





### Texas Senate Proceedings.

Amatin, Tex.-The house, when convening Monday, adopted the free conterence committee report on the Haney-Pharr text book Mill.

The conference bill provides for a siz-year book contract and for a salary of \$5 per day to board members. The house had stood out for a five-year contract; the senate for ten, and the house for a \$5 per day salary, the senate for \$7.50.

The Hudspeth (senate) eighthout sell was taken up and the house bill substituted upon motion of Mr. Byrns. So substituted the bill was passed tinally.

### Terrell Sees Undesirability in Bill.

Mr. Terrell of Bezar declared that the senate bill was worse than the house bill; that under the first measare every porter in the house, every employe of A and M. college and every department would be subject to the eight-hour provision.

The house committee congressional redistricting bill was passed finally vira voce.

The following conference committes, upon the part of the house, was appropriated on the report redistricting hill: Mesars. Pharr, Kennedy, Rowell, Hill and Tarver.

When the senate message came granting the request of the house for a "free conference committee" on this bill, Mr. Tarver, who made the motion, and Mr. Gilmore quickly called attention to the fact that the motion had called for a "conference" and not a "free conference" committee. The house Journal was consulted and so disclosed.

### Action Relative to McDonald.

The report of the committee on privilege, suffrage and election exonerating Captain W. J. McDonald of contempt of the house in "arresting" house members was read. Messrs. Bierschwale, Corder and Landry presenated a minority report, reviewing the senate committee's testimony at learth and recommending the adoption of Mr. Terrell of Bexar resolution to summon Captain McDonald before the house.

Mr. Terrell of Bezar spoke forcibly in behalf of the minority report and the addition of his resolution. Mr. Terrell was in fine form and his speech was considered by all hearers the best he has ever delivered in the house

He took a transcript of the testisony and proceedings of the senate investigating committee at the time of the appearance of the three house members, Messrs. Stevens, Stone and Wahrmund, who were alleged to have been arrested, and analyzed this report of proceedings exhaustively, as well as the testimony of Senator

America, Tez .- The sensite Monday adopted the free conference committee report on the text book bill-24 to 2, Senators Greer and Lattimore voting in the negative. The contracts are to he for six years instead of ten years.

Renators Lattimore, Greer and Vaughan asked questions indicating hostility to the bill, especially since it was not supported by Senator Mc-Meethes, who was absent, sick. Benator Vauzhan intimated that the court at Dallas had not been meeting early enough in the day and also that it did not meet on time.

Senator Ward said that Senator Mc Nealus told him to call up the bill and pass it, and that if he were present he would be marked present and not westing.

Senator Terrell of Wise spoke at length against the bill, arguing that a new court was not needed; that there are now four district courts in that county and that is enough.

Senator Ward had read the petition to the Dallas county delegation asking for the creation of the court.

Senator Townsend was against creating any more offices for Dalias. county, insisting that Dallas is now court-ridden, and that the thing to do is to change the jurisdiction of one of the civil district courts to try criminal cases

Senator Mayfield said that Senator McNealus asked him to vote against the bill.

Senator Lattimore also spoke against the bill, saying Tarrant county is up with her cases and has but three district courts.

The bill was ordered engrossed-12 to 12 and one pair. The antis voted solidly for the bill aided by Senators Perkins and Ward, while the remainder of the pros opposed it

### Congressional Measure.

Mr. Nichols of Hunt moved not to concur in senate amendments to the house congressional redistricting bill and to ask the appointment of a free conference committee.

The chair (Terrell of Bexar) overruled the point of order.

Mr. Gilmore raised a point of order that the bill must be referred to a committee, as it was in effect a new house bill by substituting the senate bill therefor.

# MAD RUSH AT PICTURE SHOW MUNYON'S WORK

In Rush for Safety-Women and Children Among the Dead-Fireman Finds Own Children.

Canonsburg, Pa .-- Twenty-six dead from suffocation; twenty-five seriously injured; thirty suffering from minor hurts.


This is the amount of human toll exacted by an inexcusable panic at a moving picture show in the Canonsburg opera house Saturday night.

The moving picture machine developed a slight defect. A small boy shouted "fire," at the same time starting for the narrow exit.

Bolus Dubrowsky, a foreign miner, a giant in proportions, jumped from his seat and ran wildly for the same exit. In a moment there was a fighting, struggling mass after him. At the head of a narrow stairway which led to the street the foreigner tripped. As he rolled down the stairs he swept others from their feet who were waiting their turn to enter the theater,

### Deaths Due to Dust.

A warning against the dangers of dust was issued recently by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, in which it is shown that the percentage of deaths caused by tuberculosis in dusty trades is more than double that for all employed men in the registration area of the United States. While among males generally in the registration area of the United States 14.5 per cent. of all deaths are from consumption the mortality among grinders from this disease is 49.2 per cent., and in hardly any of the dusty trades is it below 25 per cent. The percentage of deaths from tuberculosis among all those exposed to metalic dust is 36.9 per cent.; to mineral dust, 28.6 per cent.; to vegetable fibre dust, 28.8 per cent.; to mixed animal and other forms of dust, 32.1 per cent., to street dust, 25.5 per cent.; and to organic, or dust coming from the article being manufactured, 23 per cent.



Estate Not Held in Trust for Ten Years-Mother and Son to Divide at Once.

