"One hour from the fleld to the can" is a motto that every canner should have to peepare utensils and wash and scald have been brought into the house. The
condition of these is a prime factor in determining the quality of the finished product. Unless they are absolutely
fresh, crisp, and clean when they are put into the cens, a high-grade article
is impossible. When canning in small quantities, it Is not necessary to purchase special
equipment, although inexpenss ve pordoors may be purchased. If consider-
able canning is done, such outfits wIII prove convenient and save labor. Es-
pecially is this true when a comfortable out-of-door place can be selected The method of packing fruits and
vegetables into containers and sterilizing the product after it is packed has superseded to a very large extent the
old plan of cooking the food in an old plan of cooking the food in an
open kettle, transferring it hot to the
jar, and sealing without any further Jar, and sealing without any further
sterilization. Since this is true, the first consideration is a sterillzing ves-
sel. This is sometimes called a processor. Cooking the food in the jar
to sterillze it is known as processing This cooker must be large enough to Jars and must be fitted with a false
bottom and a tight cover. A wash bottom and a tight cover. A wasb
boiler, bucket, or galvanized tub can be used for a processor. It may be nsed on the kitchen stove or placed
on a furnace built out of doors. One important factor is to be able to bring the water in this cooker quickly to the rack which keeps the jars from coming
 in contact with the metal which is next
to the frame. This prevents breakage.
Racks made of strips Racks made of strips of woods are
probably the best. Sometimes wire netting, or perforated galvanized trays,
are used. If the latter material is used, it should be ralsed about 1 inch
or 2 inches above the bottom of the

Three types of canning outfits can be purchased. These are the hot-wa-
ter, water-seal, ter, water-seal, and steam-pressure
outtits. The first is merely a convenlent form of the outfit described above. and therefore accomplish the necessary sterilization in a shorter time

Exhausting and Sterilizing.
The next step is to exhaust the air from the cans. To do this, they should
be placed in trays and lowered into be placed In trays and lowered into
boiling water to within one inch of boilling water to within one inch of
the top. Ordinarily three minutes is the top. Ordnarily three minutes is
long enough for the cans to remain in the water, which need not be brought
again to the bolling point before the zans are taken out. A temperature of 180 degrees $\mathbf{F}$. Is frequently sufficient
tor exhausting. Failure to exhaust results in the air which is left in the
san expanding. This causes the can an expanding. This causes the can
to bulge and gives the appearance of a "swell," which will not only prevent the sale of that can, but prefucices cus-
tomers in future. The leaders in the government canning work insist that wherever the "4-H Brand" label is used, exhaustlug should be done. After exhausting, the small hole in
the top of the can must be closed tmthe top of the can must be closed im-
mediately. To do this, apply flux for capping and use a little wire solder to close the hole. Hold the solder with the left hand near the hole and barely touch the hot copper to it, so
that only a bead will drop. that only a bead will drop.
It now remains to sterlif It now remains to sterillze the con-
tents of the sealed cans. For beans, corn, peas and asparagus, intermittent processing is recommended. Under
this method sterilization is this method sterilization is carried on for one hour for three successive days.
The cans are lowered slowly under The cans are lowered slowly under
water that is boiling vigorously at the water that is boiling vigorously at the
time. Naturally it ceases to boil as soon as the cans are immersed, but
will begin to bofl again a short time will begin to boll again a short time
later. The time of processing is counted from the moment when the water begins to boil again, and it must be kept bolling constantly throughout the entire hour. In the case of very young
string beans and some other ensily string beans and some other easily
sterilized vegetables, the processing is reduced to one hour for two successive days.
As soon ns the processing is over, the cans should be cooled as rapidly
as possible in order to stop cooking which breaks order to stop cooking. Sures the flavor and color. It is well to plunge the cinns into very cold wa-

cold. The labeling should be done with a

Milwaukee, Wis., Aug. 1, 1917 Editor Messenger: We are having some hot dry weather here now, the first hot weather we have had this year it was a trequent thing to see people wearing heavy clothes in July, but let me tell you they are wearing just as few as the law allows now. The small grain crop here is going to be as good as was ever known here I guess, but corn is not so good. There is plenty of corn that is not two feet high. The farmers are beginning ut their small grain such barley and wheat and I want to beer. There are more saloons in Milwaukee now than was ever in the state of Texas at one time, but one does not see much drunkenness. runkenness. I notice Mr. Fisher at Crockett is trying to get the farmers to raise wheat for their own bread. I wish to add to what he has so nobly said, this, I think that would be one of the best things the farmers of Houston county could do. I was talking with and was told they raise their wheat, take a load of it to the mill, get it made into flour and the high prices of flour has no terror for them. In other words if the armers of the United Stater armers of the United States and especially Texas, particularly Houston county, would turn their time and attention to raising more for home use than for selling, it would be better for all. Then let us hope that at no distant date the farmers of Houston county will rally to the call of Mr. Fisher, put their shoulders to the wheel and make a success of raising their own flour. It can be done if there are enough who will join in and try to make it a go. Will they do it?
