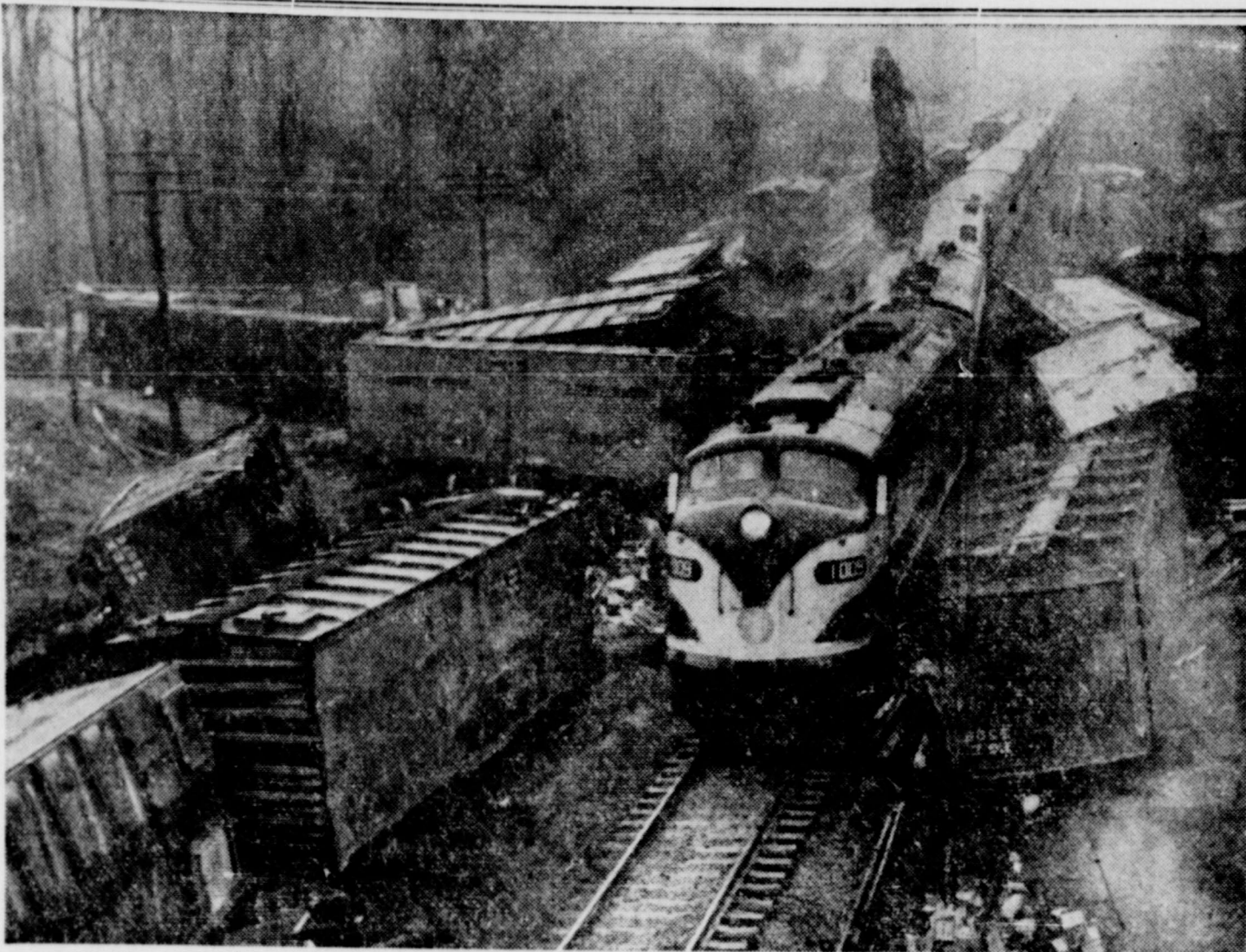

Social Security Benefits May Be Open For Group

Dependent survivors of wage earners and servicemen who died after 1939 and before September 1, 1950, may now be eligible for survivors insurance payments under the new Social Security Law. One and a half years work, or 6 quarters of coverage, is all that is now required to insure a worker who died before September 1950. This time requirement could have been met at any time after 1936 and up to September 1, 1950, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., Manager of the Abilene District Office of the Social Security Administration.

Possibly a claim was filed at death of worker, but could not be paid because he was not insured at the time. If you are a dependent survivor, such as a widow age 65 or over or with children under 18, or a dependent parent, the Social Security Office, Abilene, Texas, may be able to help you.

If convenient call at the office, or write them for information about when you may meet a representative of that office here in Cisco, at the Chamber of Commerce, between the hours of 2 and 4 on March 2, 1955. Date of the next visit will be March 16, 1955, at the same time.

