WANTS COUNTY 1915 RULES OF TO ORGANIZE

THE ROAD

Upon the discovery of an pproaching team, the automobilist must stopoffside and cover s machine with a blanket paintcenery.
2. The speed limit on country roads this year will be a secret and the penalty for violation will be $\$ 10$ for every mile an offender s caught going in excess of it.
3. In case an automobile nakes a team run away the penIty will be $\$ 50$ for the first mile and $\$ 100$ for the second, $\$ 200$ for he third, etc., that the team runs; in addition to the usual damages.
4. On approaching a corner, where the automobile cannot command a view of the road head, he must stop not less han 100 yards from the turn oot his horn, ring a bell, fire a volver, halloo and send up minutes.
5. Automobiles must again be seasonably painted; that is, so that they will merge with the pastoral ensemble and not be tartling.
6. Automobiles running on send up a roads at night must wait ten minutes for the road to clear. They may then proceed carefully, blowing their horns and shooting Roman candles nd shooing Roman candles. will give up Sunday to society automobiles, shooting and shouting at them, and otherwise discouraging country touring on that day.
8. In case a horse will not pass an automobile, the automo s will take the machine apart ceal the parts in the grass 9. In case an automobile proaches a house when the roads are dusty it will slow down to mile an hour and the chauffer will sprinkle the dust in front o (Signed) The Committee.
