



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Impatience Costs Game Hunters In Illegal Shooting

AUSTIN, Nov. 22. — Impatient big game hunters contributed most in fines and court costs in the latest arrest report issued by the Director of Law Enforcement for the Game and Fish Commis-

Several \$200 fines plus costs were levied for raids on deer herds and wild turkey flocks before the current season got under-Night hunting trapped sev-

The Director of Law Enforcement said the totals of fines and court costs for 463 cases were \$12,-476.80 and \$888 respectively, for a combined sum of \$13,364.80.

The largest number of cases for a single charge was listed to nunting from an automobile, with 67 arrests. These involved mainly prosecutions during the recent mourning dove season, although there were some cases in connection with night deer hunting.

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
