Phillips Is Endorsed For Senate

Late-Night Brawl Leaves One Man Dead

A 41-year-old Friona man was dead, and two others injured following a late-night brawl last weekend in Friona.

Michael Diaz, Jr. was pronounced dead at Parmer County Community Hospital after being shot by a 12-gauge shotgun.

Friona Police Chief Lloyd Niece said that Diaz had been attending a get-together at 808 Jackson, in the home of Juaquin Lopez. The hosts were said to have been planning a baptismal service.

A group of uninvited guests allegedly crashed the "party" at about 3 a.m. and a fight developed and Michael Diaz, Jr. was shot.

Sometime during the fray, Mike Diaz III got in his Trans-Am automobile and ran down a couple of people in apparent retaliation for the shooting.

Police officers said that the young Diaz may have also backed his automobile over the father's body. The car also struck the house, hitting a water line and flooding the residence.

Police officer Jim Davis, one of the investigating officers, suffered some scratches and abrasions as he

Dimmitt Man Killed In Wreck Here

A Dimmitt man, Tony Smithers, 20, was killed early Monday morning when his car was struck by a Santa Fe freight train as he attempted to cross the tracks a mile east of Friona.

Smithers was driving his car north on a county road which approaches the intersection with U.S. Highway 60 when it was struck by the westbound train at about 7:30 a.m., according to DPS trooper Rick Uribe.

Uribe said that Smithers evidently did not see the train, and said there were no skid marks or other evidence that indicated that he might have tried to stop before the accident.

He added that the train's crew said they did not see Smithers coming, but that the crew sounded the train's horn before approaching the crossing.

Smithers was on his way to work at Millard Warehouse in Friona from his home in Dimmitt.

Services were held Thursday afternoon in Hereford, with burial in Restlawn Memorial Park.

Smithers was born in Hereford and was a member of Temple Baptist Church.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. LeeRoy Smithers of Hereford; a sister, Elisa Smithers of Friona; a stepbrother, Chris Arellano of Hereford; and his grandmothers, Mrs. Walter Tolpitts of Wallowa, Oregon and Mrs. Elisa Soto of Mexico.

The Friona Chieftain marching band will compete in the UIL Regional Marching competition Saturday at Wichita Falls.

