Letter to J. E. Spence. Grapeland, Texas.

Dear Sir: How two men differ! N. Avery, Delhi, N Y, had two houses painted two ways; the houses alike, same painter, different paints. One paint 6 gallons; the other 12.

A dealer there who was selling the 12-gallon paint, threw it out resentative here of the Texas and put in the 6-gallon paint.

> Do you see why? The less gallons paint cost less for the job by 6 gallons of paint and 6 days' labor: \$10.75 for paint and \$12 to \$24 for labor (according to painters' wages \$2 to \$4 a day.)

A dealer in paint at Malone, NY, was selling this 6-gallon formation from the cotton centera paint, was offerd the 12-gallon paint for 15c a gallon, and took it! To make that extra 15c a gallon, he saddles a loss of \$22.75 to \$34.75 a job on his customers. What if they find it out. The people had better look-out for that \$22.75 to \$34.75, whichever it is-we don't know what painters' day wages are there. The two paints are Devoe and another sold at the same price by the gallon. Will you figure-out that 12-gallon paint: what a man can afford to pay for a gallon of The answer is (if you figure right) taking wages \$2 a day: A man could afford to but-on that paint if somebody pays him 121/2 cents a gallon; and, taking wages "What's in a name?" The \$4 a day, he must get \$1.21 a gallon.






