

THE WHOLE WEEK'S DOINGS

Short Mention of Interesting Happenings From Day to Day Throughout the World.

WASHINGTON.

The removal of Canadian reciprocity from the congressional stage has left things at the capital in a decidedly mixed condition. The senate will launch into the wool tariff, but it is expected the discussion will not stick closely to wool, but will run the whole gamut of tariff revision.

The United States Steel Corporation in obtaining the Tennessee Coal, Iron and Railroad company and its Southern ore land "cinched its monopoly of the ores of the American continent to Camp Mabry, Austin, to particiand tied up available fields for independent concerns," declared Chairman Stanley of the house steel trust investigating committee Saturday.

Representative Burleson of Texas Saturday received a memorial signed Philippine commissioners at Washingby a large number of Americans residing in Mexico urging this country to negotiate a reciprocity pact with Mexico as has been done with Canada.

Senators Root and Burton and other opponents of the congressional reapportionment bill now admit that the measure will pass the senate when the vote is reached on it under the allaround agreement of August 3, but they are still hopeful of securing amendments that will be of advantage to the republicans.

Representative Graham of Illinois, chairman of the house committee investigating the Alaskan scandal, is much pleased because his sleuths have located and subpoenaed Richard S. Ryan, author of the alleged letter to Richard A. Ballinger connecting Charles P. Taft with the grab of a harbor site on Controller bay.

Two witnesses before the Lorimer inquiry committee Tuesday refuted in detail the sworn statements of William Burgess, who declared that C. F. Wiehe of Chicago, secretary of the Edward Hines Lumber company, had boasted that he had contributed \$10.-000 toward a fund of \$100,000 to elect Lorimer.

Senator Heyburn of Idaho Tuesday refought the civil war, incidentally firing a shot at Sterling Price Camp of the Confederate veterans of Dallas. Texas, for objecting to a picture of Lincoln in the Colonial Hill school. The occasion of the outburst was Senator Williams' bill to appropriate \$125,000 for a monument at Vicksburg, Miss., "to the constancy and courage of the Confederate soldiers." The bill was reported unanimously by the senate committee on military affairs and was put on the calendar for immediate consideration over Heyburn's objection by a vote of 29 r to 19.

The American Federation of Labor Saturday inaugurated a campaign to raise money with which to conduct the defense of the McNamaras, charged with dynamiting the plant of the Los Angeles Times.

Cotton picking is now fully under way over a great portion of Southwest Texas and the demand for cotton pickers is becoming pronounced. There have been planted in the lower Rio Grande valley 65,000 acres of cotton. In token of the fact that the Mexi-

can revolution is now recognized as a closed incident by the United States government, Colonel E. Z. Steever, in command of the United States troops at El Paso, has returned to the Mexican government all the arms and ammunition taken during the time the revolution was in progress.

Thousands of people knelt Wedneslay before the open air altar in Balboa park on the site of the Panama canal exposition at San Diego, Cal. A mass was celebrated as a preliminary to ground breaking for the exposition.

Brigadier General Joseph W. Duncan, commanding the department of Texas, has suggested that the headquarters, machine gun patrol and two battalions of the Twenty-second infantry, platoon and six troops of the Third cavalry at San Antonio, be sent pate in the Texas National Guard encampment in August.


Speeding across the Atlantic on a steamer are Don Benito Legarda and Don Manuel Luis Quezon, resident ton. They are hurrying to Paris to complete arrangements with French bankers whereby the latter will finance a Philippine agricultural bank to the tune of \$10,000,000.

By a majority of 1,453 votes, Jersey City, N. J., rejected Tuesday the commission form of government, which the New Jersey legislature prescribed and Governor Wilson defended. There were 13,038 votes against the plan and 11,585 in its favor.

FOREIGN.

Despite the breaking of the agreement that General Bernardo Reyes should be minister of war in the cabinet of Francisco I. Madero, and notvithstanding Madero's assurances that Reyes was free to enter the presidential race, the general Sunday insisted that he would not be a candidate.

That the period of reconstruction soon may be succeeded by another revolution is the fear frankly expressed Sunday in many guarters of the capital of Mexico. Reports of disorlers, assuming in a few cases the magaitude of battles, are not uncommon and almost daily the authorities are informed of the frustration of plots igainst Madero or the constituted government. The recurrence of sanguintry factional disputes leaves no room to doubt that there is growing rapidly

The only counties from which reports have not been received are: Upton and Winkler, the combined voting strength of which is 202. Complete reports have been received from 236 counties and very nearly complete reports from the ten remaining counties, in which, as a rule, the vote of all but one or two small boxes have been reported.

The nine counties from which these partial but nearly complete reports have been received are: Armstrong, Donley, Moore, Pecos, Presidio, Red River, Dickens, Tarrant and Bailey. The additional reports from these counties can hardly prove an important factor in the result.

Chairman Ball's Statement.

Houston, Tex .-- Hon. Thomas H. Ball, chairman of the Statewide Prohibition Amendment association, has issued a call requesting the executive committee of the association to meet at Fort Worth on Saturday, July 29, to determine the advisability of contesting the recent election. A short time before the issuance of the call Colonel Ball issued a signed statement in which he stated the antis had probably won by not more than 5,000 majority, although he was confident the opposition had not won legally. Rain, and plenty of it, throughout the country is prophesied for this week. Cooler weather will follow the downpour in the beginning of the week, but this cool wave will give way to higher temperatures later, although unseasonable weather is predicted.

