EL Rancho Townsley now has a total of 48 chincillas. They've sold and traded a number of animals since starting in the business some three years ago.

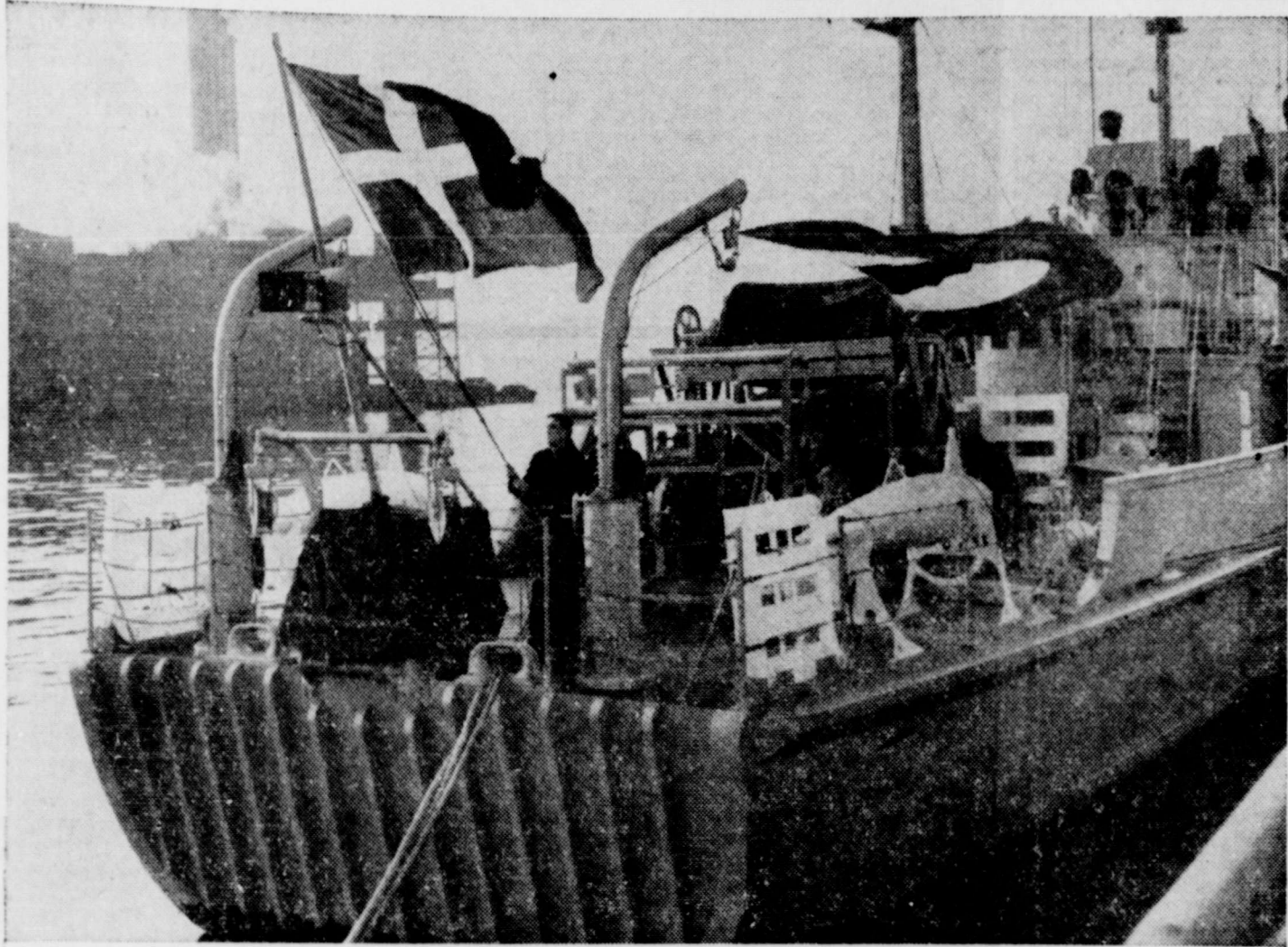

Slight Increase Is Reported For Milk Production

DALLAS, Feb. 12. - Reports from eleven handlers regulated under the Central West Texas milk marketing order showed an increase of 5.1 percent in average daily receipts of milk from producers during January as compared with December, Byford W. Bain, Market Administrator announced today.

During the month of January there were 719 Grade A milk producers supplying the Central West Texas market which is a decrease of 6 producers from the previous month and 18 producers less than were on the market during January 1954.