Coronation Ceremonies, Choir Concert To Be Given Tonight

NTSC Group Will Sing At College

The auditorium of the new Cisco Junior College main building will be in use for the first time when the A Cappella Choir of North Texas State College of Denton presents a concert here at 8 p. m. Friday (tonight). The concert will be given under the sponsorship of the Music Department of the local college.

The Denton choir is presenting its Cisco program as part of an extensive tour of West Texas. The choir is under the direction of Frank A. McKinley, associate professor of music at NTSC and widely known as a musician and director.

Organized in 1938, the NTSC choir has won critical recognition and hearty support in all sections of the southwest, according to Jack Chambliss, a graduate of the school and head of the CJC music department. The choir singers are selected in open competition from the student body.

In 1949, the NTSC choir became one of the few A Cappella Choirs in the world to record with a major recording company when it joined with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra to cut an album for RCA Victor. The choir has an unusual record of performances with symphony orchestras under leading conductors, Mr. Chambliss said. In the past 17 years, it has made 34 concert appearances with symphonies, 17 of which have been with the Dallas Symphony.

The choir will offer a variety program that will appeal to all music lovers, Mr. Chambliss said. A large advance ticket sale has indicated that a large crowd will attend the concert. Tickets will be on sale at the door.

King Lobo To Be Crowned At Gym

Everything was in readiness Friday afternoon for the presentation of King Lobo XXIII at coronation services at the community gym at 7:30 o'clock Friday night.

Admission prices are 75 cents for adults and 35 cents for students. The junior class will use the money to finance the annual junior-senior banquet. The work of the students has been directed by Mrs. B. E. Wagley, Mrs. R. H. Cutting and Jay Williams, junior class sponsors.

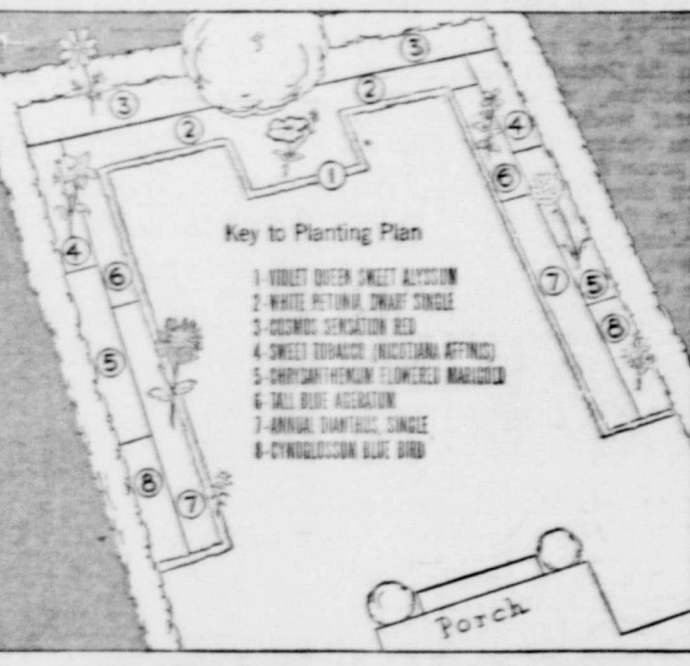

House and Garden Meet In Flower-Fenced Patio



A patio without flowers around it is never complete. Today's patio is any place where house and garden meet and mingle. The modern idea is that gardens shall contribute charm to the home, and be intimately associated with everyday living. They will be enjoyed most when near to the center of social activity, rather than hidden behind walls or hedges. Every home can and should have a patio. A paved area close to a door is preferable, where you can take a sun bath. Flowers like sun-baths too. Those who prefer shade can host a garden umbrella. A patio without flowers around it will never seem complete, and among them should be fragrant flowers. Most fragrant of all is the sweet tobacco, nicotiana glauca. This is the old fashioned kind, which is far more fragrant than the improved varieties, as is so often the case. The illustration shows a patio planting which can be made easily even by the inexperienced, from the seeds of annual flowers. All subjects are easily grown from seed sown directly where they are to grow. The planting is arranged with low growing plants in the foreground, taller ones behind. The color scheme is based upon harmony by contrast, with complementary colors placed together, where each will enhance the beauty of its neighbors. Annual flowers grown from seeds blossom from early summer until frost comes, if the faded flowers are kept picked off, and reasonable care is taken of the plants. With them can be planted both bulbs and perennials, to give a continuous display of bloom from the time the ground thaws out until the autumn freeze-up. Annuals never outgrow their place, no matter how small the area. They are always in scale, making both house and grounds seem larger than they would, were larger and taller plants set out, soon to become overgrown for their locations. Remember that annual flowers need sunshine. Avoid planting a garden where the tops and roots of trees, hedges, or shrubbery shade the flowers, and compete with them for nourishment and moisture in the soil. A location on the north side of the house is not likely to be favorable for the garden illustrated unless it is placed beyond the line to which the shadow of the roof extends in midsummer at 10 a. m. The location should also be free of shade from trees and other buildings for at least six hours a day.