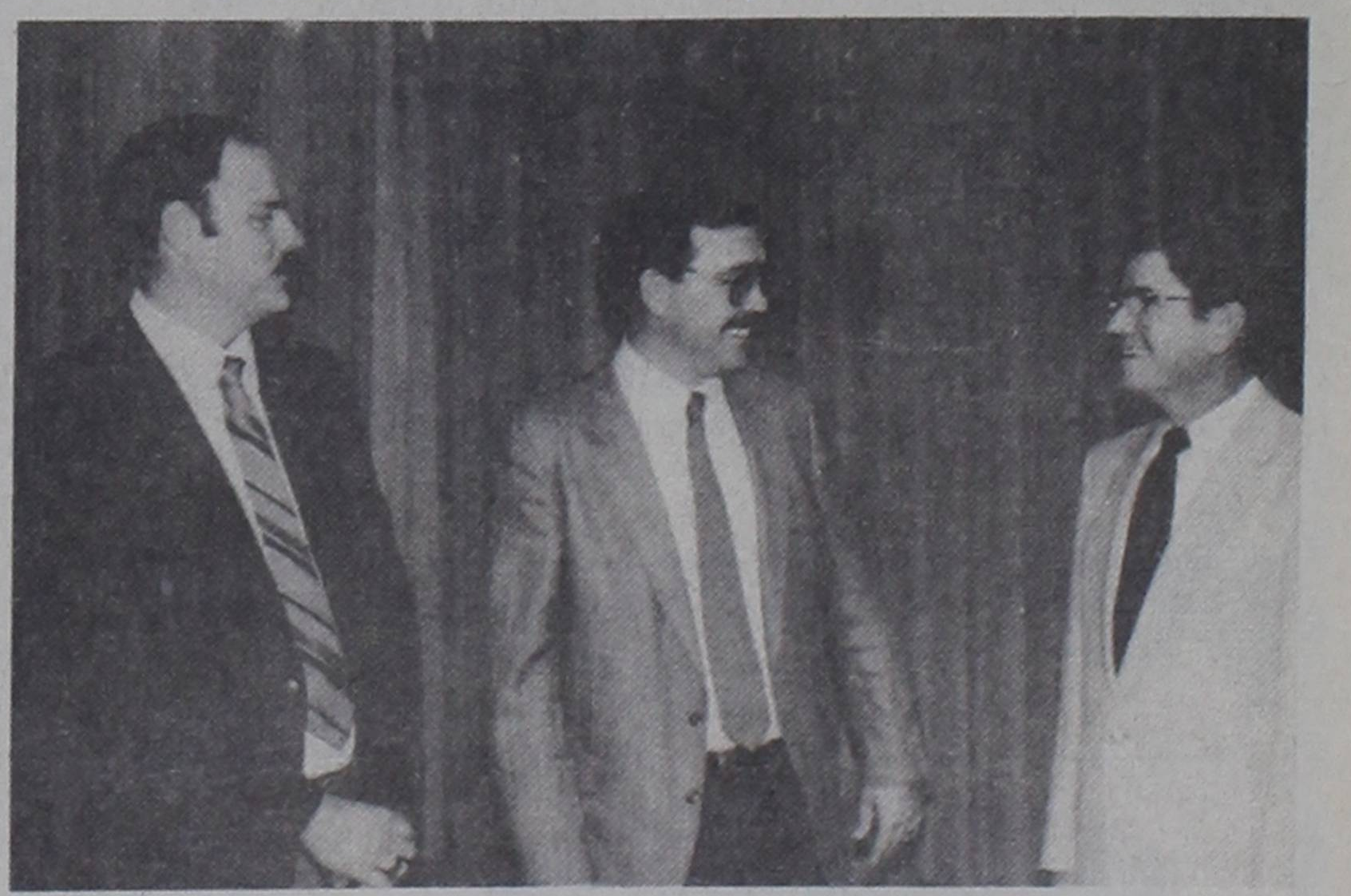
The Friona High School band will be one of six bands at the regional competition, which will include bands from the Fort Worth-Dallas area and even further east.

10 YEARS AGO—OCT. 22, 1978

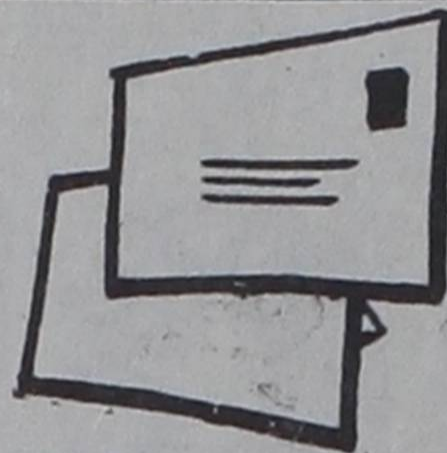

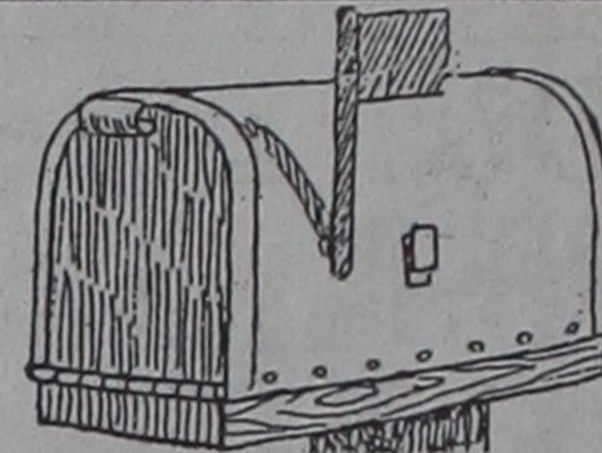
5 YEARS AGO—OCT. 23, 1983

Dear Bill,

This is in response to the letter of October 22, 1988, from Garvin Thorn regarding Gerald McCathern's farm program proposals and Congressman Larry Combest's opposition to a mandatory supply management farm program. As noted in this letter, Mr. Thorn supports this type of program which would stifle growth and put more government control on the farmer.

