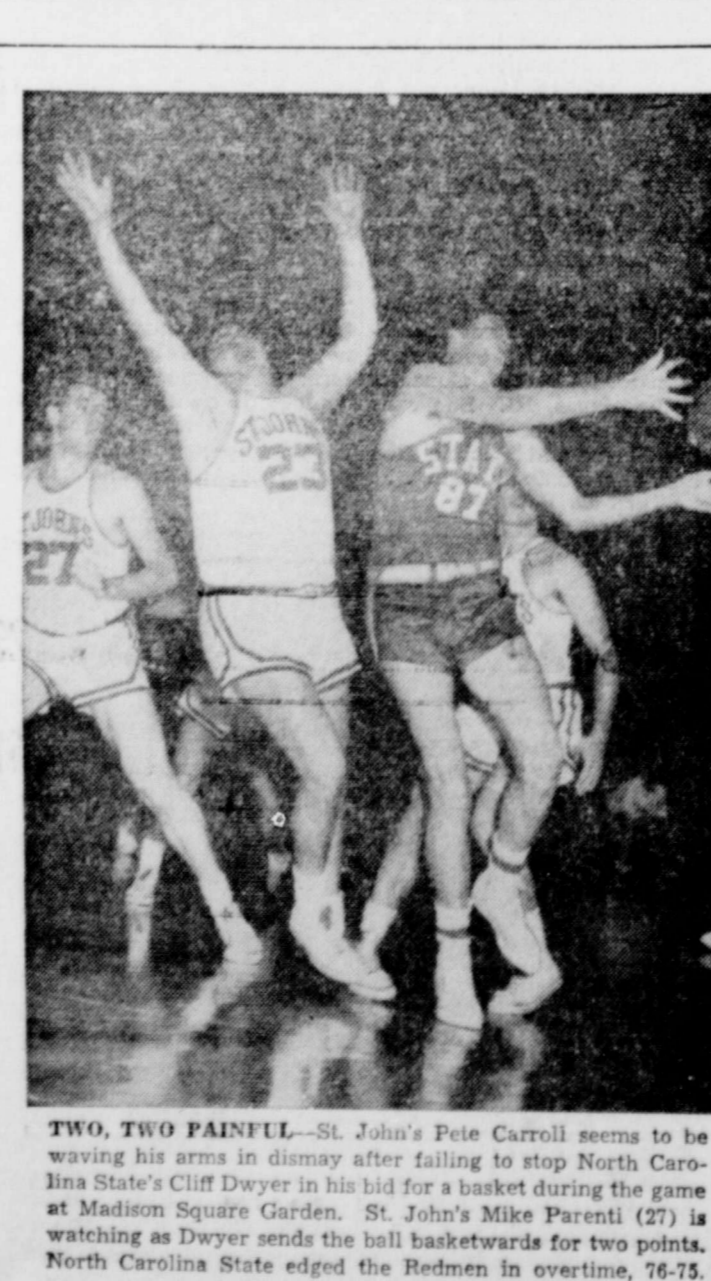

### Mrs. Prange Presents Paper On Geraniums At Garden Club Meet

A paper on "Geraniums" was presented by Mrs. Dorothy Prange at the monthly meeting of the Cisco Garden Club held Monday afternoon at the Federated Club House.

Mrs. Prange, in giving her paper, had an exhibit of the varieties of Geraniums and discussed their blooming habits. She said she always takes cuttings from her hardy-wood varieties before frost, roots them in sand indoors, and transplants them to the yard in the spring, however, some prefer to root the old plants indoors and start the cut-

tings in the spring when they can be set out directly in the yard.

Mrs. Prange stated that the first step in starting new geraniums from cuttings is to clip off the bloom stalks on the plant or plants you select for parent stock. Cut or break off a portion from the top, usually four or five inches, to a section of the young stem growth that is sufficiently hard and woody to root well. Make the cut between leaves, slightly below the point at which leaf stem is attached. You're likely to have difficulty with rotting if you cut the stems much closer to the tip where the tissue is soft.

"Leave a few leaves on the top but remove the leaves on the lower part of the stems so you can insert them easily into rooting medium. Cut leaves off close to the stem and as a precaution against having your cutting rot, let them dry on the table for an hour or more. As an added precaution, strip off short leaf scales that hug stems. Have a container that is always used well rotted leaf mold. Some authorities recommend 2 parts garden loam, 1 part sand, and 1 part leafmold.

rect sun, roots will form in several weeks. Keep the sand moist at all times, but never soaked," said Mrs. Prange.

Mrs. Prange said she places her cuttings in a medium of sand and old chicken manure while Mrs. J. C. Leveridge stated that she always uses well rotted leaf mold.

"Geraniums thrive best when they have free circulation of air and temperature of 65 or 70 degrees during the day, with a drop to 60 degrees at night. When the soil feels dry to touch, water the plants thoroughly, using tepid rather than cold water. Turn the flowers periodically to give all sides direct sunlight. When grown indoors they like a sunny window. In this climate, because of extreme summer heat, a location should be selected outside for them where they will receive the afternoon shade," she said.

Mrs. Prange stated that a great deal of interest is now being

shown in the Fancyleaf Geraniums. She said they were so colorful that beautiful corsages can now be made entirely from the leaves. A few of the fancyleaf varieties are Black Vesuvius, Flower of Spring, Mrs. Pollock, Skies of Italy, Mrs. Cox, and Mrs. Parker.

Mrs. Prange presented each member of the club with one of her rooted geranium cuttings and Mrs. O. M. Evans won the door prize.

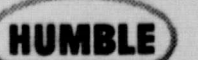

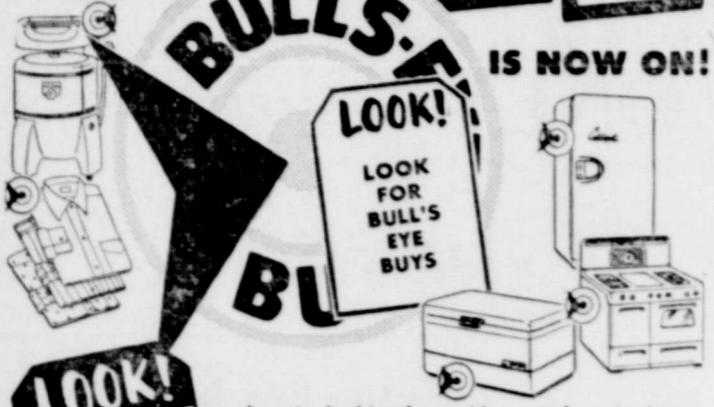
