He had a large tract of land planted in peanuts the past season but refused to sell because price for the nuts was only about fifty or sixty cents per bushel. About six weeks ago, Mr. Cooley penned two eight weeks old pigs, weigh ing fifty and sixty pounds In forty days following they were given nothing given nothing but peanuts and vater, a total of five bushels of ats were fed to them. When he hogs were first penned their weight was one hundred and ten ounds and at the end of the forty days the weight increased to one hundred and ninety one pounds, gaining a total weight of eighty one pounds In forty days. Quite a number of farmers are adopting this scheme as a result of the experiment.