The USDA has estimated that a mandatory supply management program would eliminate 2.2 million jobs, 553,000 of which

would be farm production jobs. Larry Combest has supported the voluntary supply management features contained in the 1985 Food and Security Act which idled over 80 million acres in 1988 through diversion and the conservation reserve program.

Mr. Thorn writes about countries "lined up at our gates" to buy \$7.00/cwt corn. I wonder when the Democratically controlled congress repealed the economic laws of supply and demand. While \$7.00 corn would certainly be welcome, if it is not justified by the supply/demand relationships that exist in the world market, countries will be "lined up at the gates" of South America and Europe.

In 1987, 22 per cent of the demand for our corn was in the export markets. A mandatory supply management program with price supports set at levels out of line with the world market will encourage foreign production expansion. Ultimately we would be producing for ourselves and a shrinking export market.

Gerald McCathern's proposed farm program is unlike the farm program Congressman Larry Combest supports, one that provides a mechanism for U.S.

farmers to compete in world markets while providing necessary income support through the price deficiency features of the 1985 farm bill. Congressman Combest and the Congress have recognized that the "market" is much better at balancing supply/demand and allocating production resources than a bureaucrat in Washington.

It is easy: you can either vote for more government control over the people, or vote for a person who represents West Texas on the House Agriculture Committee and in the U.S. House of Representatives, providing leadership and a strong voice for the people of the 19th District—Congressman Larry Combest.

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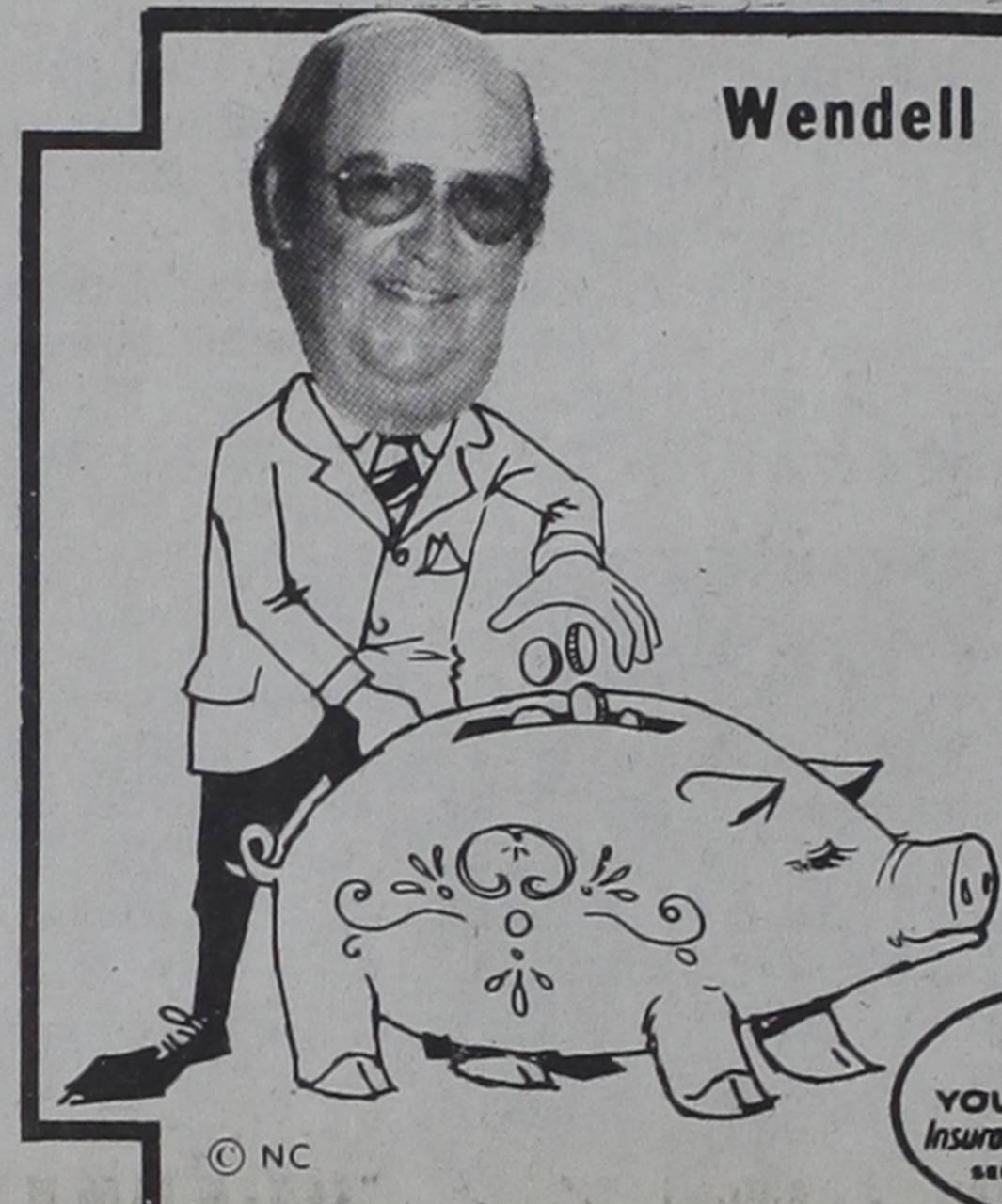

