We would like to go into the trimming or pruning of the fruit trees this week. Of course most of us that have read many books remember the extent and degree that Mr. Washington found his cherry tree was trimmed after son George got through with it. Again, of course we think the pruning was rather severe and doubt that the tree bore very most provided to prune enough. There is a calculated medium that produces very good results, that is what we want. To properly prune a tree we must give some thought to what we want the tree to do. A fruit tree that doubles for a shade tree where people can walk under it would be trimmed somewhat different than one that a person would like to reach the fruit from the ground or a short ladder. 


