necessity only when the land is overrun with grass or weeds.
However, many are getting out
of the idea and realizing that ploughing at other times is a

is a possibility that the new soi will be too wet and should not be
turned up and allowed to sun dry. This permits the plant

The total production of cak or meal is about sufficient to
feed more than $1,000,000$ head of beef and dairy cattle the year round, while the hulls would sup ply roughage for 250,000 cattle
for one year. If $1,000,000$ head of cattle were fed on meal and roughage supplied by native grasses and hay, then the hulls and meal would supply $1,000,000$ cattle for the entiore year. As
fattening cattle are usually kept for only about six months on food of this sort before being and hulls, supplemented with native grasses and hay, would supply $2,000,000$ head of beef cattle
for that time. Such a use of these products would creat packing houses throughout the South and add another important industry to this section that
would be of immense benefit to the whole people
All of the hulls are now fed in the South to beef and dairy cattle, but a large part of the mea is exported or used in the manu-
facture of commercial fertiliz ers. This partial loss to the South of the most valuable feed
stuff produced in any country shows a lack of appreciation and enterprise that should not exist and will not continue for many years, as the value of the meal
for feeding purposes is better known each year.-L. A. Ranzine.
