



## "MY TURN"

SINCE MOST of us have about had it up to here with politics, let's talk about something else...anything else.

Are you superstitious? Do you worry just a little bit when a black cat runs across the street in front of your car? Do you say "bless you" every time someone sneezes?

In spite of the fact that most of us deny having the slightest interest in superstition, half the people in our country today do believe that good or bad luck in our personal lives, can be attributed to an unknown "something."

A survey taken several years ago revealed that seventy-three per cent of the population emphatically denied, sometimes with indignation, that they were the slightest bit superstitious. But the denials were weakened after close questioning revealed little habits or customs in their daily lives which indicated some degree of superstitious influence.

Most tall buildings do not number a thirteenth floor. That is not to say that there IS no thirteenth floor, but that it is just not numbered as such. Many hotels, hospitals and office buildings do not have a room numbered thirteen. Very few businessmen would dare venture to start a new business on Friday the thirteenth. Many people will not have a dinner party with thirteen people seated at the table.

Some of the most frequently practiced bad luck/good luck superstitions are: breaking a mirror brings seven years' bad luck; do not walk under a ladder; if you boast about good fortune, knock on wood three times to keep good luck from changing; make a wish when you see a falling star; lighting three cigarettes on one match is bad luck; when salt is spilled, you should throw a little over the left shoulder; carrying a rabbit's foot, four-leaf clover or horseshoe brings good luck; and never, never open an umbrella in the house. One of the most persistent superstitions which is alive and well today is the belief that bad things, such as deaths, always happen in threes.

Some superstitions which are not as well known are: you should leave a house by the same door you entered; when leaving on a trip, you should not go back into the house even if you've forgotten something important, like your suitcase; when you give a friend a knife as a present, he must give you a penny, so it will not cut the ties of friendship; never take the broom along when you are moving to a new house; when cooking, always beat your eggs, cake batter, or whatever in a clockwise direction; if you look at the new moon over your right shoulder you'll have good luck for the next month; and never ever sing before breakfast.

Quite a few superstitions abound in the world of sports. The great American pastime, baseball, leads all other sports in devotion to omens and eccentricities. Players will often use the same "lucky" glove for many years. When a player goes up to bat, he must leave his glove on the ground with the fingers pointing to his own team's dugout. Having a "southpaw" on the team brings good luck. A dog crossing the playing field brings disaster. If a man has the opportunity to touch the hump of a hunchback before going to the plate, he is sure to get a hit.

The Friona Chieftains could use a bit of luck this season. Some of the superstitions connected with football are: no player ever wears the number thirteen; backfield men never step on the field lines; players always wear the same number for each game; players never have their picture taken before the start of a game; spitting on the hands before each play is good; a red-headed female fan in the stands brings good luck. Let's all dye our hair red for the next game!

## Chieftain Band Earns Regional UIL Event

Friona High School's Chieftain Marching Band scored a Division I rating and was one of the two bands chosen as Regional Qualifiers at the District I UIL Marching Band competition at Borger last Saturday.

Of the eight schools competing in Friona's AAA classification, Canyon and Friona qualified to compete in a regional competition on Saturday, October 29 at Wichita Falls.

In a break from recent tradition, FHS bandmaster Jim Parker entered the band in the northern district's competition rather than entering the marching competition at Texas Tech, and the decision paid big dividends.

## K. Goddard New Manager

Mrs. Goddard began her duties the first of this past week. She has been a Friona resident since 1973. Prior to moving to Friona, Mrs. Goddard was a director and teacher at the Heritage Hall School in Lubbock for four years.

She served as assistant Dean of Women at Texas Tech University, June, 1967 to September, 1968, and was responsible for off-campus housing and worked with the Director of Housing for the women's residence halls.

From August of 1964 to June of 1966, Mrs. Goddard served as traveling collegiate secretary for the Alpha Delta Pi Sorority, traveling all over the U.S. visiting colleges and universities with responsibility in the areas of leadership development and officer training.

She is presently a member of the Friona School board, serving as vice president, and is vice chairman of the board of trustees

"This is the first year we have had a realistic chance to qualify for regional since the bands have been competing in marching to a state final," Parker said.