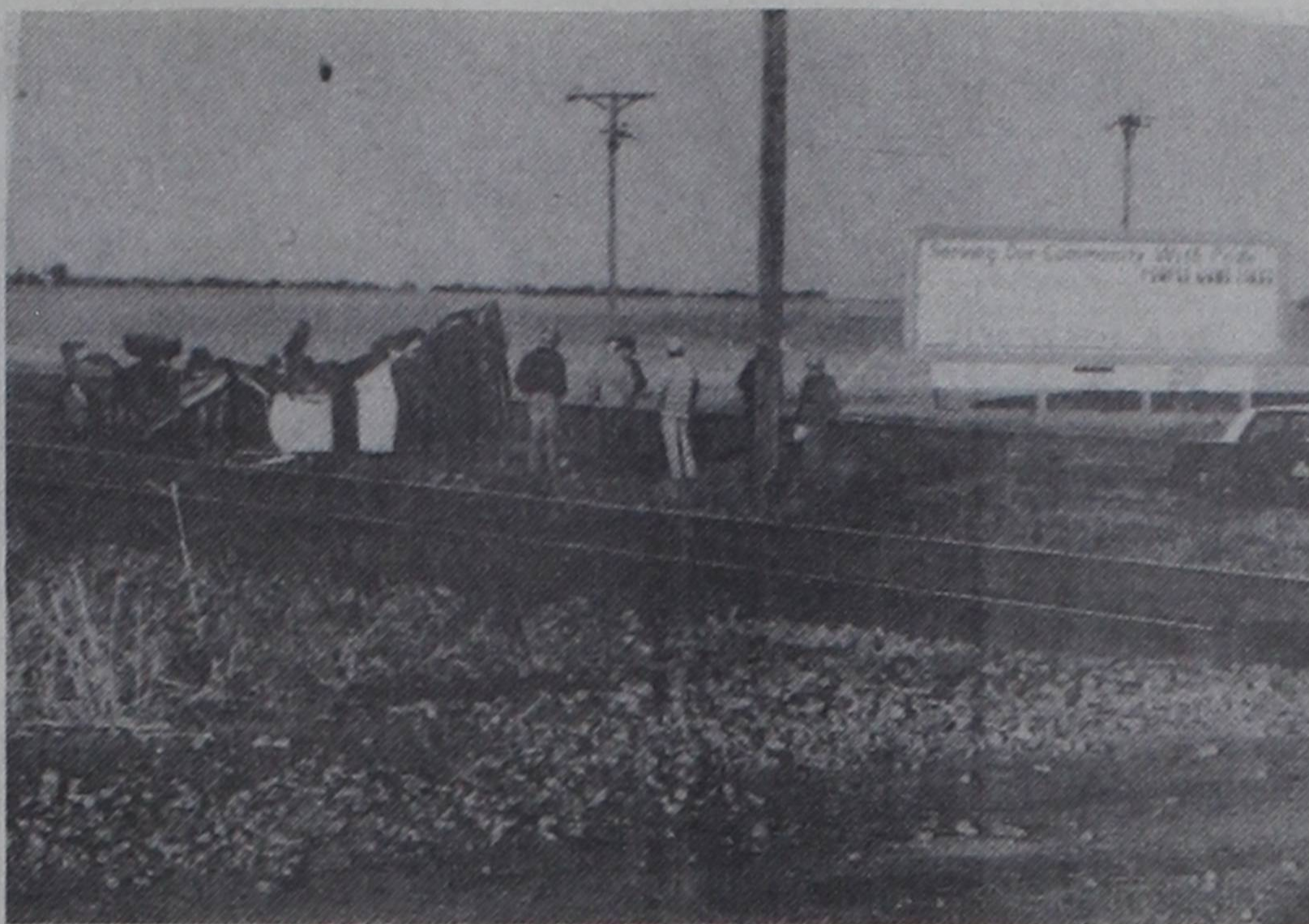
Vance Rites Are Held In Sunray

Serving will be at St. Ann's Parish Hall on Third Street in Bovina, Texas.