Asiatic cholera has reached Boston. It caused one death, while two foreign sailors, who are believed to have brought the dread disease to Boston. after being taken ill, disappeared and their whereabouts are unknown.

Cholera claimed another victim in New York Sunday among the patients in the hospital on Swinburne Island in the death of Demetrio Anagnoston, aged 17, making the total deaths in quarantine nine.

A bill to remove the state capital from Atlanta to Macon was introduced in the Georgia house Friday.

William Godfrey, aged 91, the last member of the family of Francis Godfrey, the last war chief of the Miami Indians, died at Peru, Ind., Saturday Godfrey was married nine times.

Will Harris, 34 years of age, a promipent merchant of Fort Worth, who died at a hospital following illness from typhoid pellagra, is the fifth victim of pellagra in San Antonio during July. The attending physician stated that there was only a slight eruption of the skin apparent on Mr. Harris when he entered the institution two months ago, but the disease rapidly developed until the entire body

Aviator Torridan, piloting a small biplane at the aerdome at Mourmeton, France, Friday, covered 465% miles, remaining in the air 11 hours and 45 minutes. This is a new world's record for distance and time.

Cape Haitien is in the hands of the revolutionists and the sole protection of the Americans and other foreigners at the port is an American yacht which arrived Friday.

The playright Henry Bernstein Friday fought a duel with Leon Daudet, editor of L'Action Francaise, in Paris, first with pistols and then with swords. Both men were wounded in the bout with swords, but it is not believed seriously. M. Bernstein took exceptions to articles which appeared in L. M. Daudet's paper and challenged the editor.

The house of lords in London passed the third reading of the parliament bill, otherwise known as the veto bill, without division Friday, after only three hours debate. The revolt of the insurgent peers failed to materialize.

Lady Om, consort of Emperor Yi Hul of Korea, who abdicated in 1907, died Friday. Lady Om was a palace politician of great skill. She was attendant upon the queen of Korea, who was murdered. She gained the lavor of the emperor and was finally compelled to flee from the palace. After the death of the queen she was restored to the court with the rank of an imperial concubine. This conferred imperial rank upon her two children. She was originally a slave.

The government of Hayti has proclaimed a blockade of the ports of St. Marc. Gonnaives and Fort Liberte. Having only one warship at its disposal, however, an effective blockade is impossible. The order for the bombardment of St. Marc and Gonnaives has not been carried out, and the cruiser Antoine Simon is now anchored before Archale, a port eighteen miles northwest of the capital.

According to advices received in London Wednesday, the deaths from the plague in India have reached the enormous total of 650,690 for the half year ended June 30.

The antis cut into the pros in Anderson county, which went to the Statewide column by a very narrow margin, while McLennan county fell into the anti column by the very narrow Gillespi margin of 21.

Dear Sir: In reply to your several letters of recent date asking for a construction of the special road law for Houston County, I beg to say that from your letters and also the letter from your county clerk, I observe that notwithstanding the fact that Section 1 of said law requires the County Commissioners of your county to appoint a road superintendent at its first regular meeting after said law became effective that they have failed to do so, and also that an election has been held under Section 32 of said act and the office of superintendent of roads and bridges has been abolished. 





Work for Extinction of Tuberculosis. Exhibitions showing in graphic form the prevention of consumption have been shown in every state in the United States, except Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico and Wyoming, and also in most of the Canadian provinces and in Mexico, Porto Rico and Cuba, according to a statement made by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis. There are now 25 states and 16 cities having permanent and traveling exhibits besides the two operated by the National association itself, and the total number of similar displays is over 200, including about 150 small school exhibits. The first tuberculosis exhibit in America was shown by the Maryland Tuberculosis commission in January, 1904. In 1906 there were four such exhibits.



RECIPROCITY BILL PASSED

THE SENATE, AND ALL AMEND. MENTS VOTED DOWN.

The Vote Stood 54 to 27-Bailey's Free List Amendment Received Only Fifteen Votes.

Washington .-- The senate Saturday passed the reciprocity bill without amendment by a vote of 54 to 27, but one short of the 2 to 1 majority that had been expected. Of the affirmative votes, the president's own party contributed but 21, while the democrats gave 32. Three of the republican votes came from insurgents, Brown of Nebraska, Poindexter of Washington and Works of California, while 10 insurgents, 14 regular republicans and 3 democrats combined to make up the 27 opposition. The three democrats who opposed the bill were: Bailey, Clarke of Arkansas and Simmons of North Carolina. One democrat, Thornton of Louisiana, was paired against the bill with Dumont of Delaware, regular republican, who would have voted for it had he been present. Both Foster of Louisiana and Paynter of Kentucky, democrats, whose attitude toward the bill was uncertain up to the hour the vote was taken, turned up in affirmative votes.

Before the final vote on the reciporcity bill itself was reached there were thirteen roll calls on various pending amendments, each roll call resulting in the rejection of the proposed changes by overwhelming majorities, practically all the affirmative votes for the amendments coming from the insurgents. There were no surprises in these votes, as it had been the settled policy of both the democrats and republican supporters of the measures to put it through in the precise form in which it came from the house in accordance with the desire of the president and the demand of the advocates of the legislation throughout the country.

The president will not be able to affix his signature to the reciprocity bill until some time this week, as the bill under the rules must be finally engrossed in the house in which it originated while that house is in session.