He explained that the Lubbock group contains more class AAA bands, including an area far to the south of Lubbock.

In choosing the bands for regional competition, the bands first have to make a Division I rating. After that, the judges use a point system. The two bands with the highest point totals qualify to move on in the UIL competition.

Friona will now compete at the Wichita Memorial Stadium, a modern astro-turf stadium, at 12:13 p.m. October 29. Also competing from the Fort Worth area will be Fort Worth Bowie and Bridgeport, along with two other class AAA schools not decided.

The regional area involved consists of the northern part of the state, and does not include the South Plains. The bands competing at Wichita Falls will be from Districts I, II and V.

At the regional competition, bands will once again be rated, with the two highest-rated bands qualifying for the state marching competition in Austin in November.

At the District I contest, the FHS band had to beat out some topnotch bands from this area. Bands from Dalhart, Dimmitt and Sanford-Fritch also gained a

Division I rating, with Tulia and River Road bands being given a II rating.

In their competition, the Chieftain band gave the same performance it has given in recent halftime shows. The band played "On Broadway," "Tuxedo Junction," "The Entertainer," and "Stand By Me."

The Chieftain band is under the field direction of drum majors Deena Willard and J'Mai Cash.

Comments from the three judges included: "Well rehearsed show! Attention to detail. Good show design. Music is controlled and played stylistically correct. Nice trombone solo and horn duet. Fine band with fine directors. I enjoyed your performance." (Keith Bearden of Texas Tech)

"Playing generally well-balanced and pleasing...An enjoyable show, but keep working!" (David Christy of Elk City, Oklahoma)

"Good opening sound and balance. Good dynamic change on second tune. Enjoyed the control you exhibited with your sound. Nice mallets at the end. Good show design--conservative but good. Congratulations to you and your director." (Leslie Ross of Lockney)

## Weather Remains Gorgeous

The weather in the Friona area continued to be perfect fall weather this week, with no hint of a frost or freeze as yet. Residents awoke on Friday to a dense fog, but this burned off by mid-morning.

Farming operations continued unabated. Corn harvest is virtually complete, according to Ron Smiley, manager of Friona Wheat Growers. Smiley said that the maize crop was still in the process of maturing.

"It will take a freeze to get the maize ready to harvest, in most cases," Smiley said.

The open weather also has helped the cotton somewhat, although it probably is not helping its production too much at this point. "I think most farmers are needing it to freeze, so the crop will be ready to harvest," said Jerry Butman, manager of Friona Farmers Co-op Gin. There has not been a bale of cotton ginned in the Friona area for 1988.

The temperature reached a high of 89 on Monday, October 17, and the lowest for the week was a reading of 41 degrees.