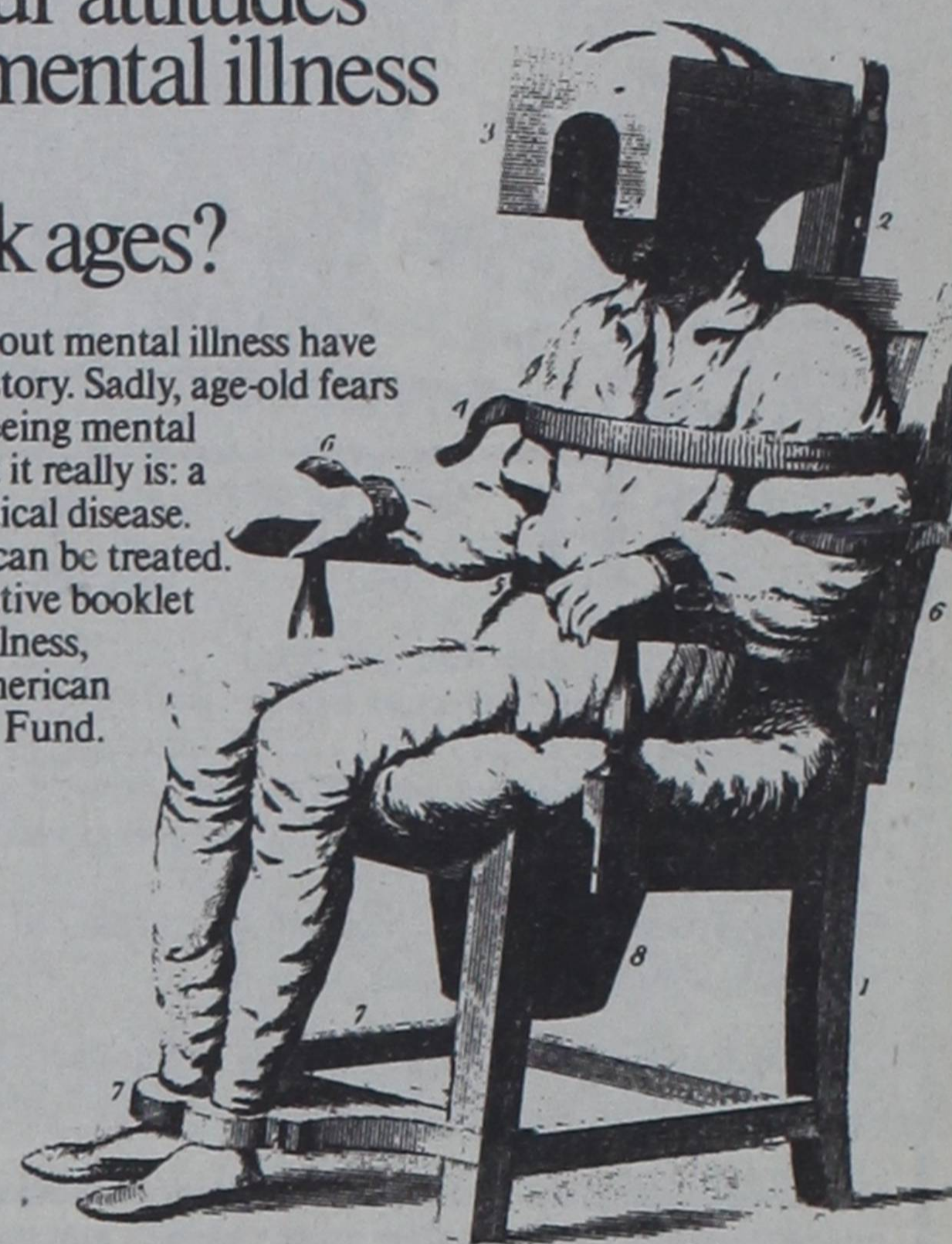
DPS Gives Accident Summary

Capt. Bob Russell, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the month of September, our troopers investigated four fatal accidents, sixty personal injury accidents, and 99 property damage accidents. There were six persons killed and 85 persons injured in these accidents."



Ejection Hurts Team In Loss To Dimmitt

The Dimmitt Bobcats traded a defensive end for Friona's starting fullback Ben Osborn last Friday, and the "trade" paid huge dividends in the 27-12 win by the Bobcats in the district game at Dimmitt.

Osborn, who has carried the bulk of Friona's offensive load, was ejected from the game along with Dimmitt's Jason Griffith with 40 seconds remaining in the second half, after officials flagged both teams.

Griffith had allegedly kicked Osborn in the head after the Chieftain star was tackled at the Dimmitt ten-yard line. An official said that Osborn retaliated by throwing a punch.

"I don't think he (Osborn) did. Ben has never done anything like that, even when he was provoked. No one saw anything like that. It really took the starch out of our game plan," said Chieftain Coach Tommy Moss.

At the time of the ejection, Dimmitt was leading 21-12, but the Chieftains, paced by Osborn, were driving for what could have been their third touchdown and might have pulled as close as 21-20.

Osborn had already scored both Friona touchdowns, and gained 109 yards in less than a half game.

The Chiefs had been given a first and goal by Osborn's ten-yard run on his last carry of the game. Four plays later, the shell-shocked Chieftains surrendered the ball to Dimmitt at their 21-yard line.

The Chieftains played on even terms with the favored Bobcats throughout the first half. In fact, they led the 'Cats in first downs for the game, 19-13, in total yardage, 309-276, and in offensive plays 67-49. Friona led in time of possession, approximately 30 minutes to 18.

