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DON'T BLAME UNIVAC

What happened to Univac is symbolic of the election. This fabulous electronic device can instantly solve extremely complex mathematical problems. It given certain basic information, it will make detailed forecasts of events, and in some instances these have been astonishingly accurate. Yet when, on the basis of early returns, Univac was asked to predict the final outcome it missed

The failure of this and other techniques for predicting the unknown caused Dorothy Thompson to write a jubilant column. "Human thoughts, reactions, responses, feelings, desires and choices are not measurable with scientific exactitude," she wrote. "The political future is not pre-determined. Free will still prevails. Univac is fallible. Goody, goody!"

Miss Thompson also said that the votes indicate there will be "a peaceful working relationship between the parties; progress without radicalism; and strength without hysteria." That view seems to be held by most of the more objective writers and commentators. The Democrats won Congress, it is true. But there was no landslide — indeed, their gains were well under the figure that is usual for the "outs" in an off-year election. And there is no such thing as a clear Democratic party program, any more than there is a clear Republican party program. Both parties contain legislators and governors who have little more in common than the party label.

The election certainly proved that there are fewer and fewer "straight ticket" voters. The individual, rather than the party designation, is now the big thing. That accounts for the fact that voters elected Republican governors at the same time they elected Democratic Senators and Representatives, and vice versa.

Will the change in Congressional control mean important changes in the course of government now? In all probability, it will not. Some of the Democratic winners actually seem to favor more of the Eisenhower program than did some defeated Republicans. The new leaders, particularly in the Senate, will largely be conservative Southern Democrats. To take a salient example, Senator Byrd of Virginia will head the potent Finance Committee — and there is no man in Congress who is more passionately dedicated to the goal of rigid economy in government, a balanced budget, and a pay-as-you-go fiscal policy.

Finally, this election certainly demonstrated how important an individual vote is. In three Senate races, the winner's margin was less than one-half of one percent of the vote cast. In several others it was only slightly larger.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

What is a "Government of law?" Most of us run across this phrase from time to time, but few stop to think what it means. It has a special significance and is extremely important to each of us as an American citizen.

The implications of the term are broad, but its basic definition is simple: Because legal controversies must be tried and determined in our courts on established and recognized public standards of right and wrong, we call ours

a government of law — as distinguished from a government of men.

If judges and juries were not bound by law and precedents — if in each lawsuit, the judge or juror could set up a private standard of rights and duties as a basis for deciding that case — we would have a government of men. No one would know in advance of the decision how he should have acted in a particular situation. Cases arising out of similar circumstances would not be decided on settled principles but on the personal ideas of the trial judge or juror.

Judges get the law by which they decide the legal questions arising in a lawsuit from three sources: federal and state constitutions; federal and state statutes; and from previous judicial decisions and legal writings. Previous decisions state the public standards of rights and duties in matters not covered by constitutions and statutes.

Judges have access to these statements of the law and know which apply to the situation involved in any lawsuit. So that justice may be done according to the law, it is imperative that the jurors in each case accept the law as the judge gives it to them. They are therefore required to base their verdict on his instructions as to the law, rather than on their own notions of what the law is, or ought to be.

For somewhat similar reasons there are rules governing the way a case is to be tried in court. These rules prescribe what must be stated in the pleadings, in what order evidence must be presented.

