CHINA'S \$50,000,000 LOAN HER FRIEND

EXECUTED AND SECURED BY PROVISIONAL REVENUES.

Loan Made by Banking Groups Repre senting United States, Great Britain, France and Germany.

Pekin .-- The \$50,000,000 loan to China by a group of financiers was signed Saturday.

The loan is secured by the provisional revenues. According to the terms of the agreement, the banking groups representing the United States, Great Britain, France and Germany will pay to China \$5,000,000 immediately, \$5,000,000 when the powers have approved of the currency reform and Manchurian development schemes, and the balance of the Toan in installments covering some months.

The agreement does not provide for a financial adviser to the Chinese government, the Chinese having refused to allow that provision to be included, but the Pekin government addressed a note to William J. Calhoun, the American minister, asking him to appoint an adviser. The American bankers referred the selection of an adviser to the participating bankers, who are now discussing the appointment of a neutral financial ex-

The loan of \$50,000,000 will be used in furthering currency reforms and other interests of the Chinese empire. An imperial edict issued Octoa group of American financiers who were to take a bond issue to cover the loan at 97. The bonds were to mature in from forty to forty-five years from issuance and to bear 5 per cent interest.

Later an agreement was reached providing that four banking groups of the United States, England, Germany and France should participate equally in the loan and that the financial adviser to the government with regard to the use of the loan should come from a neutral European state. The banking houses concerned are the Morgan, the Hong Kong and the Shan Hai Banking Company, the Bank of Indo-China, and the Deutsche East Asiatic Bank.

Shoots Wife and Self.

Schulenburg, Tex .- Joseph Mendel killed his wife and himself at their home about three miles northeast of Schulenburg Sunday, according to the finding of Justice Vogt, who held the inquest. The evidence shows that Mendel first shot twice at his little daughter and missed her, and then shot his wife and himself, using a single barrel shotgun.

Port Bolivar's New Church.

Fort Bonvar, Tex.—The new Methodist church, recently begun, is being rapidly pushed to completion, and it is now expected that it will receive its first congregation on the last Sunday in April. The structure is 65 feet long by 36 wide, with a 16-foot wall. Its seating capacity will be about 400, and it will cost, when completed, approximately \$6000.

Cotton Contest for Cup.

New York .- The American Land and Irrigation Exposition-the first great land show to be held in New York City-will award the handsomest and most valuable prizes in the history of American agriculture next November. It awards \$1,000 prizes for cotton, corn, wheat, oats, barley, hops and white potatoes, and \$500 cash for the best apples.

Admiral Mason Resigns.

Washington.-The resignation of Rear Admiral N. E. Mason, as chief of the bureau of ordnances in the navy department, was announced Saturday. The resignation has been ac: cepted by Secretary Meyer. The admiral will remain on the active list, but will be assigned to less arduous duties as a result of ill health.

Toledo Blade Destroyed.

Toledo, Ohio.-Fire practically destroyed the office and plant of the Toledo Blake Publishing Company Saturday, entailing a loss estimated by officials of the Blade of between \$150,000 and \$200,000, partly covered by insurance. One fireman was seriously injured.

Sold at \$150 Per Acre.

Taylor, Tex .- A land deal of more than ordinary importance was consummated Saturday when Fritz Haverland bought of Mrs. M. E. Henderson eighty acres of her farm four miles east of Taylor, paying the handsome price of \$150 cash per acre

Fight for an Inheritance. . St. Louis, Mo.-Marian Lemp, granddaughter of the late William J. Lemp, has begun a legal fight for a share of his \$10,000,000 estate by filing a suit in the circuit court asking that the court decree her one-eighth of the estate.

VALUE OF CORN CROP

Great American Grain Food for Men and Stock.

Demonstrated Thoroughly That With Proper Preparation and Cultivation Southern Farmer Can Grow as Much as in Northern States.

(By S. A. KNAPP, Special Agent in Charge of Farmers' Co-operative Demonstration Work.)

The great American grain food for men and stock upon the farm is corn. Corn intelligently managed, will produce more food per acre than any other cereal, and it is generally one of the safest of crops, which is an important item, because where men and animals must be fed, certainty of production stands among the first requisites. More corn brings into use the pastures and idle lands of the farm. It is the basis of a cheaper food supply for the masses. Therefore, the production of an abundant supply of corn is one of the essentials of good farming.

The southern farmer should grow enough corn for every possible need of the farm, and he can. It has been demonstrated thoroughly that with proper preparation and cultivation he can grow as much per acre as the best farmers in the corn growing states. At prevailing prices it is cheaper to produce it than to buy it, even with 12 and 15 cent cotton. Furthermore, the best farming requires systematic rotation of crops on all lands. It is a plant of wide adaptability and can be produced in nearly all portions of the United States. It especially valuable from the fact that we not only get the corn, but can grow with it a heavy crop of cow peas, which will give a supply of nitrogen, and humus, two of the most valuabk dems in building up soil.

