State Ranger Thomas was killed at Amarillo.

The banking commissioner will send examiners' reports to the boards of directors of state banks.

The state health officer has declared quarantine against San Augustine County on account of small pox.

By an agreed judgement the Texas millers are to pay a fine under the anti-trust law of \$25,000 and stand enjoined.

A committee of sixty prominent prohibitionists are to conduct the campaign.

Reform in the state printing law is desired by the state printer.

Galveston's contributions to the Italian earthquake sufferers amounts to \$8,141.

Congress appropriated \$800,000 for the earthquake sufferers.

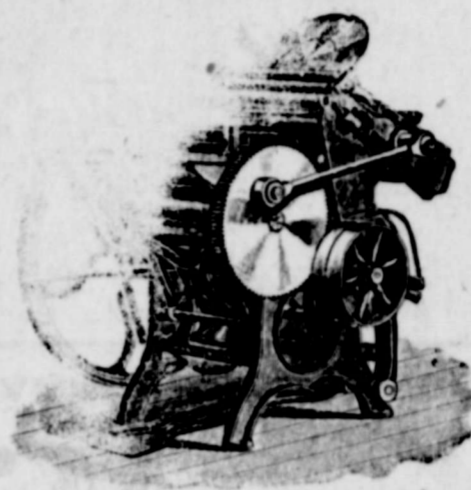
