Canning Beans, Snap Peas, Okra: Prepare the vegetables "as you would for a meal, only do not cut off the stem of the okra Blanch for ten minutes by dipping in a pot of boiling water. Pack in jars to within an inch of the top. Add one teaspoonful of salt to the quart, then fill with water moderately hot. Put the filled jars in water and cook one hour each day for three days. If on the third day the water has gone down in the jars pour

Only Sure Way Is to Keep Things Cleaned Up.

Prevent Pests Breeding, and There Will Be No Problem to Solve in
Hot Weather-Manure Pile and Garbage Pall.

The only rational and sure way to get rid of the fly is to prevent breed
ing-clean up. Next to keeping the ing-clean up. Next to keeping the
premises cleaned up, the most impor premises cleaned up, the most impor
tant thing is to keep the houses well screened. Those that do get into the home should be killed. It is especially
important to kill those that mportant to kill those that appear
early in the season. One fly killed early in the season. One fly killed
now means millions less in August. The house fly breeds, usually, in fresh manure. The more of this waste that is allowed near the house the more will the dwelling be infested
with flies. Not only do files breed to filth, but they have flithy habits. They are distributors of disease zerms o all kinds, including tuberculosis germs. Extreme care should be taken, there