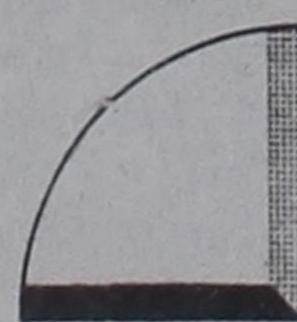

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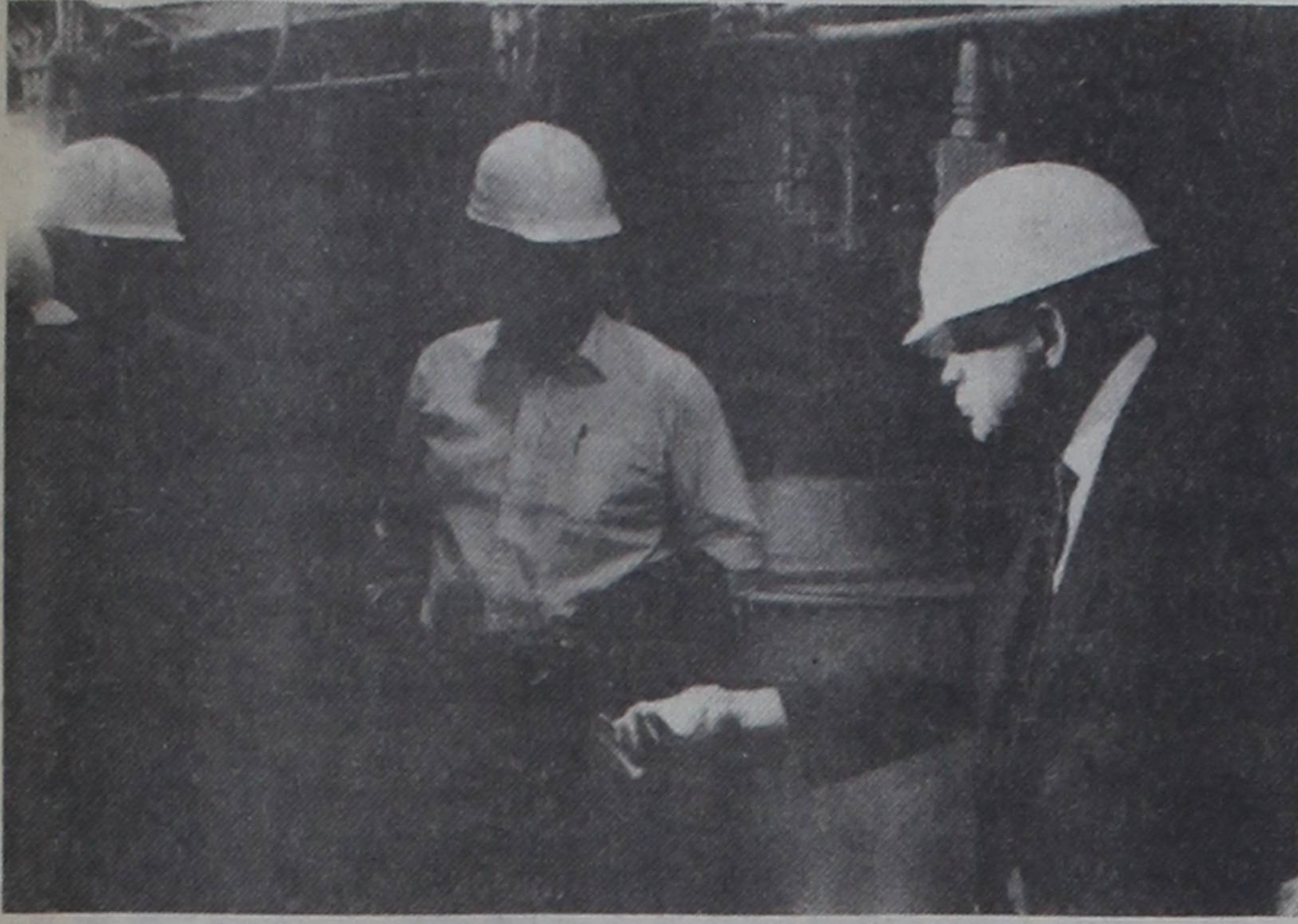

# Hornets 'Steal' Win In Fading Minutes

The Friona Chieftain footballers made a valiant bid for an upset win last Friday night, and outplayed the favored Tulia Hornets in every aspect of the game.

However, the Chiefs made some costly errors, and got some bad calls from the officials, giving the Hornets three short touchdown drives, and Tulia made off with an 18-13 district win.

FHS used the running of Ben Osborn to stun the visitors with a 13-0 lead in the first quarter, and seemed about to widen their lead in the second quarter before misfortune began to lay its hand on the upset-minded Chieftains.

The Chiefs drove with the ball for 67 yards the first time they had the ball to take the early lead. Osborn gained 38 yards in eight carries, although Andre Duran had the biggest gainer of the drive, a 29-yard burst around left end.

On a third and goal play from the Tulia one, Osborn crashed into the end zone for the TD. Cody Burney's kick split the uprights and Friona had a 7-0 lead with 5:53 gone in the opening period.

The Chiefs had forced Tulia to punt on their opening series, and they did it again following the kickoff, and reclaimed the ball at their own 36 following the kick.

