Hay Colored Material Most Effective May Be Made Into Blouse by Any One at All Clever With

> If you have an extra scarf in the Palisley, Dresden or Parisian design and want to have a blouse to match the scarf which you wish to retain, for scarfs still have wide fashion, the idea of turning the extra one into a blouse is one you can snatch up and put to good use.

Scarfs, mufflers and kerchiefs of these silky crepe materials are easily cut up and made into neat and becoming blouses by the home needleworker who takes advantage of the inno-

Almost invariably the middle possesses a figure design, while the border is also composed of figures with a band of white or light color between these two figured portions. Make it a point to use these strips of material for the lower part of the blouse or the inside of the sleeves, and in thus utilizing the plain strip a bolero effect is secured.

# GREAT WELCOME TO MADERO

CHEERED AT EVERY STOP BY THOUSANDS OF MEXICANS.

"Viva, la Presidente, Senor Madero," Is Lustily Shouted in Many Towns. Train Schedule Is Changed.

On Board Madero's Special Train, Torreon, Mexico.-The bursting of bombs, the firing of cannon and the sharp crackling of musketry from the ranks of 5,000 former insurrecto soldiers, drawn on both sides of the rail-Madero and his party at Torreon Sunroad track, welcomed Francisco I. day. Fully twenty thousand residents of the town, including hundreds of Americans and foreigners, participated in a huge demonstration, and counting the throngs gathered at various stations en route, Senor Madero has addressed nearly fifty thousand persons, whose shouts of "Viva Madero" still are ringing in the ears of the Madero party. The incessant firing of salutes, however, which has been growing more intense as the party has penetrated further into the hotbed of sentiment, caused a change in the schedule of the special train.

The change was made for the double purpose of giving those aboard the special train an opportunity to sleep and also of preventing some malevolent person from tossing any of the festive bombs too near the cars.

Continuous Demonstration. It was a day of continuous demonstration for Senor Madero and one which filled him with joy, particularly because it came from many of his personal friends.

At San Pedro, the home of Sener Madero, which was reached Sunday morning, one of the most enthusiastic demonstrations of the day took place. As the special train pulled in about one thousand insurrecto soldiers fired a salute. Senor Madero stepped down from his private car to a grandstand erected a few yards away and an immense throng crowded all the available space around it. After a few speeches, which were constantly interrupted by shouts of "Viva Madero," the ceremonies were transferred to the balcony of a hotel in another part of the town. The streets were jammed with decorations, sombreros and their wearers. To move through the crowd to within hearing distance of Senor Madero was a task that required dodging the broad brims of idea? straw sombreros and the scores of little children who crawled underfoot, almost completely hidden by the hatbedecked crowd. Arches of flowers and flags adorned all streets.





The sacred books of the Tibetans are said to be the most extensive of any religion, running into 325 volumes, almost a library in themselves. And by way of exegesis and commentary they added 225 volumes. These books were printed at Marthany in 1721 and another edition was published at Peking. Short Mention of Interesting Happen ings From Day to Day Throughout the World.

### WASHINGTON.

The financial committee report of the reciprocity bill to the senate will feature the beginning of the third month of the extra session of congress. The hearings, which have continued almost a month, will close this week and the committee will go into executive session to determine the disposition of the measure. Members of the committee, engrossed in hearings, have had no opportunity to exchange views. Many amendments have been suggested and many more are probable.

Governor Woodrow Wilson's Sunday in Washington was an all-day reception, democratic senators, representatives and leading citizens coming and going in steady procession. Speaker Champ Clark, who at this time is regarded as Governor Wilson's only formidable opponent for the democratic nomination for president, met Governor Wilson for a short cordial

The next task before the house democrats is an easy one. It is the revision of the cotton schedule. As soon as the wool schedule gets out of the house, which henceforth will be but a mere formality of speechmaking, the democratic members of the ways and means committee will take up the cotton textile schedule. There is no hitch over this schedule.

