

In an interesting study of the growth of the world's great cities M. de Foville notes that in 1801 there were in Europe only 22 which had more than 100,000 inhabitants. These were London, Dublin, Paris, Marseilles, Lyons, Amsterdam, Berlin, Hamburg, Vienna, Naples, Rome, Milan, Venice, Palermo, Madrid, Barcelona, Lisbon, St. Petersburg, Moscow, Warsaw, Copenonly of these cities had more than 500,000-London, 950,000, and Paris, 600,000. Naples came third, with 230,000.

The Neptune is the eighth British Dreadnought battleship built for the admiralty. She is 530 feet long, 84 feet beam, with displacement of 20,250 tons (a thousand tons heavier and 30 feet longer than the St. Vincent, the battleship of the same type launched from the same slip about a year ago).