Com is a tropical plant, and all other hings being equal, it should thrive better in the southern than in the northern states. This, however, is not the

corn requires not only a deep seed bed but a large amount of humus in the soil. Consequently most land requires some previous preparation—the plowing under of a green crop or the use of stable manure. The use of these is better preparation than to depend entirely upon commercial fertilizers. The land should also be well drained, because standing water is totally unsuited to the deep, penetrating roots of corn. Observe the following rules:

(1) Select a well drained piece of

land, filled with vegetable matter. (2) Break (plow) in the fall to a depth of a foot or more, with some implement that will not bring too much of the subsoil to the surface, and thoroughly pulverize. If this is done early enough, put in a winter cover crop of rye, oats or barley, which should be turned over in the spring.

(3) Go over the land with a section harrow two or three times before planting and repeat immediately after planting, and again after the corn is up, using the harrow at nearly right angles with the rows.

(4) Use the best seed, and especially such seed as has been tested in the climate of the field to be planted. . (5) Practice intensive shallow cultivation.

The disk plow, the adjustable section harrow, and the weeder are valuable aids in producing the corn crop. In selecting the seed it is not advisable that it should be selected from the crib or even from the ordinary field, if the best results are to be obtained. There should be a special plat for seed purposes, which must receive the best preparation of the seed bed and the best seed obtainable. with excellent cultivation and fertilization. Then, before the pollen has matured, all barren stalks and all weak and diseased stalks should be removed, leaving nothing but strong vigorous, well-eared stalks in the field, because corn is fertilized from all the surrounding plants. Therefore it is better to select a medium ear from a field where the average corn is excellent than a model ear from a field where most of the corn is inferior.



The roots send out in every direction an infinite number of hairlike growths, which absorb moisture and food. On soils properly prepared and in sections of fair rainfall the feeding ground for corn is usually from two to twelve inches below the surface. This is strictly true in the great corn belt of the northwest. In the south there has been too much shallow plowing. Breaking three or four nches is not deep enough to make a suitable feeding place for corn roots; on average land it furnishes neithsufficient food nor sufficient moisture for the plant to do its best. The trouble with a shallow seed bed is that it is too wet under heavy rainfall and too dry in periods of drought. To make its largest yield,

of the seed. To insure high vitality corn must be gathered before the fall rains, put in a dry, well ventilated place, and kept free from weevils. Corn is especially responsive to good treatment and careful selection. It is a crop easily improved and deteriorates as the result of bad management with corresponding rapidity. The illustration shows the difference between shallow and intensive cultivation and the old method of deep cultivation after planting. These tracts are side by side on the same farm ir North Carolina. Cost of Manure Spreader.

INOCULATION OF THE SOILS

Summary of Mississippi Experiment Station Bulletin on Furnishing Plant Food.

The following is a summary of Bulletin No. 63 Mississippi experiment

The air all about us is composed principally of two free gases, oxygen and nitrogen.

Leguminous plants, such as clover, vetch, peas, beans, alfalfa, etc., are able to take up the free nitrogen of the air and change it to a form that can be used as food. A part of this the plants use immediately in growing and a part is left in the ground for the succeeding crop. These legaminous plants are able to do this by means of bacteria or germs that grow on their roots and produce

In some soils these germs are not present at all, while in some soils they are present, but not in sufficient numbers to produce the best results. Such soils should be inoculated.

nodules there.

By inoculation is meant the adding

of the germs in some way to the soil. Experiments with vetch have shown that the crop is greatly increased by inoculation, and at the same time that nitrogen is added to the soil. Experiments show that the germs from one plant will inoculate plants very closely related. But the best results will probably be obtained by using germs from the same species of plant one wishes to inoculate.

Home Canning.

Now is the time to plant vegetables to can later on. Tomatoes, beans, okra, garden peas, sweet potatoes, corn and other vegetables should be planted for canning.

The home canner may be purchased later on for a very small amount of money. All hands can help instead of just the women, as has been the case with the old system of putting up fruit in glass jars. There is now no reason why we cannot have plenty of vegetables and frutts on our tables every day in the year. Let us plant the vegetables and purchase the canner later in the season.

MOST REFRIGERATORS UNCLEAN AND FULL OF GERMS.

How Scientists Explain the Filthy Condition of These Receptacles Which Dr. Wiley Calls Charnel Houses of Death.

Science has recently shed a flood of light on the important subject of sanitary refrigeration by the aid of the nicroscope and the investigations of the bacteriologists.
