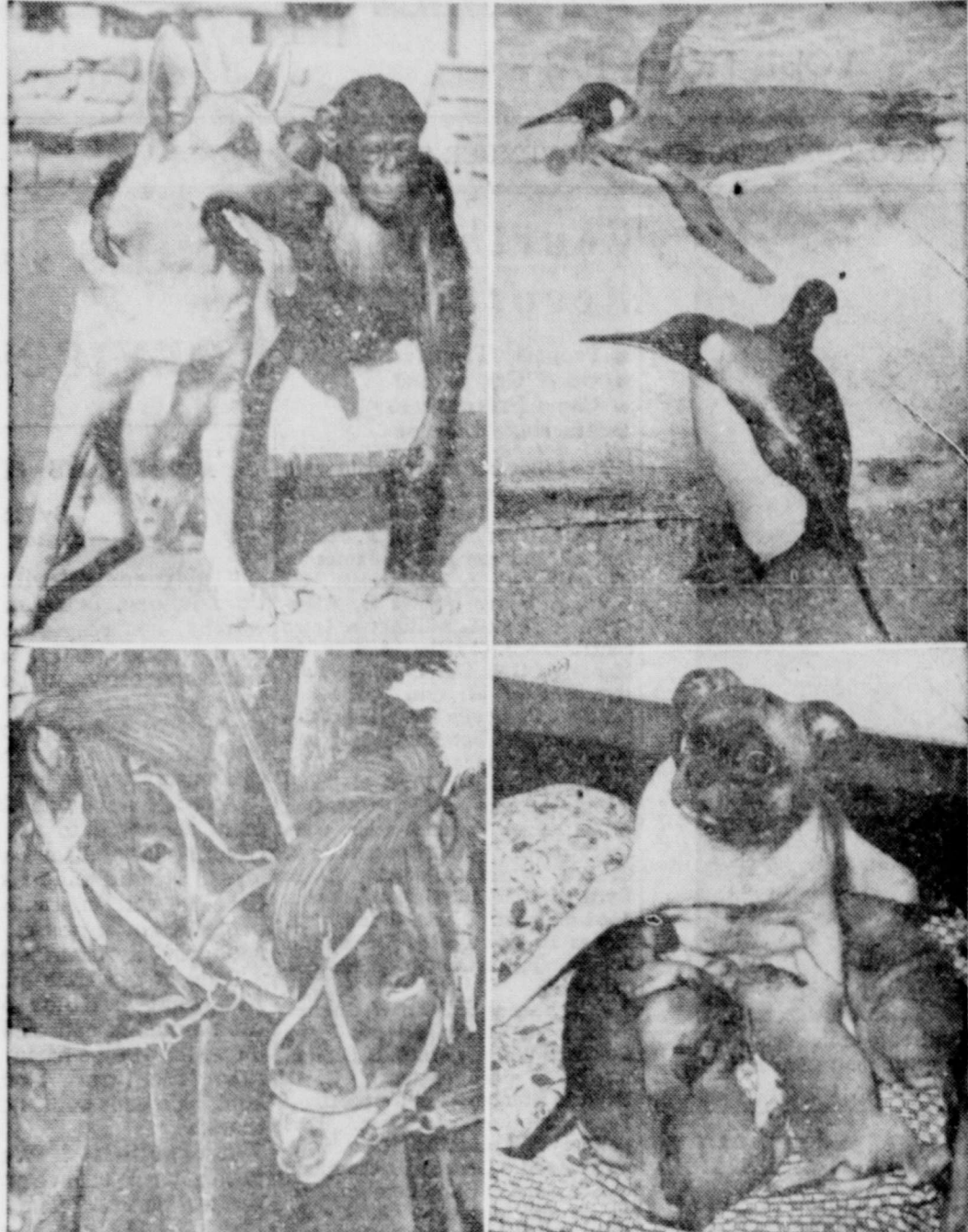
"For 50 years those little Seals have waged their fight against TB," Mrs. Rains said, "and every year they win new ground."

She watched the mail truck pull away. "One year," she said firmly, "we will see Christmas come to all our children without the blight of tuberculosis. One year we will know that no mother, no father, no child must spend Christmas in a TB hospital bed."