On their next offensive series, Burney hit wingback Jacky Lafuente on a 38-yard pass gain that would have carried to the Tulia 28. But a clipping penalty at the end of the play moved the ball back to the Tulia 48-yard line.

Two plays later, however, Tulia was flagged for pass interference, and Friona had regained the lost yardage.

Burney gained six yards on a keeper play, Osborn burst through the line for eight more, and Burney went around end for an 11-yard gain to the Tulia one, setting Friona up first and goal.

Osborn again cracked the line for the touchdown. Burney's kick was good, but Friona was flagged for illegal procedure and had to re-kick. This time the kick hit a lineman and the Chiefs had to settle for a 13-0 lead.

At this point in time, with 1:33 left in the opening period, Friona led in penetrations 2-0, in first downs, 9-0, and in total yardage, 133-5.

But the Hornets, who were outplayed throughout the game by the

underdog Chieftains, began to display a lucky charm.

Their first break came when Lafuente misplayed a Tulia punt after Friona had once again held, and Tulia was able to recover at the Friona 24.

The Hornets took advantage and scored three plays later when quarterback Darrin Morris passed to wingback Donnie White. The Chieftain defense blocked the PAT try, and Friona led, 13-6 with 9:41 left in the second quarter.

The Chiefs converted a fourth down gamble for a first down from midfield to the Tulia 44 when Burney slammed for six yards on a quarterback sneak, and it looked like the Chieftains were on another scoring drive.

But a holding penalty shoved the Chieftains back into their own end of the field, and after Burney was sacked on a passing attempt, Friona was forced to punt.

Duran bobbed the snap from center, and elected not to kick the ball. Tulia took over on Friona's 30 after their defense brought Duran down behind the line.

Once again the Hornets converted the mistake into points. A pass worked for 14 yards, and White raced ten yards for the touchdown. Once again the Tulia kick was no good, and Friona still had a 13-12 lead. That was the halftime score.

The second time Friona had the ball in the third quarter, the Chieftains again put together a serious drive.

Burney gave the team a first down with a quarterback sneak, and Osborn ran eight yards to Friona's 44 for another first down.

Then Jacky Lafuente took the ball on a reverse play and ran all the way to the Tulia 29 before being stopped—a 27-yard gain.

But three plays later, as Burney was being chased on a pass play, his pass was intercepted at the Hornet eight to ruin the scoring chance. The Chiefs had a receiver in the end zone, but Burney didn't have a good chance to deliver the ball.

The Chieftain defense kept turning back the Hornet offense, but adversity kept plaguing FHS.

Duran's fumble at the Friona 11 gave the Hornets a good scoring chance with four minutes to play. But the defense bore down and forced Tulia to try a field goal, which wobbled to the left and

Friona held its 13-12 lead with 2:48 remaining in the game.

However, facing third and nine from the Friona 21, Burney's low pass was intercepted by Tulia's White, who made a diving catch at the Friona 32.

White then caught a 12-yard pass and a face-mask penalty against Friona on the tackle advanced the ball to their 15.

Morris passed to Trey Nevins for 11 yards, and then carried in himself from four yards left, and the opportunistic Hornets had grabbed an 18-13 lead. A passing try for two points fell incomplete.

Jeff Stowers returned the kick to his own 30, and a personal foul penalty against the Hornets advanced the ball to the Friona 45.

But Burney was rushed on four straight passing tries, being sacked twice for losses of 11 and eight yards, and his last two throws fell incomplete and that was the ball game.

sively and defensively, but kept killing ourselves with mental mistakes. We contained their speed real well," said a disappointed Coach Tommy Moss.

