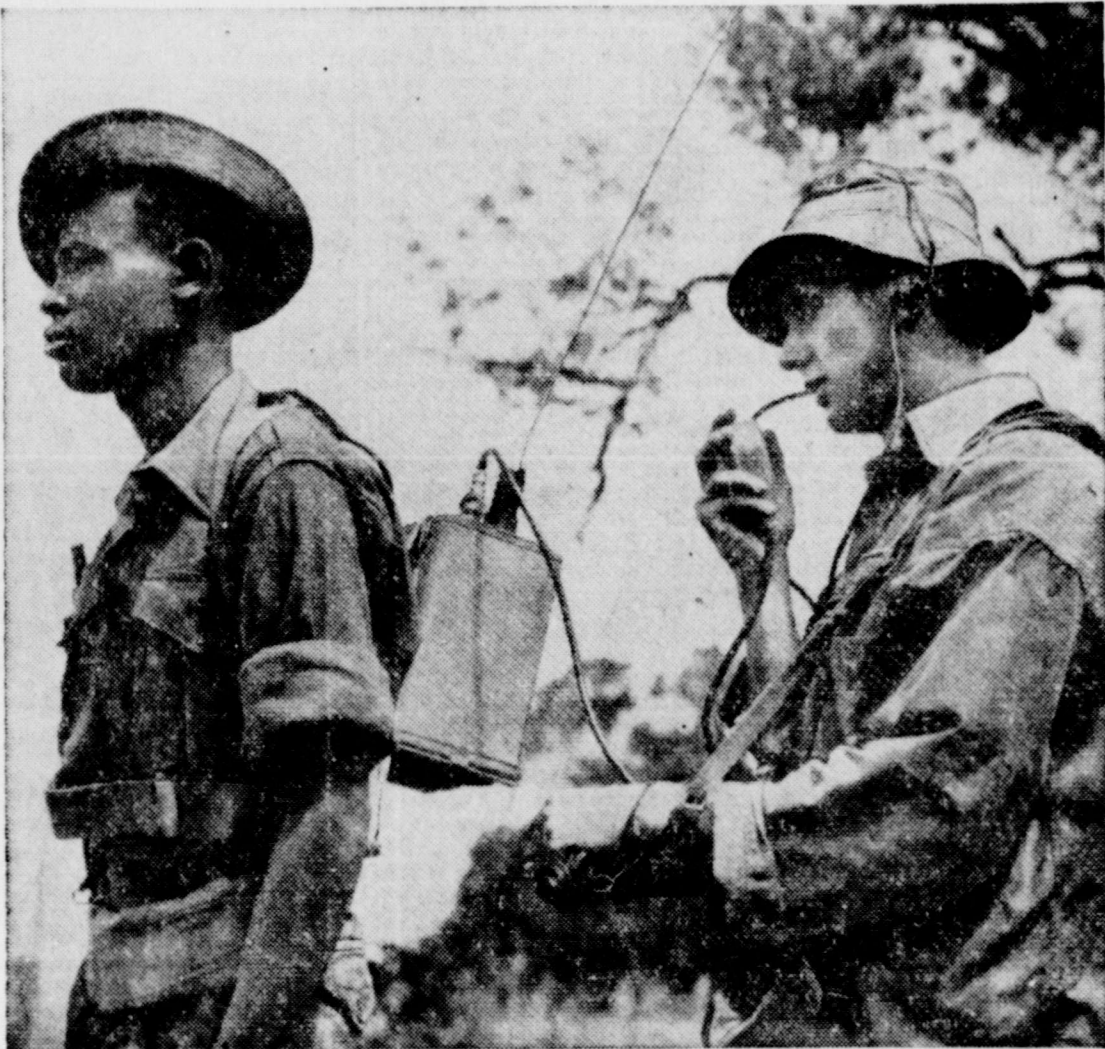

PATSY NANCE IS HOME AFTER TREATMENT AT WARM SPRINGS

GONZALES, Jan. 31. — Miss Patsy Nance of Cisco, Texas, recently a patient at Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, has returned home after having been discharged from that Texas Physical Therapy Treatment Center on January 21, 1955. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. R. Nance of 808 Front Street, Cisco, Texas.

Miss Nance was recently referred to the Gonzales specialty hospital by her physician for a program of rehabilitation following an injury sustained in a car wreck on November 28, 1947. She was admitted November 1, 1954.

While a patient at the hospital, Miss Nance underwent an extensive series of treatments and has made considerable progress in her fight to regain the use of her limbs. A program of treatment has been set up for Miss Nance's use while she is at home.

The Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation opened its first building in 1941 with a 16-bed capacity. It now has six units and upon completion of remodeling that is now in progress, there will be facilities available to accommodate 140 patients. All this has been made possible through the support of generous Texans.

Novice Trophy Is Won By Fighters

Six members of the eight-man Cisco Boxing Team, who were entered in the Regional Golden Gloves Tournament Monday, went to the finals in the various divisions, won four championships, took two runner-up posts and brought home the team trophy in the novice division.

Representatives of the Cisco team taking regional championships were Randy Reynolds, Don Slatton, Bruce Stovall and Howard Hamilton. Fighters taking runner-up honors were Max Brown and George Gilgo. The two other members of the team lost their opening rounds. They were Robert Bell and Billy Joe Hawk.

Randy Reynolds, 270 pound Cisco Junior College heavyweight, won the heavy title in the open division by soundly beating four-time regional champ, Lacy Boles of Abilene. The veteran Boles was unable to get in a good lick until the third round when Reynolds tired. The bout was awarded to Reynolds on a unanimous decision. Reynolds will represent the region in the state tournament in Fort Worth.

Slatton, Stovall and Hamilton won championships in the novice division. Slatton won the light heavy crown when he defeated a veteran crowd when he defeated a teammate, George Gilgo, in the finals. That bout was held Saturday night. Stovall was awarded the novice heavy title and Hamilton won the welterweight title by defeating Paul Burt of Knox City in the finals Monday night. He won on unanimous decision.

Max Brown, fighting in the bantamweight division, lost a close three round decision to Royce Carter of Colorado City, veteran gloves fighter, to take the runner-up honor and help his team win the novice trophy. Gilgo was the other runner-up.

Some 12 or 13 members of Coach Louis Goodwin's Cisco boxing team are entered in the regional tournament in Brownwood which begins Thursday night. High School and novice fighters are permitted to enter more than one tourney. Open division winners cannot enter more than one.

Fighters who will enter the Brownwood affair are Max Brown, Billy Whaley, Buck Whitehead, Howard Hamilton, W. T. Donham, Tommy Reynolds, Bob Bell, Freddy Anderson, Billy Joe Hawk, Don Slatton, George Gilgo, Bruce Stovall and C. A. Wheat.

Brown, Whaley, Whitehead, Hamilton, Reynolds, Bell and Anderson will fight in the novice division while the remaining fighters will either enter the college novice or open division. The college novice division was added this year to the Brownwood tourney, and is open to boxers enrolled in colleges who have never fought in open bouts.

The winners in the Abilene tourney were awarded trophies and the runners-up were awarded Golden Gloves emblems.

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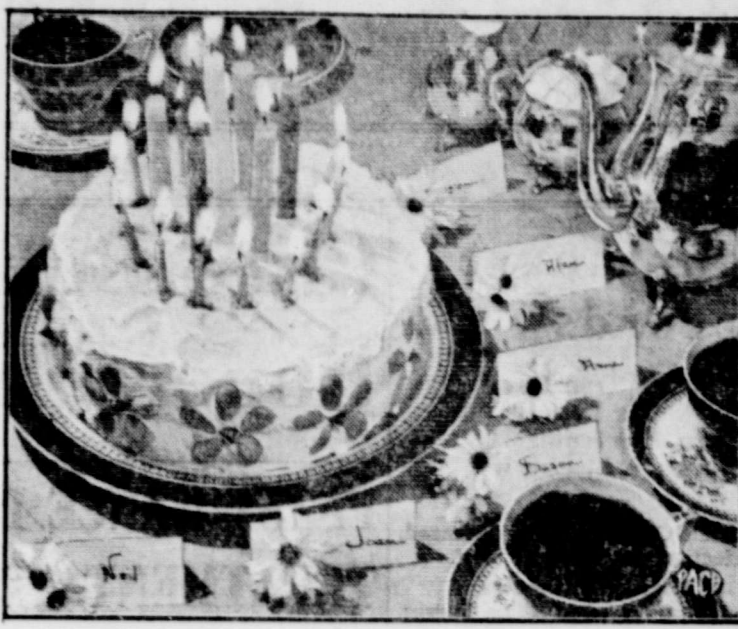

or consumption of seeds during the 1954-55 season. But the higher level of seed prices and smaller supplies of a number of seeds than in 1953 may tend to decrease the utilization of seeds for hay and pasture.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q - If I enter the armed forces some time before the end of January, 1955, will I be entitled to a GI loan when I get out - even though Korea veterans' benefit entitlements come to an end January 31, 1955.