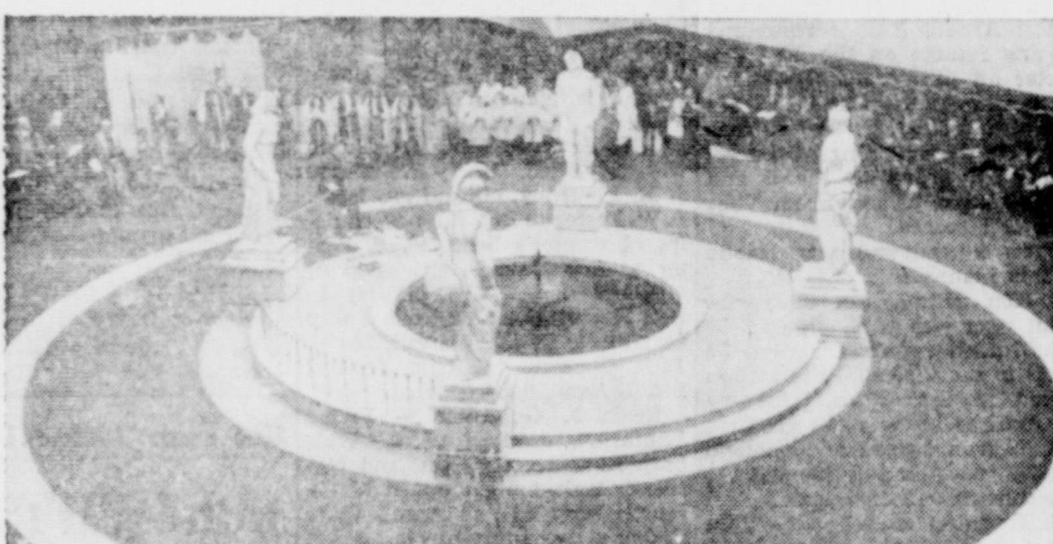

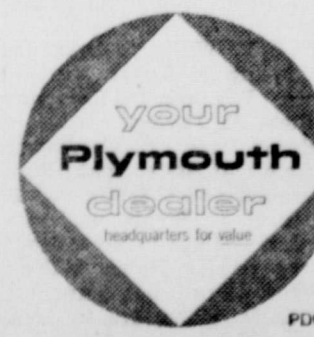

### Impatience Costs Game Hunters In Illegal Shooting

AUSTIN, Nov. 22 — Impatient big game hunters contributed most in fines and court costs in the latest arrest report issued by the Director of Law Enforcement for the Game and Fish Commission.

Several \$200 fines plus costs were levied for raids on deer herds and wild turkey flocks before the current season got underway. Night hunting trapped several.

The Director of Law Enforcement said the totals of fines and court costs for 463 cases were \$12,476.80 and \$888 respectively, for a combined sum of \$13,364.80.

The largest number of cases for a single charge was listed to hunting from an automobile, with 67 arrests. These involved mainly prosecutions during the recent mourning dove season, although there were some cases in connection with night deer hunting.

Fines of \$100 plus costs aggregated thirteen for hunting deer out of season. Similar assessments

were made in four cases for shooting wild turkey before the legal season opened.

The minimum for big game raids involved fines of \$10 on each of two counts against a Wimberly man for shooting deer out of season and for possessing deer illegally.

Violations of fishing laws also brought heavy fines. A Gulf coast man paid \$150 in fines on each of two counts for using gill nets. A Mathis man was fined \$100 and costs for netting fish in closed waters. Illegal fishing tackle resulted in more than forty Texas fishermen being fined.

Maximum fines of \$100 each plus costs were levied against a Wells man for "telephoning fish" and against a Fort Worth man for poisoning fish.

One of the more common violations involved the use of unplugged guns in hunting mourning doves. Twenty-nine such cases were filed.

Eight cases were filed against persons hunting bobwhite quail out of season. The most severe penalty on this count was \$100 plus costs levied against a Holliday man. A Plantersville man paid a total of \$165 and costs on charges of taking both quail and doves out of season. A Houston man paid only a total of \$40 plus costs on similar charges.

The Director of Law Enforcement pointed out that circumstances vary from case to case and also that some courts are more severe than others.