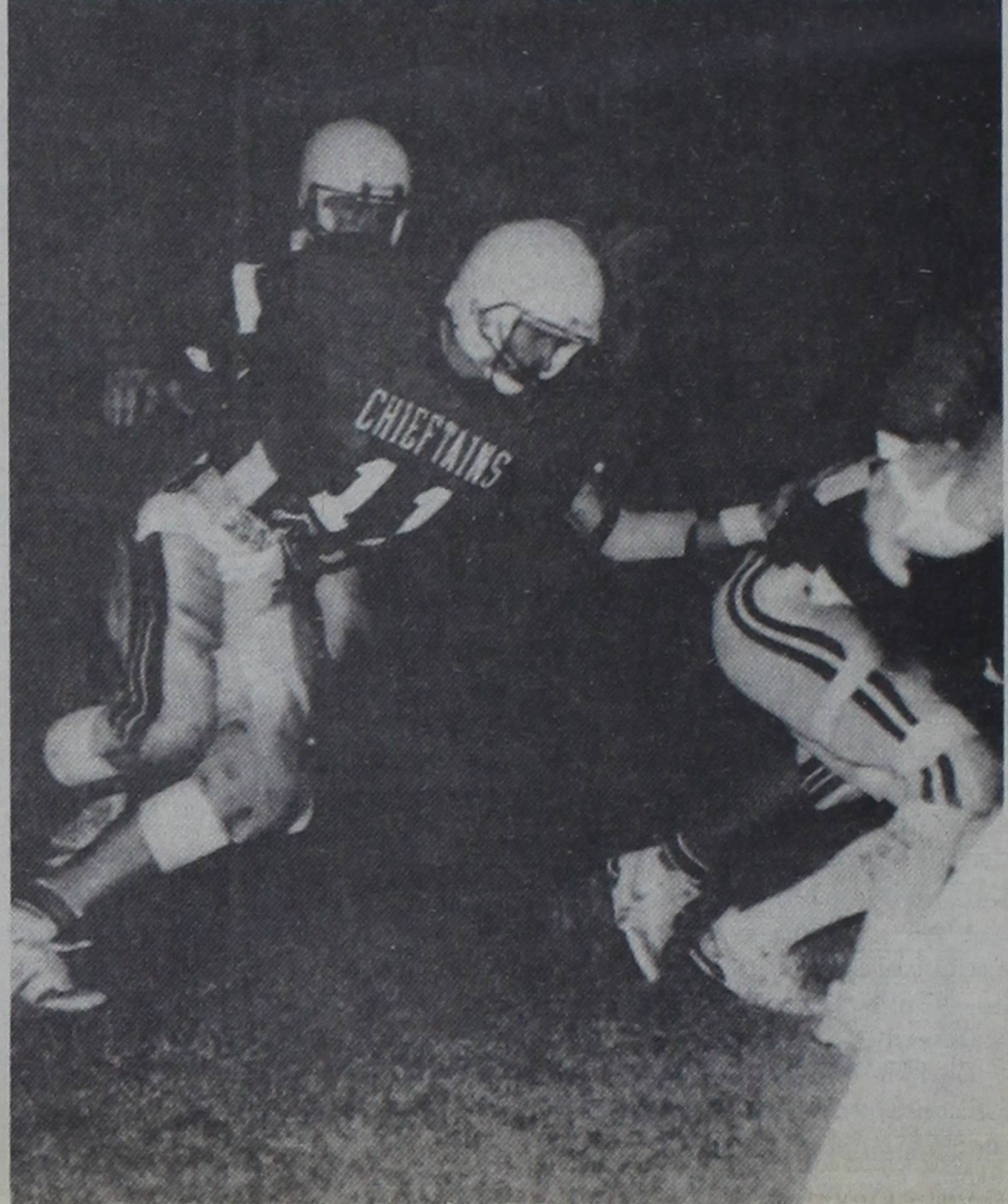
Moss does not usually criticize officials, but felt the crew calling the game was a bit out of balance as Friona was flagged for 120 yards to 40 for the visitors.

Parker, director of bands in the Friona School System, has taught in Friona for the past six years.

