THE MESSENGER'S EXPENSES OF MARKET REVIEW

Houston, Texas, August 12 .government report on the condition of the growing crop, For District Judge: which is given as 76.5 per cent of the normal on July 25, as compared with 80.4 per cent on June 24 this year and 89.1 on on July 25 last year.

The area planted to cotton this year as previously reported by the Department of Agriculture in its preliminary estimate, is about 34,097,000 acres, or about 93 per cent of the acreage planted last year.

Altogether the government report is considered bullish and higher prices are inevitable.

For the general good of the growing crop in Texas a general rain is needed. In the main the weather throughout the State has been favorable, but more moisture is needed. Improvement in the condition of the crop is noted in the reports of correspondents.

The influx of California fruit combined with the great volume of Texas fruit is producing low prices in the Houston produce market. Peaches are in greatest supply and the bottom has dropped out of that market, even on choice stock. Southwest Texas onions are in liberal supply. The potato market is steady—Texas potatoes 90 cents to the trade and California potatoes \$1. The presence of so much green stuff on the market keeps potatoes at a slow sale.





Have You Any Worms?

Are the boll worms bothering your cotton? The report comes that in some places, and especially in young cotton, the boll worms are doing considerable damage. They have made their appearance within the last few days. However, it is the general opinion that they can be destroyed before any great amount of damage is done. Lots of poison has been purchased by the farmers and is being put on the cotton. It will be remembered that last year the worms made their appearance, but were destroyed in time to save the cotton. and there is no use to become unusually alarmed now.

It seems the I & G N people are taking their own good time to finish the depot. The foundation was completed about a month ago, and no work has been done since. A petition was circulated Saturday asking them to hurry the work, but we presume this will have no effect upon them. We do not see how the railroad can handle the business this fall without a depot, and on account of the vast amount of business the company does at this point, we believe we are entitled to more consideration than they are wont to give
