SACRED BOOKS OF TIBET.
The sacred books of the Tibetans are said to be the most extensive of any religion, runaing into 325 volumes, almost a library in themselves. Tibet embraced Buddhism about the seventh century of our era. The Tibetans translated the doctrines into 100 volumes under the name of Kangyna." And by way of exegesis and commentary they added 225 volumes. These books were printed at Marthany in 1721 and another edition was published at Peking.
