## Crockett News.

Crockett Texas, June 5.—We have had quite an active week. First the closing of the school with its attendant exercises, then the musical recitals by Miss Foster and Mrs. Carry, followed by showers to the prospective brides have kept the social circle of the city in a pleasant stew.

On last Wednesday night, June 2, Mr. Dudley Woodson and Miss Maggie Foster were united in the holy bonds of matrimony in the presence of a large gathering of friends at the methodist church. Bro. F. M. Boyles officiated, using the beautiful and impressive ceremony of the Episcopal church. They left on the night train for Mexico on an extended honeymoon trip.

The United Confederate Veterans met here on June 2nd. They were called to order by Capt. W. B. Wall, Commander who opened the meeting with a few appropriate remarks. The chaplain being absent, the invocation was presented by Dr. F. C. Woodard, of Grapeland. After the roll call the opportunity was extended for members. Two new names were added to the list. There were about 56 present in all. Eight deaths were recorded since last meeting. Miss Lizzie Pritchard was elected Sponsor, and Misses Cora Woodard, LaRue and Blanch Sampson, Maids of Honor. The meeting then adjourned until next day at 9:30. The usual business was then taken up, and after finishing at 12 M. being invited by the Daughters of the Confederacy, formed in line and marched to the Pickwick Hotel where they were treated to a fine dinner prepared for the purpose by the genial and accommodating host, J. W. Howard. After dinner the Daughters of the Confederacy took charge of the veterans presented a nice program at the opera house of some fine music and songs, which was highly appreciated, and enjoyed by the old heroes. During the services the president of the D. C. pres-

ented a cross of honor to Mr. W. P. Kyle, made from the metal of the cannon, the first gun that was fired on the battle of Gettysburg. Mr. Kyle, in a feeling and expressive speech, acknowledged the receipt of the cross, during which he complimented the Daughters of the Confederacy for the noble work they were doing, stating that the English language did not contain words sufficient to express his feelings. These annual reunions should never be neglected. Besides the honors to the old heroes while living, it tends to perpetuate in the minds of the rising generation those noble principles for which they suffered and fought.

The Filthy Fly.

The fly breeds and grows in filth. It delights in sores, decay and putrefaction, and it carries millions of bacteria in its feet. Thus steeped in filth and carrying poison it lodges perchance on meat bread or fruit; perhaps on the sweet ruddy lip of the maiden and dimpled cheek of the sleeping child. The germs it carries may cause typhoid fever and dysentery.

The fly is denounced by modern sanitary science as dangerous to health as well as comfort and it is therefore a common enemy. Keep it out of the house by screening and by all possible means exterminate it. See that stables are cleaned and disinfected. Leave no filth about the premises for the fly to breed in; leave no food uncovered for it to feed on. It is a hard job to get rid of the pest entirely, but perseverance will do it, just like it has done with the mosquito in the yellow fever country.—Ex.

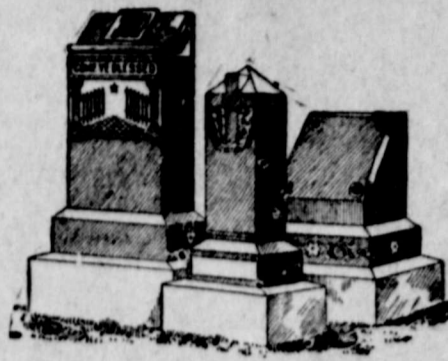