Dimmitt took the lead, driving 75 yards in ten plays the second time they had the football to assume a 7-0 lead. Clay Lytle passed to Kevin Petty for a touchdown and a 7-0 lead with 2:56 left in the opening period.

Friona answered with their quickest scoring drive of the season. Jeff Stowers returned the kick 26 yards. Cody Burney lobbed a 27-yard pass to Jacky Lafuente, who came back nicely for the ball.

Then Osborn burst up the middle 35 yards untouched for the touchdown. A low snap foiled the PAT try, and the score became 7-6. Only 52 seconds separated the Dimmitt score and Friona's, as the Chiefs covered 62 yards in only four plays.

The Bobcats also answered the challenge, going 67 yards in only seven plays. Lytle hit Kelly Howell with a 23-yard scoring toss, and the PAT kick gave Dimmitt a 14-6 lead. The Bobcat TD came on the last play of an action-packed first quarter.

Friona then put together probably its most impressive drive of the 1988 season. Burney gave the team a first down with a quarterback sneak at the Friona 40, and after Friona was penalized for holding, Lafuente gained 24 yards on a reverse run to advance the ball to the Dimmitt 27.

Osborn, who accounted for 41 of the drive's yards on eight carries, got the touchdown, going over untouched from a yard out. The Chieftains tried to run for a tying two points, but Osborn was stopped a half-yard short and the score was 14-12 with 6:47 left in the half.

Friona had used up 5:13 of the second quarter clock on the drive.

Dimmitt didn't use up as much time on their next possession. The 'Cats again went 75 yards in only six plays. Howell's 15-yard run ran the score to 21-12 with 3:51 left in the half.

