City subscribers will obtain the forecasts and warnings by call ing the long distance operator their exchange at any hour dur-
ing the day after $11 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. eastern ing th
time.
Rural subscribers will be called up about noon each day by a long ring from their operator who wil subscribers simultaneously.
The reports will also be displaplayed at all exchanges, re ceiving them, in their waiting room or other appropriste place or the benefit of the genera
public.
It is difficult to estimate wha whis means to rural population hose every day affairs depend is no doubt that an intelligent use of these reports will be of inesti territory covered embraces the entire section from the easter boundry of the State southwestward to Laredo and Uvalde; weat ward to Big Springs; and north westward to Quanah.
