The commission expects to study the matter for a few weeks before taking action, the mayor said.

Mr. Rosenthal reported to the commission that plans for refinancing the city's bonded debt, in order that arrangements might be worked out to finance the proposed Battle Creek water project, are meeting wide approval. He said that numerous citizens had endorsed the idea "and nobody has voiced disapproval to me."

Over forty of their band lay under the sod. With every foe to beset them - sickness, poverty, enemies - they came aside from the care of the world to express their thanks to a loving God.

Many times it takes years of failure and heartache to make us realize our relationship to God. It is not true that in our day, after we have passed through the storm of trial or trouble, we find ourselves expressing our gratitude to God for the strength He has provided.

Do not forget that every good and perfect gift comes from above. Do not take for granted the health you have, the material blessings that have come your way, and the spiritual blessings that do come when you submit yourself to God.

Just so much as a parent longs to hear a little child say "thank you," our God patiently waits to hear you express your thanks unto Him for the blessings of life. Are you trying to think of the things that you could thank God for this Thanksgiving? Marvel McEwen has opened the eyes of many as they have read his poem, "Thanks-Giving."

For a glimpse of the moon through fleecy clouds,

City, county and federal offices have announced plans to be closed all day Thursday, and Thanksgiving is one of the six holidays planned for observance by the business firms.

The annual union religious service for Thanksgiving will be held early this year for the benefit of many who expect to be away. The services will be at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday (tonight) at the First Methodist Church.

The Rev. Lawrence Bryan, pastor of Wesley Methodist Church, will deliver the Thanksgiving sermon. The invocation will be offered by the Rev. Sidney Spain, pastor of the First Christian Church, and L. A. Warren, layman, will give the benediction.

Jack Chambliss, head of the music department of Cisco Junior College, will direct a choir of voices from the various cooperating churches in the singing of the anthem, "Praise We Sing to Thee," by Hadyn. The public has been invited to attend the services.

Schools, including Cisco Junior College, will not hold classes Thursday and Friday, resuming the regular schedules Monday. The Daily Press will omit its regular Thursday edition in order that its employees might join in the Thanksgiving observance.

## Cisco Methodist Leader Attends Chicago Meeting

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 23.—The Rev. Leslie W. Seymour, superintendent of the Cisco district, and Mrs. Seymour, are among the 573 Methodist district superintendents and hundreds of visitors who are in the fifth national meeting of the superintendents, Nov. 22-24.

Purpose of the session, opening Monday morning at the Palmer House, is to review major program areas in the church and to plan further achievement.

Highlight for Monday was the reported \$1,487,000 raised from the Bishops' Appeal for Korea. About 10 per cent of the churches are yet to report. At the conclusion of his address, Bishop H. J. Lew, Korea, presented each district superintendent with a message of gratitude for the response of the churches to the appeal for help. The Honorable You Chan Yang, Ambassador from Korea, bestowed honorary citizenship upon each of the 37 bishops.

"We can't have security in any part of the world until we have security in all parts of the world," said Bishop William C. Martin of Dallas. "All roads are two-way roads. They take ideas in and bring ideas out."

Bishop A. Frank Smith of Houston presided at a conference breakfast Tuesday morning, in the interest of National Missions.

Dramatic presentation of "Our Great Commission," featuring the program of Methodist World Service prepared by Mrs. Howard Grimes of Dallas, was also given Tuesday morning.

Bishop Martin presided at a luncheon Tuesday featuring plans for the enlargement of the television ministry of the church. Native Texan, Bishop Paul E. Martin will preside over Tuesday evening's program centering on the church's ministry to youth.

The conference was to close Wednesday noon.

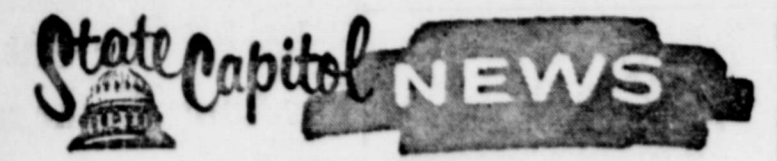

Howard Payne To Meet ACC Eleven On Thanksgiving

BROWNWOOD — Abilene Christian College, traditional foe on the Yellow Jacket grid schedule, will provide the opposition again this year as Howard Payne College polishes off a successful (eight victories out of nine attempts, so far) '34 season with the annual Thanksgiving encounter in Abilene Nov. 25.