The average daily Class I sales (whole milk, skim milk, buttermilk, flavored milk, and cream) showed a slight decrease (.06 percent) during January as compared with December.

The minimum uniform price to producers for January deliveries was \$5.96 per hundredweight of 4.0 percent milk f.o.b. handlers' plants, Abilene, San Angelo, Stamford, and Sweetwater, Texas.

Game Agency Reports Interest Is Keen In Quail Improvement Plans

AUSTIN, Feb. 12. — The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said Texans are showing "unprecedented interest" in literature dealing with quail habitat improvement. He said reaction to offers of illustrated data describing bobwhite habitat requirements has provided "the most concentrated response to information dealing with wildlife management" during his tenure of office with the Commission. The demonstration, touched off by new Commission efforts to aid landowners and hunters to restore habitat, concerns material based on the long-time observations of Dan Lay of Buna, wildlife biologist in East Texas, who has been heading up efforts to counter the depleting effects of land clearing and drought on the quail population. Results of the Lay research were publicized as a means of direct aid to Texans personally interested in providing cover and food which are the greatest current need for bobwhites. Lay contends this is particularly true in the case of quail which are such prolific breeders. A typical recent inquiry came from J. L. Jordan of Beaumont who wrote: "My brother-in-law and I have a 1400 acre ranch in Trinity County and are very much interested in improving quail habitat." Shelby Fox of Temple said, "several of us are interested in this (habitat restoration) field." W. C. Peyton of Longview wrote: "We have a small group of fellows who have a chance to secure some 2,000 acres of East Texas farm and pasture land on which we want to try to raise some extra quail." R. A. Hulcy of Tennessee Colony wrote: "Our bird supply has been good until these last few dry years and it occurs to me we might have done something to help them survive the drought if our knowledge had been greater." Knox T. Johnson wrote from Albuquerque, New Mexico, that he is heading back to East Texas and intends to improve "some depleted hunting grounds." E. O. Moore messaged from Arlington that he wants the literature to inform himself and to share it with a son stationed with the U. S. Navy in Japan, who is interested in game management there. E. M. Agrelus of Longview wrote: "We are leasing 2,000 acres of land to stock with quail. Several creeks, fed by springs, run through the area. We plan to improve the habitat generally." Home Garden soil can be improved with inexpensive materials. Few home owners have an opportunity to select sites which have soil good for a garden. But since the areas involved are comparatively small, it is usually practical to improve the soil. Limestone does not have the same effect on sand. Though often beneficial, it should be used on sand with caution to avoid making the soil alkaline. To both clay and sand decayed organic matter such as peat moss, black peat (muck), compost, sewage sludge, decayed manure, and leaf mold, should be added in liberal amounts. In sand it holds moisture and plant food for the roots to use, and in clay it also improves porosity and makes the soil easier to work. Annual additions of organic matter will help keep the soil in top condition. When the garden is watered, the thirst of soil particles which have the ability to hold water is first satisfied. Both clay and humus hold this water in storage, while allowing the free entrance of air at the same time. Sufficient water should be applied at each watering to fill this storage capacity to considerable depth. Use a sprinkler which applies water so slowly there is no run-off, and no flooding. There is little or no danger of applying too much limestone to

COTTAGE CHEESE COOKIES

The uses of cottage cheese are many and varied, but few homemakers are aware that cottage cheese can be used to make delicious cookies. These cookies have a party look with their dressed-up topping of cherries and candied pineapple.

- (Three Dozen)
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1/2 cup cottage cheese
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup chopped candied pineapple

Cream margarine until fluffy. Blend in cottage cheese. Add sugar gradually, beating well. Beat in the egg and flavoring extracts. Sift together flour, soda, and salt. Add to creamed mixture, about one-fourth at a time, mixing until smooth. Stir in candied pineapple. Drop by teaspoonfuls, 2 inches apart, on greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 10 to 12 minutes. If desired, frost the cooled cookies with confectioners' sugar icing and garnish with bits of candied pineapple and sliced candied cherries.