The Root bill for election of United States senators by a plurality of a legislature was favorably acted on by the senate committee on privileges and elections with an amendment requiring that the successful candidate shall receive the votes of at least onethird of the members of both branches of the legislature. The purpose of the resolution is the abolition of senatorial deadlocks.

In his speech in the senate Friday on the Lorimer resolution, Senator Stone undertook to develop the attitude of the progressive republican senators toward the democratic legislative program. Announcing himself to be an organization democrat, the Missouri senator said that if the progressives desired to act with the democrats they should join the democratic



## ANCIENT ISRAEL USED INK

Writings of Bible Times Inscribed on Potsherds Have Been Found in Samaria.

"That the ancient Israelites had cheap and easy method of sending written messages which was in fairly common use is now an established fact," said George A. Reisner, assistant professor of Egyptology at Harvard, who for the last fourteen years has been conducting excavations in Egypt and Palestine. Professor Reisner just returned on the Campania.

"We were excavating in Samaria, once capital of the northern kingdom of Israel, in 1908, when we came upon the palace of the Israelite kings. Last summer we found on the floor of one of the chambers of the palace a number of potsherds and on these shards were written messages: they related to tithes or taxes paid to the king, and were written in an ink made of pure carbon or lampblack. These, perhaps, are the earliest specimens of Israelite work contemporaneous with the Bible. They were written in the reign of King Ahab."-New York Evening Post.

## The Short-Lived Pin.

By a series of experiments conducted on his estate a French investigator has discovered that pins go the way of all flesh and are resolved into dust. Hairpins, which the experimenter watched for 154 days, disappear at the end of that time, having been resolved into a ferrous oxide, a brownish rust, which was blown away by the wind. Bright pins took nearly 18 months to disappear; polished steel needles nearly two years and a half; brass pins had but little endurance; steel pens at the end of 15 months had nearly gone, while their wooden holders were still intact. Pencils, with which he also experimented, suffered little by exposure; the lead was unharmed. and the cedar almost as good as new. -Human Life.



I have known you for several years and have always found you to be fair minded and reasonable and believe that you were misinformed as to the facts in your County Judge written opinthe case, or you would never

You asked, "What right have a set of men to deliberately copy. break into the ballot boxes in order to establish evidence to contest an election, etc." Now, no such thing was done by any man or set of men, in the recent election. Not a single ballot sent to my office has been examined by anyone since re-

cieved.

The election law of Texas, Art. 1743 R S. require one list of Election Returns be sent sealed up in an envelope to the County Judge; one to be kept by the presiding officer of the election; and "another of said returns, together with poll lists and tally lists, shall be delivered by one of the managers of election to the clerk of the County Court of the county, to be kept by him in his office OPEN TO IN-SPECTION BY THE PUBLIC FOR TWELVE MONTHS FROM THE DAY OF THE ELEC. TION." It also requires that the ballots be placed in a "wooden" or "metalic" box fastened with nails, screws, or locked, and to be marked or endorsed on the box as "ballots" and sent to the county clerk for safe keeping. This was done by sent in their returns and ballots in an open envelope together, and marked, "Election Returns" Of course I opened them because the law requires that I open the "Returns" for the inspection of the public. When I would find the ballots in with the returns, I would take out the returns, leaving the ballots in the box and place them in the "Vault" for safe keeping, and no man has examined a single ballot not even myself. Those boxes that sent the ballots in properly endorsed have not been opened nor will be without a process of

Now I think you have jumped at conclusions by "hearsays" without first investigating the law or the facts in the case. You intimate that I am standing in with a few in Crockett to defeat the will of the people. I have taken no stand with either side of this controversy but am simply trying to do my duty as an officer and expect to continue to do so as long as the law directs regardless of wheth er or not it please a few.

I invite an investigation of my official acts at the hands of the next Grand Jury; perhaps they, with the assistance of able attorneys, can find out whether or not I have violated the law I am only trying, in my official acts, to be a faithful servant of the people, without favors to any man, beyond the bounds of the law.
