It is the sacred duty of every private citizen to contribute his share toward the enforcement
of the law. They can do this in many ways, none of which lack in any essential importance. In the first place, every father and mother owe it not only to thei God and to civilization, but $t$ their family and to their com-
munity, to bring up their childmunity, to bring up their children in such a way that they accept the responsibilities of society. The home is the birth-place of the criminal as well as the saint; the character of the murderer a well as the character of the president is modeled and fashioned mother.