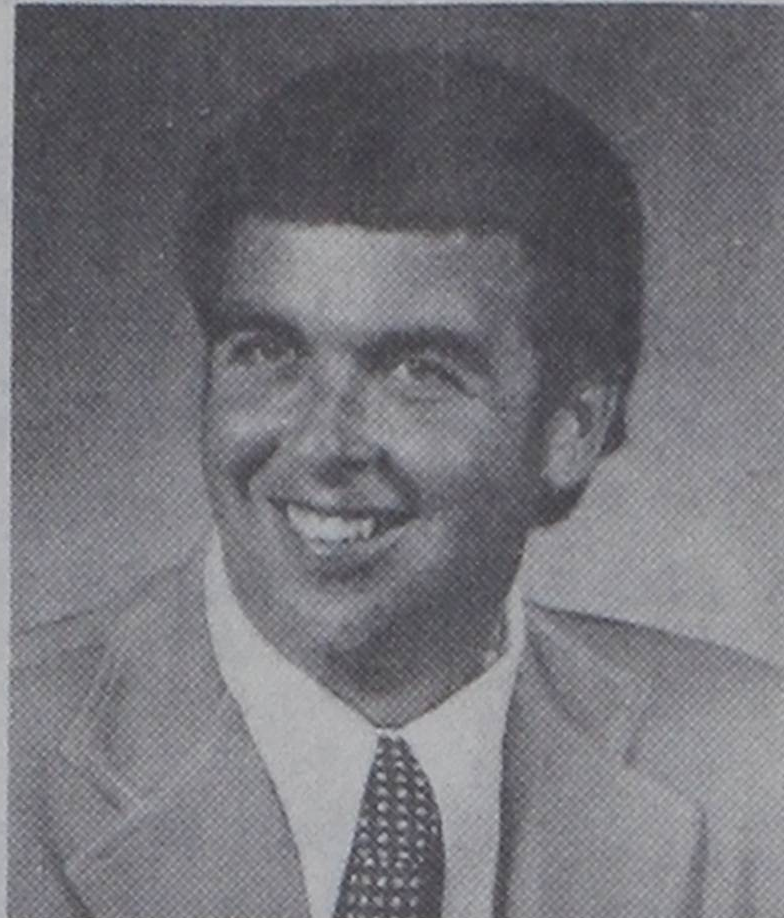
He is a native of Dublin, Texas, and moved to Friona from the Borden County School District.

