FEWER BRITISH SAILORS.

Ten years ago it was estimated that while, during the preceding half century, the British merchant tonnage had almost trebled, the number of British seamen engaged in the mercantile marine had decreased by 25 per cent., and the boys and young men by 85 per cent. In 1857 there were 96,914 petty officers and sailors, not including Lascars, employed in the mercantile marine of the United Kingdom; in 1875 it was estimated that there were 82,-000; in 1899 the estimated number had fallen to 60,209, while in 1901 there were only 4,290.