A - Yes, provided you receive a separation under other-than-dishonorable conditions and spend at least 90 days on active duty, unless you are discharged sooner for a line-of-duty disability.

Q - Does the President's proclamation, ending Korean GI benefits entitlements on January 31, have any bearing on when a Korea veteran has to start training under the Korean GI Bill?

A - Under the law a veteran still must begin Korean GI Bill training within three years following his separation from the armed forces.

Q - Has the President's proclamation set a deadline on GI loans for post-Korea veterans?

A - Yes. As a result of the proclamation, January 31, 1955, has been set as the end of the GI loan program for eligible post-Korea veterans.

Q - I have been receiving monthly income benefits, paid on account of the total disability income provision of my World War II GI insurance policy. Do these payments reduce the face value of my policy?

A - No. The disability payments you are receiving do not reduce the face value of your policy because you have been paying an extra premium for disability protection.

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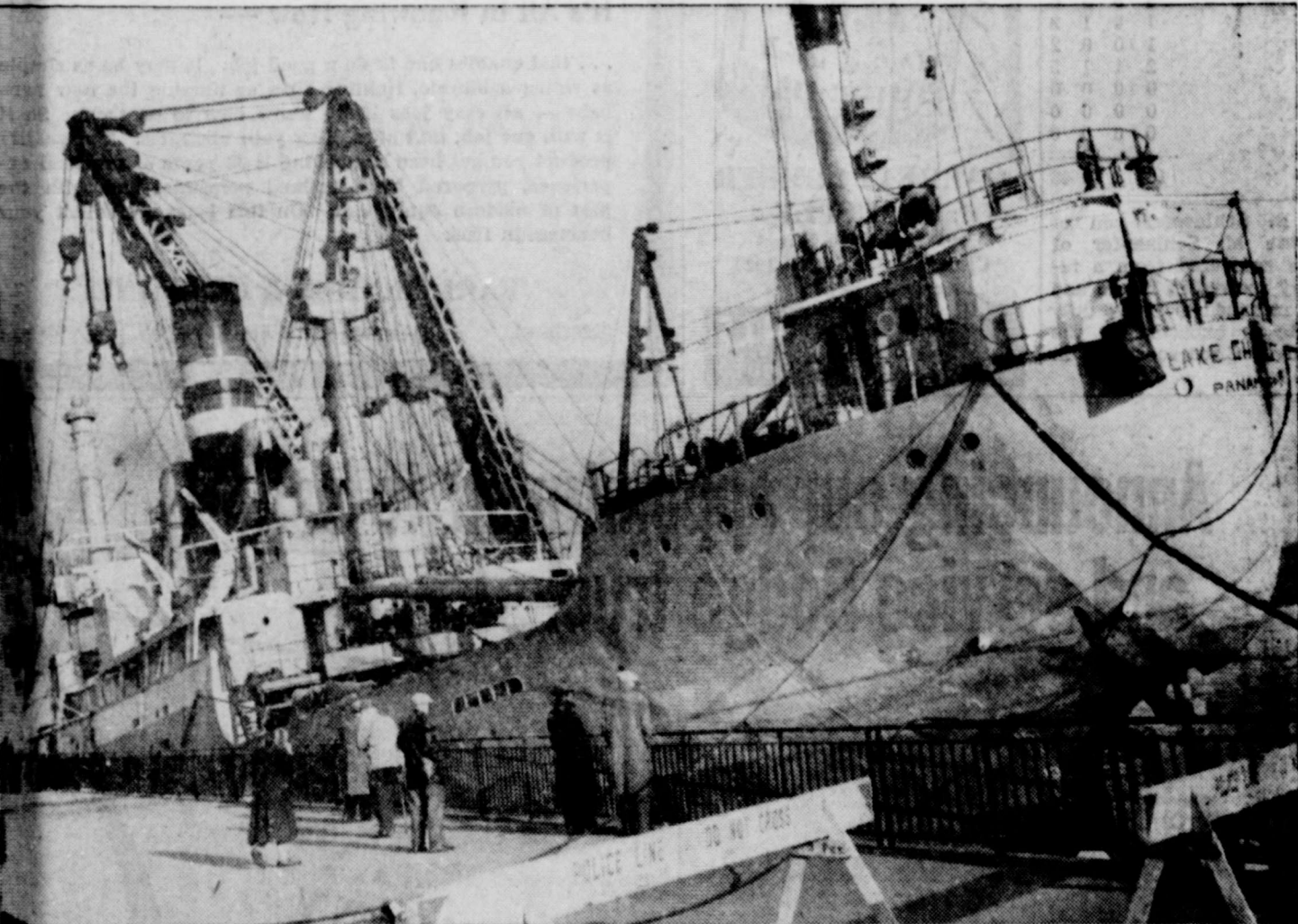

