Farmers are learning to diversify and all kinds of truck are being planted for the tall harvest. Don't forget tomatoes. You can plant them now by sowing the seed in the drill, chop them out to a stand and the returns in the fall will be a great help in buying fall clothes.

The guide showed me some of the chemicals of which matches are made, this particular chemical lcoked like lemon stick candy and about three fourth inches in diameter and 6 or 8" long and it must be kept under water all the time, he took out a stick to show me and it begun to smoke at once and he put it back very carefully He said if he should drop a stick of it on the cement floor on which we were standing the chances were we would be killed immediately as it was a very great explosive, and I did not wish him to try it, so we left that part of the factory at once.
