have a savings check due us by the government on this month's ration allowance. With this fund we will purchase extras from the local markets.
Since we wrote you last time we have had quite an experience. Wednesday afternoon, out of an apparently clear sky, came a very sudden wind accompanied by a driving rain. It came so suddenly that we, not having an-
ticipated it, were ticipated it, were caught with
our tents rolled up, clothes on our tents rolled up, clothes on the line, etc.
The entire regiment was on the drill field and all got a nice drenching before it was possible to reach cover.
The wind blew harder and the rain fell heavier every minute for about ten minutes, then the rain ceased and the wind calmed
down to a steady breeze and in a few minutes we realized that the first "norther" of the season was upon us.

For the balance of the evening the cooks were the most popular men in the company as everybody wanted to come into the kitchen with them and assist them in keeping the up.
As usual "L" company came through the storm witlf another While the other companies Wrom the other companies had from one to a dozen tents to go down, we had none, only one was
torn by a piece of timber blown torn by a piece of timber blown
against it.
The following day brought forth 'Old Sol"' crowned in all scoped by drawing them in to the center-pole and tying. By noon everything was dried out and renuvated and before night
the storm becaune a thing of
the past.
We were honored yesterday by a visit from Geo. E. Darsey and the Murchisons and Sgt. Darsey's "flivver." They all looked natural and mighty good to us. We were glad to see them several times before we leave
We are still on our eight hourdrill a day schedule but-it does drill a day sched so long or hard as it did at first. All the boys are hardening and becoming accuscomed to the work. We expect to receive our rifles and side arms in a few days. When we get them and learn how to handle them we will send you a nice picture.
We will soon undergo a change of some kind, and this very change is what has us guessing
