HEADGEAR FOR THE MOTOR TUB DRESSES FOR A DOLLAR

Are Now Well Within the Reach of All.

It is astonishing how many dainty frocks for the summer can be made these days setting the limit of expenditures at \$1, including the patterns and threads.

Never before have so many delicate designs been shown in inexpensive lawns and ginghams, and the business girl should begin now to make the smart little dresses which she will wear to the office during the coming summer.

Two things should be remembered. One is that much trimming of any sort detracts both from the cool effect of the gown and makes it bad to launder; the second is that however dainty the very light materials are they are far less serviceable than a plaid or a plain buff or blue dress.

As to the question of expense, begin with the pattern. Choose one of the new ones that are capable of being carried out in several different fashions, with or without the high waist line or with long or short sleeves and with or without yoke. Thus for 15 cents you will provide yourself with a pattern for several frocks.

Next, a few yards of white mull and some inexpensive lace will make broad collars and cuffs and a fichu or a dainty pointed yoke, all of which will serve as trimming, for your gowns.

Then as to materials. Ginghams plain ones, may be purchased as low as 8 and 10 cents a yard. A good quality of lawn in dark colors is only a cent or two more in price.

Paper for Stitching.

When you buy a bolt of narrow ribbon, save the paper on which it is wound, and use this later to place under soft materials when stitching them, to avoid puckering. You will find this much better than tearing up strips of newspaper for the purpose

RECONSTRUCTION OF MEXICO

REBELS AND RURALES TO BE WELDED INTO ONE FORCE.

War Cost \$20,000,000, and Probably \$2,000,000 of This Is Foreign Claims for Damages.

Mexico City.-Measures for the ultimate disposition of the insurrecto army and for payment of the costs of the war were the first matters to which the newly created executive devoted his official attention.

Notwithstanding a formal call by the diplomatic corps for the purpose of presenting felicitations, the administering of the oath of office to the new secretary of the treasury, Ernesto Madero, and interruption by scores of officials and friends who came to congratulate him, President de la Barra found time to formulate plans for adjustment of the most immediately pressing problems confronting the nation. He proposes to dissolve at once the revolutionary forces, using a portion of them to augment the ranks of the rurales, that picturesque body of troops organized by General Diaz many years ago out of the country's bandits. The remainder will be given every assistance te secure employment or to return to their homes in the various states, and all will be paid off as though having been mustered out of the regular army. This is in line with the suggestion made by Francisco I. Madero in his address to his troops at Juarez.

Rebels Turned Rurales.

By utilizing the best of the insurrectos in the corps of rurales the government believes that it will be avail ing itself of a force well able to rid the country of bandits within a short

President de la Barra is now considering a measure which he will propose to the chamber of deputies, providing for immediate payment of all claims made and proved against the government. It is proposed that a committee of five be named to pass upon all claims as soon as they are presented by those properly qualified. A clause in the measure which will be presented to the chamber will authorize the immediate payment of such claims as are approved by this committee.

War Cost \$20,000,000.

Diplomats estimate that the war in Mexico has cost not less than \$20,-000,000 gold and that perhaps onetenth of this is due to damages sustained by foreigners. Half of this amount is said on high authority to be loss suffered by Americans.

In the various legations of the capital foreigners have already begun cura Ointment. The cashier of the bank in question was one of the men killed. The reports agree that after the Chinese showed a determination to resist the rebels displayed no mercy, shooting and stabbing the Orientals wherever encountered. In one house the bodies of fifteen dead Chinese were found after the battle.

PERUVIAN FLAG BURNED

lquique by Mob-Report that Chilean Consulate Had Been Attacked Was Cause.

Luique, Chile .-- A mob Sunday attacked the Peruvian club and burned the flag of Peru. Troops were summoned to quell the rioting and several persons were wounded. The Peruvien consul has resigned and has askthe United States consul to proect Peruvian interests.

The organization and the rioting that followed were the outcome of publication in newspapers that Chilean consulate in Callao, Peru, had been attacked and the consul wounded.

Diploamtic relations between Peru and Chile were severed more than a year ago. The Chilean government withdrew its legation from Santiago. This action was brought about by the expulsion of the Peruvian priests from the provinces of Tacna and Arica. The actual dispute between Chile and Peru rests on the question of ownership with regard to Tacna and Arica provinces, to decide which a plebiscite has been suggested by the people of these provinces.