The ACC Wildcats, as usual, will be out to ruin the climax of the Howard Payne season, but the Stingers should be a great deal stronger than they were when they bowed, 34-6, last year before a homecoming crowd here. Things should be a little different, since HPC recently copped the Texas Conference crown.

This season's Yellow Jacket gridgers have made some new records for the HPC athletic books. They have turned into one of the highest scoring machines in the recent history of the institution. The 244 points in nine games is the highest output of a Howard Payne team since 1923, when that good crew pounded 295 points in eleven games. The Stringers' victory over Sul Ross Saturday a week ago marked the first time since 1941 a Howard Payne grid team has managed that many victories in a single season.

In Wildcat territory this year, there are 25 returning lettermen. The line will be husky and experienced, and the backfield will be talented and fast with enough weight to add power. The big feature on the offense for the Purple bunch is the Leendous Fry to Von Morgan pass combination which spelled so much trouble for HPC last year.

This Thanksgiving Day match will likely be the toughest test of the year for the stalwart Yellow Jacket defense, and a rugged 'Cat defense will also be a stern undertaking for the Stinger backfield crew.

Recently voted amendments part of the constitution have been issued by Governor Allan Shivers and Secretary of State C. E. Fulgham. Amendments provide for women jurors, higher pay for members of the Legislature, longer terms for some public officials, and increased pensions for the aged.

There is talk here of a suit by some members of the Legislature to test the attorney general's ruling made prior to the election, that the public officials amendment did not extend Legislator's terms to four years.

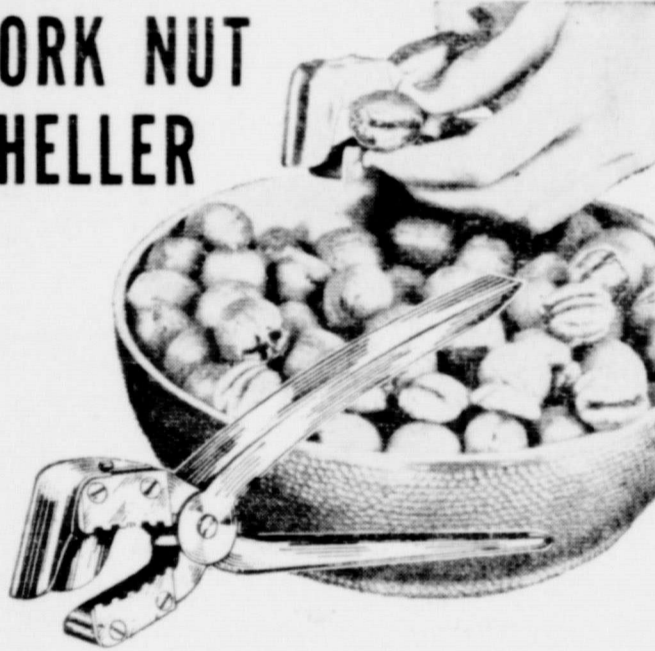

Noted Landscape Architect Speaks At Meeting Of Cisco Garden Club

Mrs. Bessie K. Johnson, airport landscape architect and historian, was the guest speaker at a meeting of the Cisco Garden Club held Saturday afternoon at the community conference room of the First National Bank.

Mrs. Johnson, sponsored by the Pan American World Airlines, Mexicana De Aviacion, came to Cisco direct from San Salvador where she has been for a four day tour. She has lived in Mexico for 45 years and is a member of the Mexico City Garden Club and a charter member of the Brownsville Garden Club, where she also has a home. She landscapes all the airports throughout Mexico and goes on goodwill tours everywhere. She has a list of 41 complete lectures, each different, available for club programs, including 400 slides and a large collection of regional costumes, for which Mexico City is constructing a museum to display the collection.