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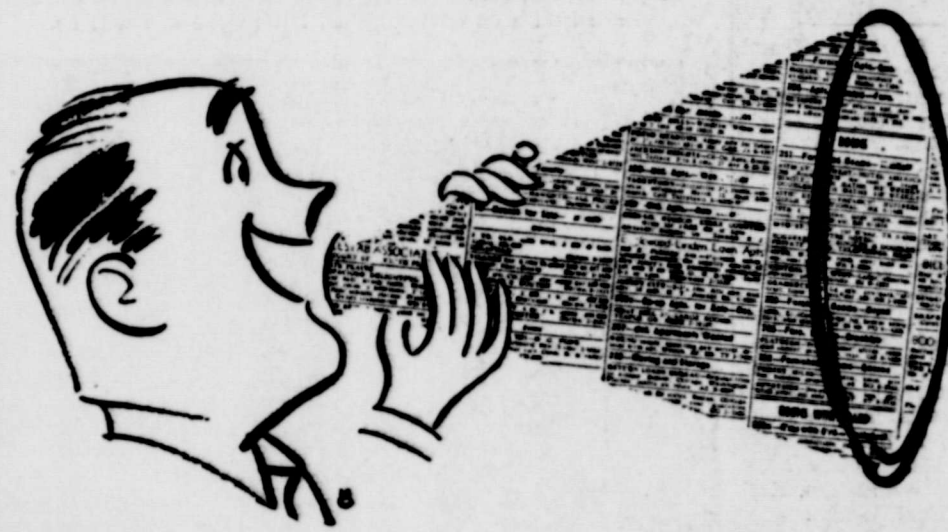
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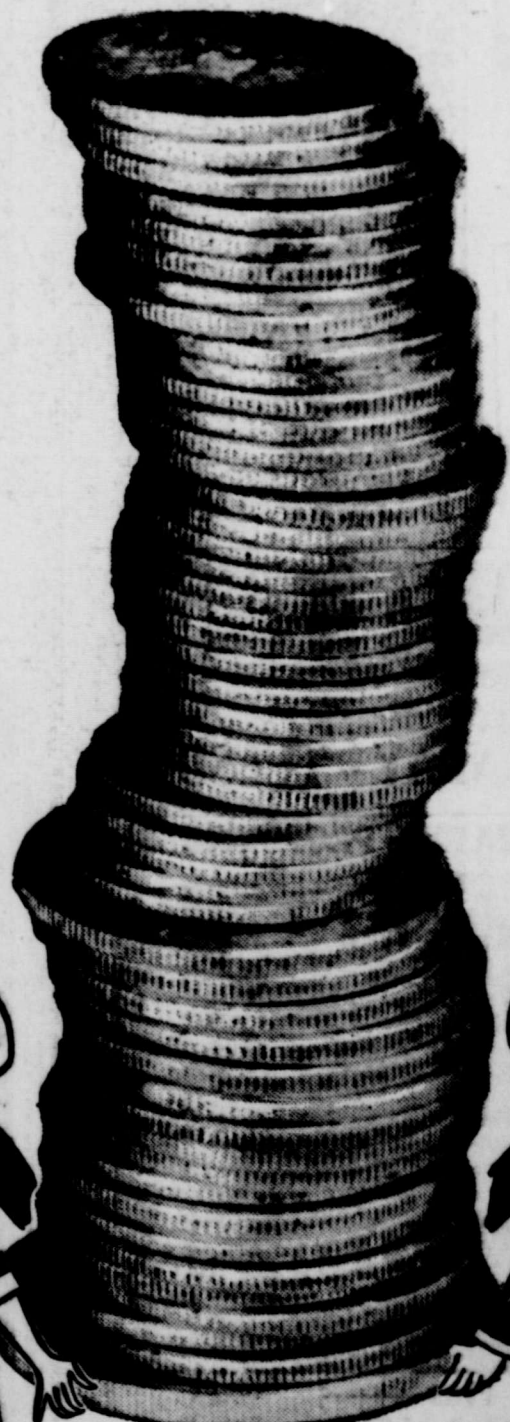
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