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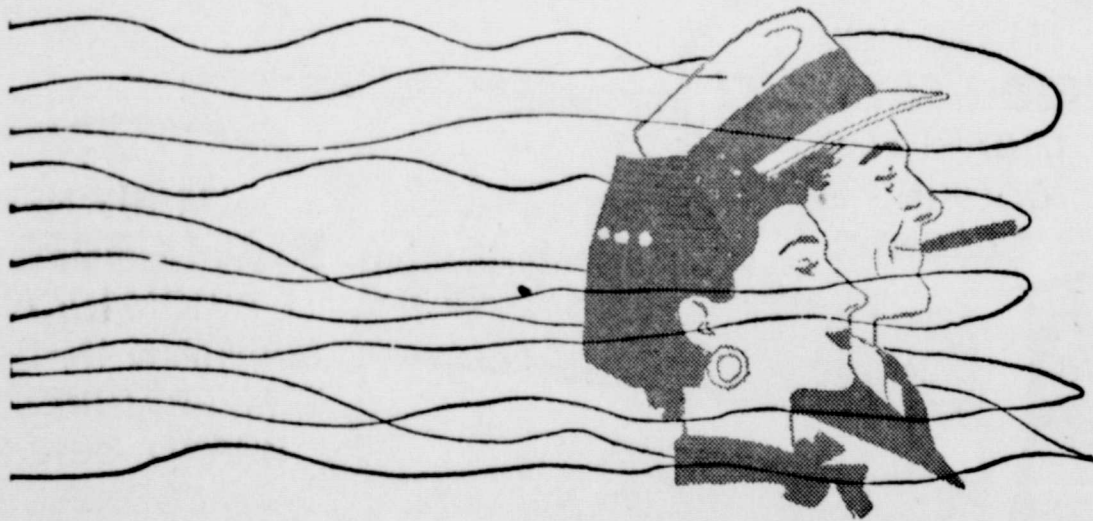
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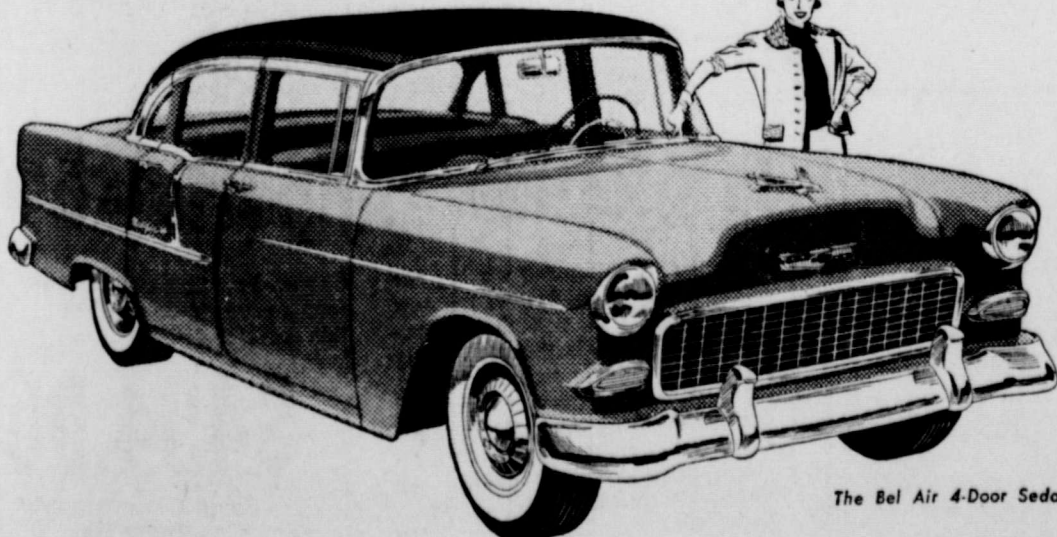

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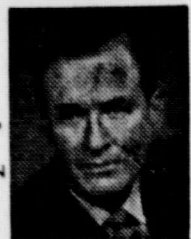
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"As It Looks From Here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The China Situation — The official position in Washington in that red china will not fight. Although no one could be certain on this point, this much can be borne in mind to support that position.

Russia is not likely to get herself involved in a war on account of China. Communist China has no navy to speak of; her air force, except for fighter planes, is not strong enough for a sustained offensive; she has only a few developed resources; little oil and no industry to speak of. Human backs are the main means of transportation in many areas. An army and air force, with no real industry to support them, lack staying power.

Be this as it may, the Chinese have the largest army in Asia and can be used to intimidate weaker nations in southeast Asia. In fact, it has paid her big dividends thus far.

The Communists began in Korea under the impression that the United States would not enter the war against them. President Eisenhower and the Congress have now removed such doubt regarding Formosa. I offered an amendment to the President's request that congress back up his policy, stating that this action should not set a precedent which lead either people in this Country or overseas to think that the President had to take such action every time an emergency occurred.

