Accordingly, a petition to Superintendent J. N. Snell was cre ated and nearly everyone of the county teachers signed asking the Superintendent to devise plans to that end, and pledging not only our support, but indi idual attendance.
We are very glad to be able to report that as a result of needed information, help and timely di rection by our efficient Supt., the normal has been granted.
The Committee appointed by the Supt. attended a District meeting in Jacksonville, which resulted in the union of the fol lowing counties: Trinity, Ander son, Cherokee, Freestone, Rusk Henderson and Houston and plans were made for a largely attended normal.
Quite a contest arose, when the question of location came up. The contesting towns up Athens, Jacksonville and Crock Athens, Jacksonville and Crock forts of our good white business men, who never forsake the law abiding and deserving negro in a needy time, we were able to locate the Normal at Crockett. We are so thankful to them for their indespensable help and will daily strive to deport our selves in such a worthy way that they will have no occasion to regret having come to our rescue.

F Bogue, in making it possible for us to have the building accommodations to offer in order to secure recognition from the State Supt. of a Normal located here. Such mother must have resided in Texas five years preceding the application and two years in the county in which she applies. The pension $\$ 12$ per month: $\$ 18$ for two child ren, and $\$ 4$ per month for each additional child, no child to be over 25 years of age.
