The farmer is the one who profits by increasing production per acre. It costs very little more to plant, cultivate and harvest an acre of land producing one bale of cotton than it does an acre of land producing a half bale of cotton, and the difference is net profit to the farmer.

The legislature reelected Senator Culberson by a unanimous vote. The senior senator is as popular in Texas as fewer laws.
The solons have been at war with both houses over revision of rules. Life at the capital is just one thing after another, but a new set of rules every few days is better than new laws, as rules apply to no one except the memwers of the legislature.
The prospects for fewer laws and better laws look bright. Numerous bills have been introduced to date. This is a virgin field, and no doubt many good laws can be passed defining animal rights. However, there is a marked difference between a bill and a law at the present time.