New York .- An announcement that the will made by John W. Gates in May, 1910, which was made public on the day of his funeral Wednesday, a moment, and then, turning slowly had been revoked by a will in March. 1911, was made Monday by attorneys who drew up the latter will. The document left all but \$1,000,000 in a trust fund for his widow and son, forbidding the sale of any of the securities for ten years. So far as the attorneys' statement shows, there is no provision of this sort in the new will, which gives the son a million dollars outright, \$2,000,000 in trust and the widow the remainder of the estate, with the exception of about \$700,000, which is divided among relatives and friends.

The attorneys' statement adds that Mrs. Gates, "in pursuance of the wishes of her husband, has arranged to turn over to her son a part of a portion of the estate bequeathed to her sufficiently large to make their share approximately equal."

The estate has been unauthoritatively estimated at \$30,000,000.

Happenings the Wide World Over of Important Events Condensed to Good Reading.

### WASHINGTON.

The democrats, the progressive republicans and the regular republicans will have their own programs for tariff revision legislation when congress reconvenes in December. This much was made clear Thursday. All three elements in the senate will be engaged in a great battle on the general subject of revision, the most important feature of the contemplated work of the regular session. Much of the trend of the fight will depend upon the report of the tariff board and the recommendations of the president in connection with that report.

President Taft will decide if the government, under the terms of the National bank act, can permit National banks to own interests in other banking institutions. Attorney General Wickersham and Secretary Mac-Veagh have disagreed on the question, which was raised by the attorney general's investigation of the relation of the National City bank of New York to the National City company. As a result all the papers in the case were sent to the president for his decision.

The estimates of the United States army for the next fiscal year, it was announced Wednesday, would in the aggregate be about the same as the amount appropriated by congress for the military establishment during the current year, which was \$94,210,400.

During the extra session of congress there were thirty-five presidential nominations which failed of confirmation by the senate and three nominations were rejected. The unconfirmed nominations include John Birdle for collector of customs at Pamlico, N. C., and thirty-one postmasters.

Champ Clark, speaker of the house of representatives, in a review of the work of the first session of the Sixtysecond congress, declared the democratic party set a good example for democrats everywhere and that the party had redeemed every promise it had made in the campaign of 1910 when the democrats wrested control from the republicans.

Chairman Fitzgerald of the house appropriations committee, in reviewing the work of the extra session, Tuesday stated that the appropriations of congress during the extra session aggregated \$301,005. He declared to go to Havre and is the largest cotthat no session of congress has even run for so long a period and appropriated so little. Mr. Fitzgerald declared that more than \$200,000 had been saved during the session by abolishing sinecures and cutting off gratuities heretofore granted congressional employes, and that further retrenchment was planned for the next session.

Birdman Atwood completed his flight from St. Louis to New York Friday, an air line distance of 1,265 miles, in 28 hours and 31 minutes, thus establishing a world's record for cross-country flights. He used the same machine throughout the journey, and, although he landed twenty times, only one was necessitated by any fault of his machine.

The increased price of meat, which the packers prophesied would result from this summer's drouth, has arrived. The wholesale price of the best grades of beef has jumped about 2½c in the last six days. Pork also is on the advance, pork loins selling at an advance of 5c over June 1.

No Insurmountable Obstacle to Industry in South.

### tices Followed by Successful Hog Raisers-Some of Difficulties Encountered.

(By G. H. ALFORD.) The following quotations give some of the actual practices followed by successful hog raisers and suggest some of the most serious obstacles likely to be encountered.

in speaking of raising hogs for pork, Mr. Foster of Louisiana says:

"I think two litters should be raised where winter pasture can be had cheaply; otherwise only a spring litter to be turned off at eight or nine months. In feeding breeding sows, I simply see that they are improving in flesh and strength and have laxative food before farrowing. If pasture does not keep their bowels in good condition, I feed bran or cottonseed meal for a short time previous to farrowing. On our plantation I put up 32,000 pounds of green bacon last winter at a cost of a little less than 3 cents per pound on corn and alfalfa pasture, charging corn at 40 cents per but charging nothing for fencing, shel- sorghums and Indian corn (in roast-

by February 1. The September pigs should be kept in good butchers' condition and sold as the market may demand.

"Before farrowing, sows should be kept in good, thrifty condition, but certainly not fat, with moderate exercise required, or at least provided for. After farrowing, the best and most nutritious and milk-producing food should be given-mashed and scalded oats, shorts, bran, corn meal, wet up with water, some green food, and pasture. Plenty of pure, clean water is desirable. The little pigs should be taught to drink skim milk, thin bran mashes, and the like as soon as possible. Later they should have a regular allowance of mashed oats, bran and corn meal, with such green food as may be available. I consider the common collard an excellent soiling food for hogs. The collard leaves are especially suited for growing stock of all kinds, but particularly for hogs. The plants should be set out one foot apart, in three-foot rows, in rich soil, in April. In a few weeks feeding may begin by pulling out every third plant and feeding them whole. Later, each alternate plant of those remaining may be removed and fed. After the patch has been thus thinned to one plant every three feet, commence to 'prime,' that is, pluck off one or more of the bottom leaves of each plant, and so on all summer and fall.

"Lucerne is an excellent soiling plant, better and more convenient bushel and pasture at \$5 per acre, than red clover. The saccharine