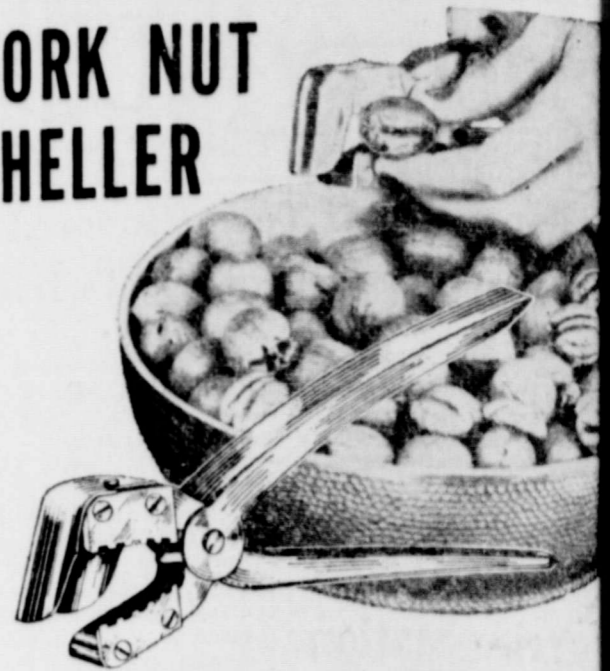

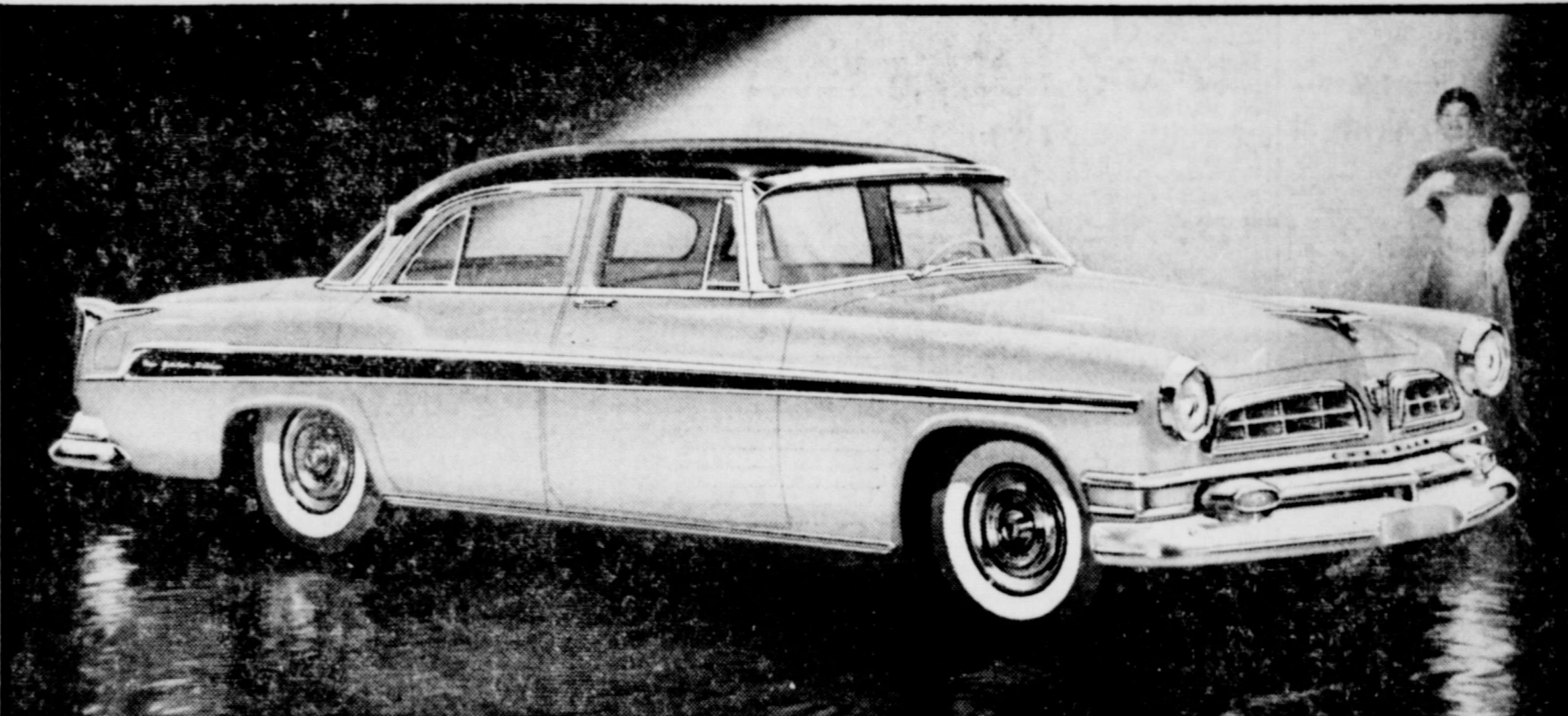