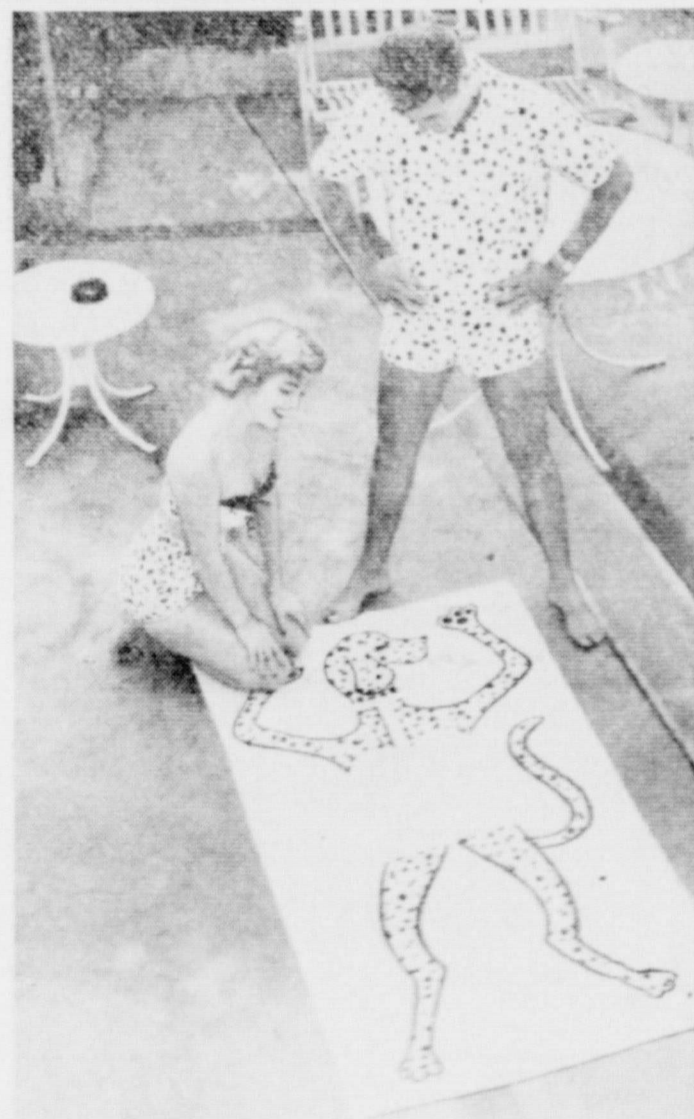

The whole purpose of laws and rules is to insure equal justice by providing a single standard of rights and duties, applicable to all persons similarly situated. This is what we should remember when we hear or read the phrase, "Government of Law."

High Standard Of Health Seen As Big Civic Asset

AUSTIN, Nov. 25. — "A high standard of community health is the best asset that a state can possess," said Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, in speaking of the progress made in public health education since the first Thanksgiving Day was observed by our forefathers.

"The State of Texas has much to be thankful for this year," he said, "in the steadily increasing interest and cooperation of the people of the State in matters pertaining to their health."

"The control of the water and milk supplies, sewage disposal, vaccination against smallpox, immunization against diphtheria and whooping cough, food inspection, housing regulations, and many other measures have been spectacularly successful in reducing the killing power of a number of maladies that formerly took a terrific annual toll.

"Responsibility for success and advancement of a public health program lies not only with the health department, but also with the people who support and encourage the community effort put forth and who apply in their own individual lives the knowledge which they have acquired.

"The individual citizen, to reap the benefits of good health must be more concerned about his own well-being than he is today. His program should involve a conscientious effort to abide by the simple rules of healthful and rational living.

"In short, when the private citizen fully appreciates the importance of good health practice on his part, he will greatly enhance the efforts of medicine, surgery, and public health in his behalf.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — I am studying carpentry in a trade school under the Korean GI Bill. I would like to shift to on-the-job training, also in carpentry. Would that be considered my one-and-only change of course, since I still would be training in carpentry?

A — Yes. The switch would be considered your change of course, even though your objective remains the same. The reason is that course content and instructional method differ so materially between classroom and job training that the two types of training could not conceivably be considered the same course.

Q — I have just been separated from service, and I want to apply for Korean GI insurance. But I don't want to forfeit the free coverage that I have for 120 days following my separation. Should I wait until the end of that period before I apply?

A — No. It is better to apply early. The effective date of your Korean GI insurance need not necessarily be the date you apply. You can specify that the insurance become effective on the last day of your 120-day free coverage.

Q — I spent four years as a cadet in the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. Will that time count, in computing my eligibility for Korean GI Bill training?

A — No. Under the law, time spent as a cadet or midshipman in a service academy may not be counted in computing Korean GI Bill training eligibility.