In her lecture to the group on "Spanish American Gardens," Mrs. Johnson said that if most of the tropical plants grown here are protected for the first three years, by that time they will have

a good root system, then if a hard cold spell freezes them to the ground they will come back.

"All of Latin America is a garden," said Mrs. Johnson. "The Bougainville, which so many Americans admire in Mexico, originally came from Brazil," she said. In Mexico the successful gardener has a "good hand" instead of a "Green Thumb."

Mrs. Johnson said that when the Spaniards conquered Mexico, they imposed a new type of town upon the Aztec Indians. The principal buildings were grouped around a "plaza" or central square. The Aztecs started the floating gardens in Mexico. The huge straight upright poplar-looking trees at Xochimilco are the Male Willow. As the Aztecs grew in power they planted gardens in the city on their flat roofs. The flowers and vines hung from the roof tops.

Mrs. Johnson is working with the government to restore Montezuma original garden forty miles from the city. "All the tree roses today are grafted on the castellean rose stock brought over by the Franks from Spain. They also brought the olive trees, most of which have vanished. The geraniums came from Africa. Long ago the natives of Morocco made channels from the fountain in the patio leading through the bedrooms of their homes. It had a cooling effect, more from a psychological standpoint than actually cooling the temperature. The idea of the fountains went to Mexico along with the patio," said Mrs. Johnson.

Mrs. Johnson said that this year Mexico has a "bumper crop" of coffee and that if proper arrangements could be made, they have more than enough to supply America.

"Tin cans hung from a wire or rope on either end of a stick, carried across the shoulders of the gardener, supplies most of the water for the Mexican gardens. Even now, in out-of-the-way places, this is the sprinkling system. Another ancient garden tool was a grass cutter, made from the three-quarter open lid of a herring can flattened to make snippers. The colonial people of Spain made great wealth and built homes outside of Mexico City. A few are left today which have been opened recently to those making the Garden Pilgrimage to Mexico," said Mrs. Johnson.

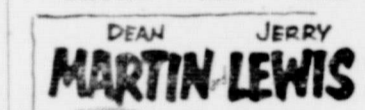

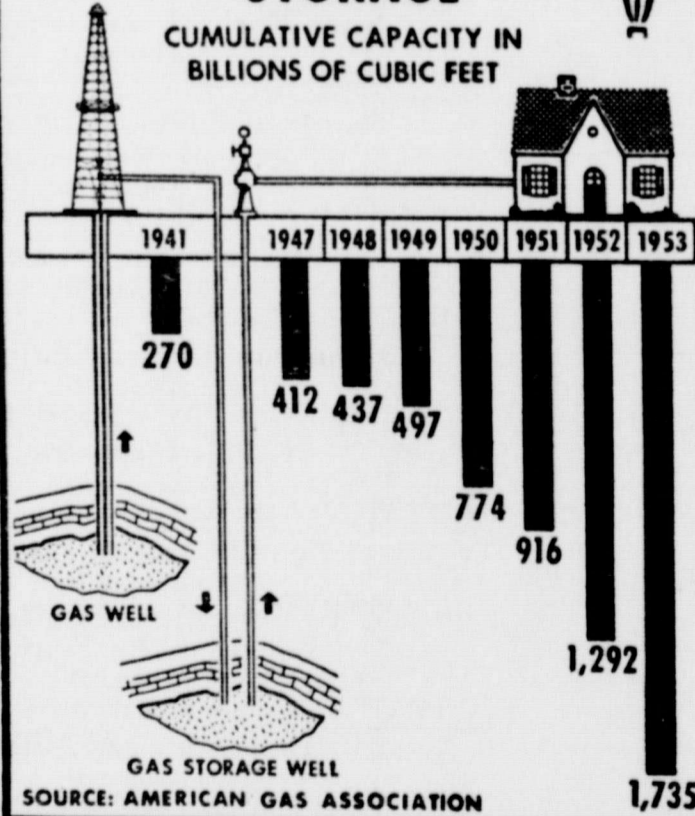