It is my personal belief that the Chinese Communists have their eye more on southeast Asia than on Formosa, and that they may be throwing up a smoke screen as a diversionary tactic.

The existing situation is sensitive, to say the least, and there is no need to speculate on what may happen. The Chinese Communists have tasted victory in several instances, which has raised their prestige in Asia and it has caused the Communist leaders to become pretty drunk with power. This is a dangerous thing, and particularly for the Oriental mind, which could result in the worst.

EMPLOYMENT PRACTICES — According to persons who have studied the trend in employment practices, men over forty or forty-five years of age are finding it difficult to find employment. In the case of women, the age is around thirty-five or even younger.

The practice is said to grow out of the employers' desire to keep down their pension liability, which is increased when older workers are taken on.

On the other hand, the ban against hiring workers of thirty-five to forty-five years of age will mean that in a short time fewer workers will be supporting a growing lot of jobless citizens, either, through taxes or by direct contributions. The answer may lie in making private pension and welfare programs more flexible than they are at present. This problem may never become acute in our area, but of course, it is acute to the individual when it happens to him.

RESERVE PROGRAM — With the President's program for a four-year extension of the draft, he has proposed an enlarged Reserve. Much will be heard about the Reserve program in the coming months. In brief, the general plan will allow boys seventeen to nineteen years of age to volunteer for six months basic training, to be followed by 9 1/2 years participation in the

military Reserve. In connection with this program, the President made a prediction that we must face the possibility of a 50-year period of "cold war."

This has a most pessimistic sound, but it should have been obvious to all of us for several years past that we are probably in a very long period of high tension, with no reasonable expectation that the world, with all the upheavals taking place, can soon settle down to the peaceful status we used to know.

I recently heard the definition of a diplomat; "A diplomat is a man who always has problems for good solutions." An analogy to this definition is the man in government who is always looking for a way not to do something, rather than a way to get something done.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — I plan to convert my GI term insurance policy to a permanent plan. Will I have to send VA a new list of beneficiaries, or will beneficiaries already named carry over to my permanent insurance?

A — It is not necessary for you to submit a new list of beneficiaries when you convert your insurance. The beneficiaries you have named originally will carry over to your permanent insurance. You can, of course, change the designation of beneficiaries at any time you desire.

Q — What is the time limit for filing a claim for an allowance to cover the burial costs of a veteran?

A — A claim must be filed within two years from the date of permanent burial of the veteran.

Q — I have just been released from military service. Will the Veterans Administration help me find a job?

A — Job-finding assistance is outside the scope of VA's activities, as defined by law. Employment placement is a function of the Veterans Employment Service of the U. S. Employment Service. Any local State Employment Office can give you further information.

Q — I intend to buy a house with a GI loan. I have approached a lending institution, and it requires a down payment. Are down payments mandatory under the law?

A — The law itself does not require a down payment on a GI loan. However, since private lenders do make the loans, they have the right to make decisions as to terms and down payments.

Baylor Official Made President Of Howard Payne

BROWNWOOD, Feb. 12. — Dr. Guy D. Newman of Waco has resigned as promotional vice president of Baylor University to accept the presidency of Howard Payne College, effective June 1.

Dr. Thomas H. Taylor, president of Howard Payne since 1929, will retire June 1 after 25 years as president of the senior Baptist college. He has been a member of the Howard Payne faculty for nearly 50 years.

Dr. Newman was elected president of Howard Payne Tuesday night, Feb. 8, at called meeting of the college's board of trustees at Hotel Brownwood. Dr. O. H. Chandler of Ballinger is chairman of the board.

As vice president of Baylor, Dr. Newman has headed that institution's \$50,000,000 ten-year expansion program.

The HPC board of trustees unanimously accepted proposals made by Dr. Newman in connection with his acceptance of the presidency. These included:

- 1. Plans for the near future in which the college will enter upon a ten-year program to raise \$5,000,000 for capital improvements and endowment.
2. Reactivation of the program launched several years ago regarding construction of an athlete stadium at a site acquired by the college on Brady Avenue, near the Little League Sportsman's Park.
3. Intensified efforts to mobilize HPC alumni to the fullest potential.
4. Immediate consideration to

beautification of the college campus. Dr. Newman is a former pastor of First Baptist Church, Brownwood. He resigned June 1, 1952 to return to Baylor University where he had formerly served as assistant to Baylor President W. R. White. He is a graduate of Baylor and of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.
