I will not at tempt to describe the, machinery with which matches are made thing of it The wood is brough to the mill in logs, just as if to saw mill. These logs are cut in pieces $43^{\prime \prime}$ lang, they are then pu pleces 43 lan, hey are in a lathe and in the shares them ofl as the block turn, now we have a thin piece of wood the thickness of a wateh,
$43^{\prime \prime}$ wide and perhaps 12.15 ;or 20 ft . long, the length depends upon the size of the block. These pieces are now fed through a ma enine that cuta them the length of a match, at the same time cute the match out; the sticks, as they are called before the chemical is applied, falls pell mell into boxes or bins that have steel cross bars that cross each other and make littie boxes about $11 /{ }^{\prime}$ " deep, '2 2 wide and the; length of a match pluss :"
Now they are placed in a steel box that rests against a steel belt withsmall holes in it and by means of a neat contrivance one stroke *ill drive perhape a thousand of these sticlse, for they jare not mateses yet, into these choles in this steel belt. Look at a match, you will find one end fshows to baye been clamped.
Oree these sticks are fastened in tibese holes in this steel belt, they are then passed over a vat of the chemical that puts the head on the match, of course this vat is kept just so full that the match sticke will go just the right depth from this place they are passed under fans that dry them, from there to the packing room.
The guide showed me some of the chemicals of which matches Icoked like lemon stick candy and a bout three fourth inches in dismeter and 6 or $8^{\prime \prime}$ long and must be kept under water all the time, he took out a stick to show me and it begun to smoke at onc and be put it back very carefully He eaid if he should drop a stick of it on the cement floor on which