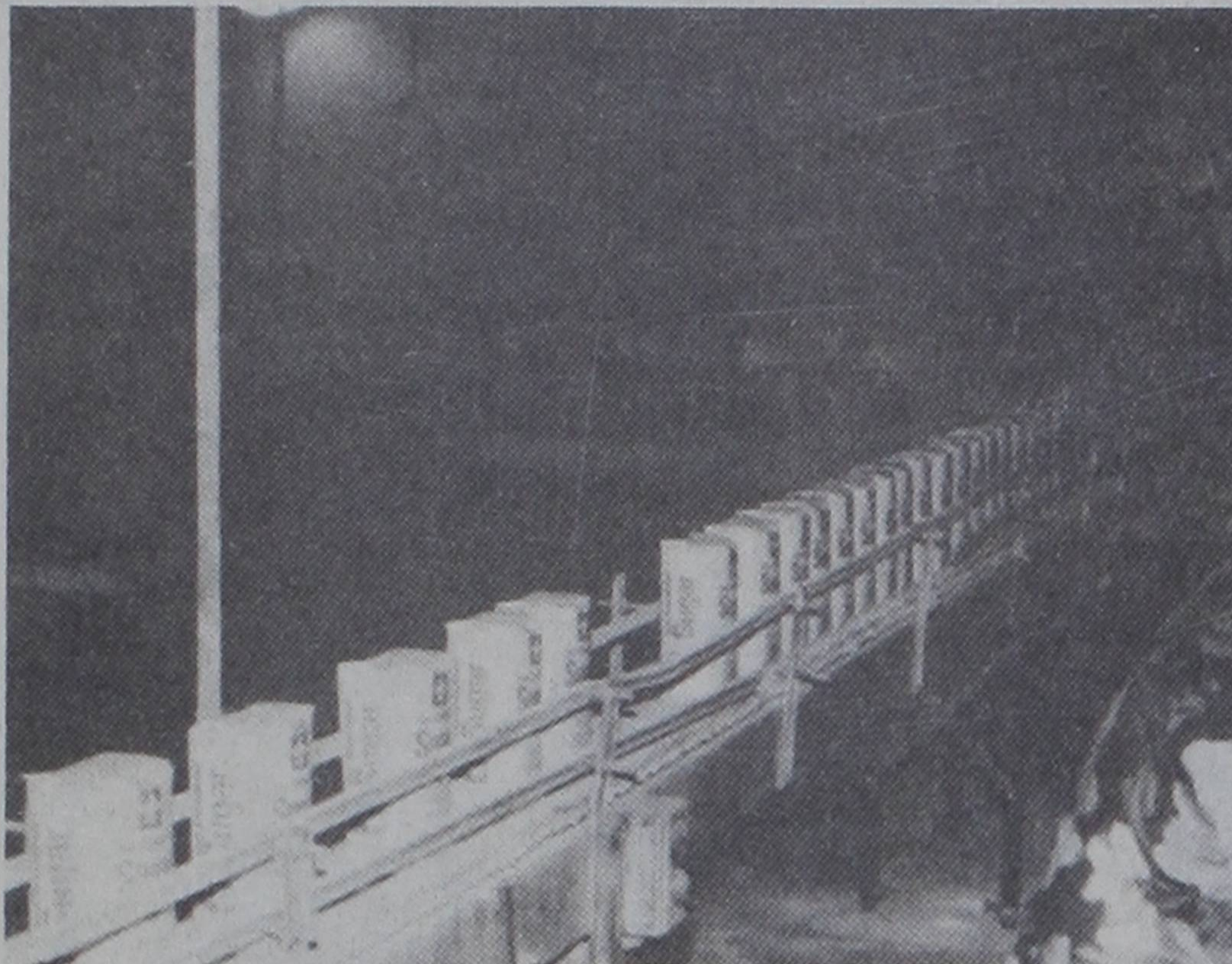

glasses for needy children, Secret Pals, Christmas shopping spree, award for Outstanding Young Homemaker, and honoring Senior Citizens through cards and gifts.

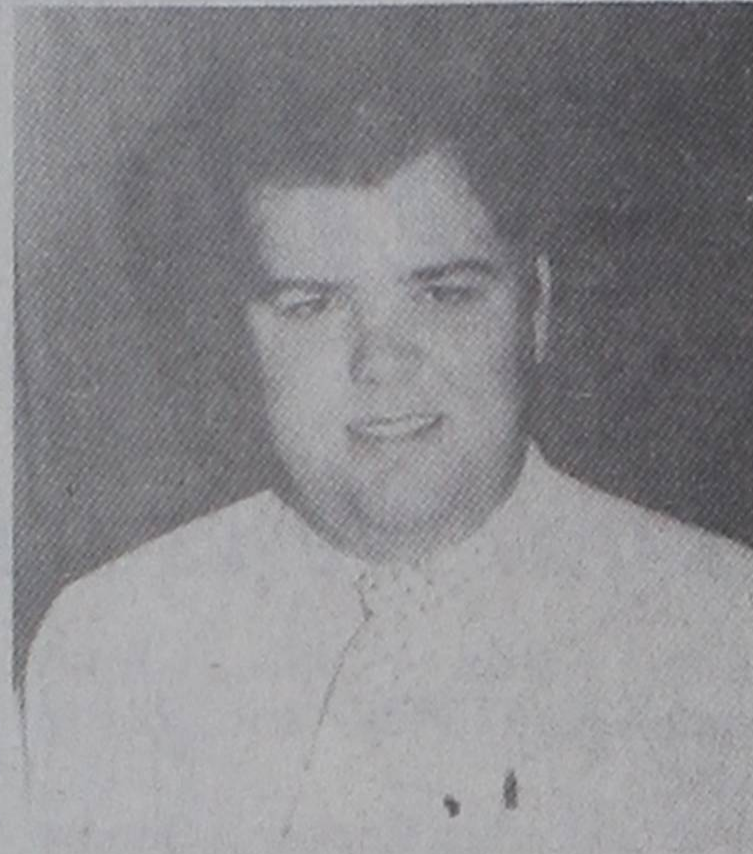
