
HOUSTON COUNTY FAIR A SUCCESS

Crockett, Texas, Sept. 7 .-Despite the handicap of earliness and the fact that no move was made toward arranging for a poultry exhibit in connection with the fair until a little over two weeks ago, the new poultry building of the Houston County Fair Association was crowded with splendid quality birds at the opening of the show on Wednesday.

Though the building was not completed until Tuesday night, the birds were all in coops, properly ticketed, and judging finished by Wednesday night, and ribbons all up and premiums paid Thursday. Judge Davis placed the awards and complimented very highly the quality of the stock entered, especially White Wyandottes, and White and English Indian runner

Premiums were offered on the English and white runners, in singles and pens, the same as play premium for largest and best display of ducks, any variety, but not an American standard runner was entered. A fine string of white runners were sent from Houston and from Alto, besides the local exhibits, two single exhibitors having sixteen birds each.
