Dimmitt Man Killed In Wreck Here

A Dimmitt man, Tony Smithers, 20, was killed early Monday morning when his car was struck by a Santa Fe freight train as he attempted to cross the tracks a mile east of Friona.

Smithers was driving his car north on a county road which approaches the intersection with U.S. Highway 60 when it was struck by the westbound train at about 7:30 a.m., according to DPS trooper Rick Uribe.

Uribe said that Smithers evidently did not see the train, and said there were no skid marks or other evidence that indicated that he might have tried to stop before the accident.

He added that the train's crew said they did not see Smithers coming, but that the crew sounded the train's horn before approaching the crossing.

Smithers was on his way to work at Millard Warehouse in Friona from his home in Dimmitt. Services were held Thursday






Vance Rites Are Held In Sunray

Memorial services for Jack Earl Vance, 60, were held Wednesday in Sunray. Vance was found dead in his home on Monday.



SS Changes ! Must Be Reported

Most people think of Social Security as something for the future. For some 37 million people receiving Social Security benefits, the future is now. For others, Social Security provides current protection against the loss of income because of disability and for one's family if the worker should die. This is why we say that Social Security touches everybody in one way or another.

Since this is the time of year when it's customary to make promises about changing future behavior in one's best interest, I going to make some suggestions to change the way you view your Social Security and insure that you get the most out of the program.

The New Year resolutions you should consider are as follows:

*Check your Social Security number at work. To protect your Social Security earnings record, you should compare the name and number on your Social Security card with the name and number on your pay stubs or the Form W-2 you receive in January. If the name and number are not exactly the same, you should notify your employer.

*Check on your earnings record once every three years. A free form can be obtained from any Social Security office for this purpose. The lifetime earnings record is the basis on which benefits are paid. Generally, the higher the average annual earnings, the higher the benefits.

*Learn what you need to know about Social Security. Do you know what benefits Social Security pays besides retirement...how old you have to be to become eligible for disability or survivors benefits...how your benefits will compare with your prior earnings, how other pensions will affect your Social Security benefit? All of these facts are important if you are to use Social Security protection in your financial security planning for a growing family or for retirement.

Call your nearest Social Security office and ask for the booklet, Your Social Security which provides a general explanation on how the program works. If you have further questions, any Social Security office will be glad to help

*Know the five times you should contact Social Security. In general, there are five instances you should get in touch with your Social Security office. These include: when someone in the household (1) retires, (2) becomes disabled, (3) dies, (4) needs a Social Security number, or (5) has a question about Social Security.