Again the Chiefs were answering, as Osborn gave the team a first down on a fourth down burst for four yards from the Friona 47. Andre Duran ran nine yards and a face mask penalty against the Bobcats moved the ball to the Dimmitt 25.

After Burney hit Shannon Cochran for a five-yard gain, Osborn made his ten-yard gain to the Dimmitt ten, and the extracurricular activities in which both he and the Dimmitt defender were disqualified from the game.

Burney attempted to pass more with the team's leading rusher sidelined, but wasn't as effective, as the Bobcats knew what was coming, and blitzed him all night long.

Friona never put together a string of first downs until backed up to their own two-yard line late in the game. Lafuente ran for 20 yards, and Burney passed to Chuck Sutter and Lafuente to move across midfield as time ran out on the Chiefs.

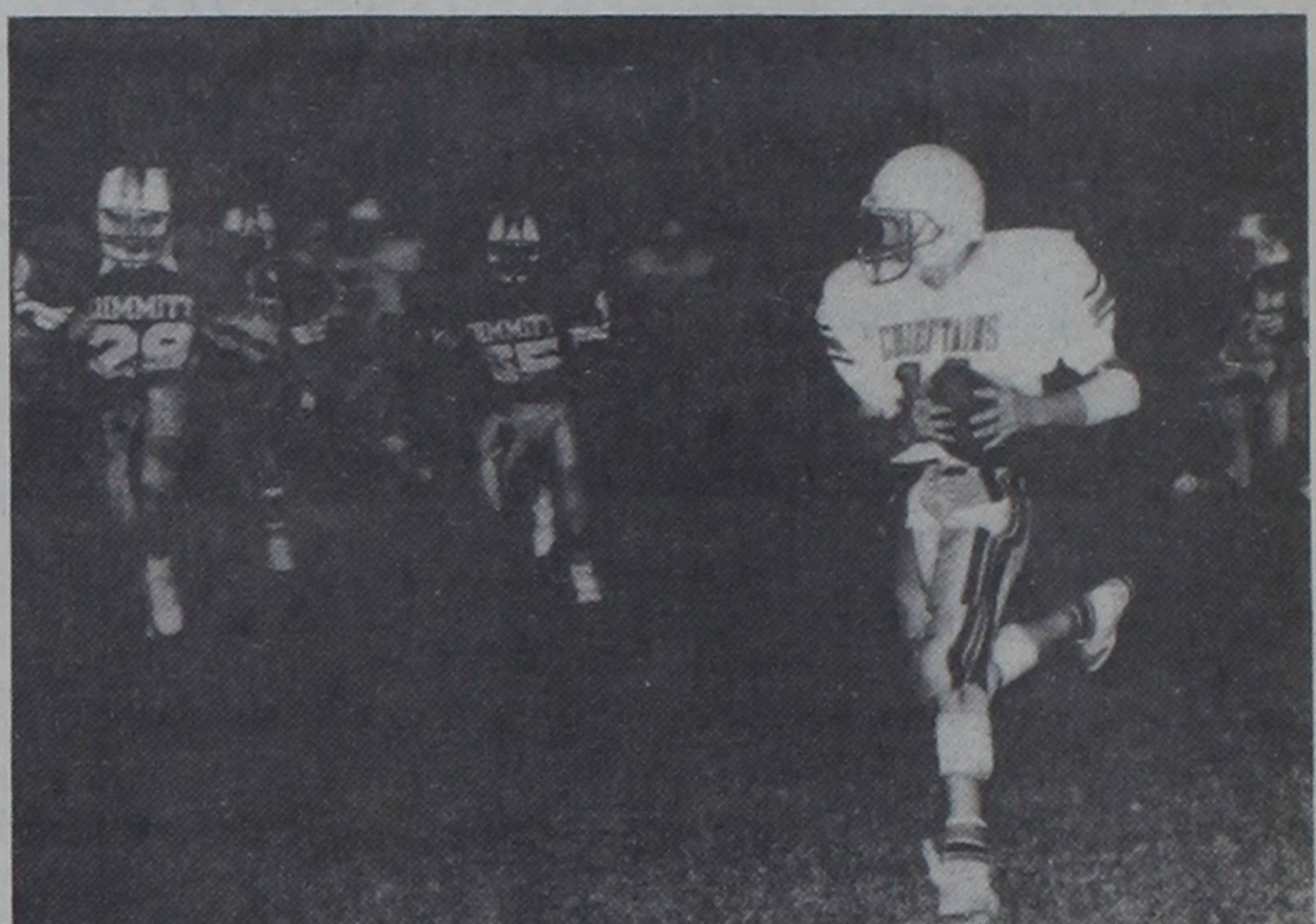

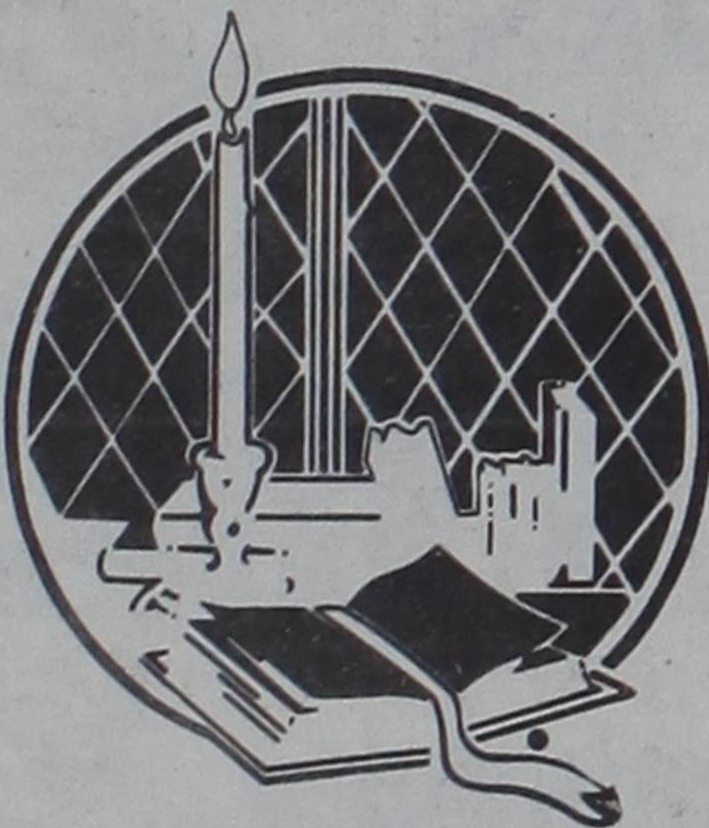
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Take a Second Look

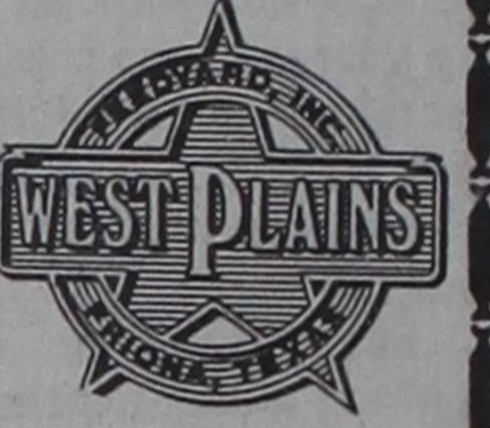

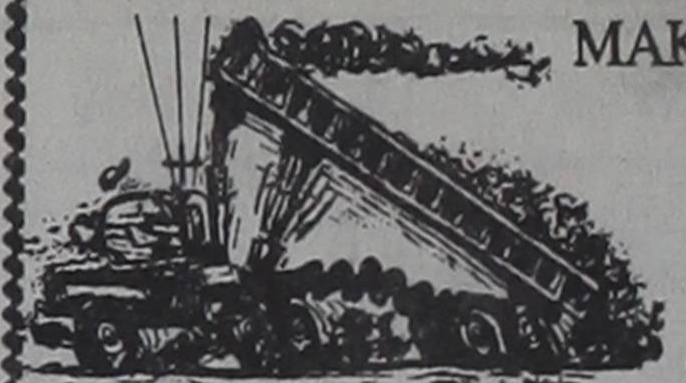
