to the department that he found everything in good shape-increased library and laboratory equipment, good showing made in agr:culture last season, splendid school spirit and commendable progress. Writing to Supt. Sims, Mr. Doughty says:
"Permit me to urge that the school continue to suppiement school continue to suppeement
its equipment and increase its its equipment and increase its
standards until it complies fully with requirements for an approved high school, Class A. In case the ordinary school funds prove insufficient, I wish to advise that adequate revenues may be provided if the district is willing to avail itself of a recent decision of the supreme court, which empowers boards of equalwhich empowers woards of equal
ization in independent districts to assess property values for school purposes above the county and state rate. This increase
for school purposes will not affect in any manner the rate of county and state tax. Many districts in the state are resorting to this practical and equitable means of providing funds for schools."
This means that our board of trustees have the power to assess property in the district at a higher valuation than is given to the county and state, but in order to do this the district must lector. Our school has always been handicapped for funds, and as this decision of the supreme court opens up a way to in
crease the income, we believe it crease the income, we believe it
